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8	Relating to peace officers and firefighters; to
9	amend Sections 36-30-1 and 36-30-2, Code of Alabama 1975,
10	relating to the benefits awarded on account of injury or
11	death, under certain conditions; to include a wildland
12	firefighter employed by the Alabama Forestry Commission as a
13	firefighter as eligible for injury or death benefits; and to
14	specify that a volunteer firefighter or a member of an
15	organized rescue squad who dies of cardiac arrest,
16	cerebrovascular accident, or pulmonary edema within 24 hours
17	of preparing to respond, responding, or serving in his or her
18	capacity at an emergency or participating in a training
19	exercise shall be presumptively deemed to have died in the
20	performance of his or her duties.
21	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
22	Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited
23	as "The Joe Donaghue/Donna Jo Horton Act."
24	Section 2. Sections 36-30-1 and 36-30-2, Code of
25	Alabama 1975, are amended to read as follows:
26	"§36-30-1.

"(a) For the purposes of this chapter, the following
 words and phrases shall have the following meanings:

3 "(1) AWARDING AUTHORITY. The State Board of
4 Adjustment, created and existing pursuant to Article 4,
5 Chapter 9 of Title 41.

6 "(2) COMPENSATION. The money benefits paid on 7 account of injury or death which occurred during the course of 8 employment or activity as a peace officer or firefighter and 9 is in the nature of workers' compensation.

10 "(3) DEPENDENT CHILD. An unmarried child under the 11 age of 18 years, or one over the age of 18 who is physically 12 or mentally incapacitated from earning.

13 "(4) DIRECT AND PROXIMATE RESULT OF A HEART ATTACK 14 OR STROKE. Death resulting from a heart attack or stroke 15 caused by engaging or participating in a situation while on 16 duty involving nonroutine stressful or strenuous physical law 17 enforcement, fire suppression, rescue, hazardous material 18 response, emergency medical service, prison security, disaster relief, other emergency medical response activity, or 19 20 participation in a training exercise which involved nonroutine 21 stressful or strenuous physical activity; and the heart attack 22 or stroke is suffered while still on that duty after so 23 engaging or participating or not more than 24 hours after so 24 engaging or participating.

"(5) FIREFIGHTER or FIREFIGHTERS. A member or
members of a paid or volunteer fire department of a city,
town, county, or other subdivision of the state or of a public

corporation organized for the purpose of providing water, 1 2 water systems, fire protection services, or fire protection facilities in the state; and shall include the chief, 3 assistant chief, wardens, engineers, captains, firefighters, 4 5 and all other officers and employees of such departments who 6 actually engage in fire fighting or in rendering first aid in 7 case of drownings or asphyxiation at the scene of action. The term also includes a firefighter who is employed by the 8 Alabama Forestry Commission and who has been certified by the 9 10 State Forester as having met the wildland firefighter training standards of the National Wildfire Coordinating Group. 11

"(6) PEACE OFFICER. All sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, 12 13 constables, municipal police officers, municipal policemen, state and town marshals, members of the highway patrol, state 14 15 troopers, Alcoholic Beverage Control Board Enforcement Division agents, enforcement officers of the Public Service 16 Commission, revenue agents, and persons who are required by 17 18 law to comply with the provisions of the Peace Officers' Minimum Standards, employees of the Board of Corrections, 19 20 highway camp guards, law enforcement officers of the 21 Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, all law 22 enforcement officers of the Alabama Forestry Commission, 23 livestock theft investigators of the Department of Agriculture 24 and Industries, Capitol security guards, narcotic agents and 25 inspectors of the State Board of Health, any other state, 26 county, or municipal officer engaged in quelling a riot, or civil disturbance, and university police officers. 27

"(7) RESCUE SQUAD MEMBER. A member of an organized 1 2 rescue squad of a city, town, county, or other subdivision of the state or of a public corporation, organized for the 3 purpose of providing, within the scope of his or her practice: 4 5 First aid, treatment, or transport of the sick or injured; 6 rescue or recovery operations at incidents of drowning; search 7 and rescue of individuals lost or incapable of self rescue; or 8 any other emergency or non-emergency incident where the 9 services provided by the rescue squad are deemed necessary for 10 incident stabilization. The term includes all commanders, officers, and members of organized rescue squads that are 11 members of the Alabama Association of Rescue Squads. 12

13 "(b) For the purposes of this chapter, the following 14 described persons shall be conclusively presumed to be wholly 15 dependent:

16 "(1) Spouse, unless it be shown that the spouse was 17 voluntarily living apart from the peace officer, firefighter, 18 or rescue squad member at the time of death, or unless it be shown that the peace officer, firefighter, or rescue squad 19 20 member was not in any way contributing to the spouse's support 21 and had not in any way contributed to the spouse's support for 22 more than 12 months next preceding the occurrence of the 23 injury causing death.

24 "(2) Minor children under the age of 18 years and 25 those over 18 if physically and mentally incapacitated from 26 earning. "(3) Spouse, child, mother, father, grandmother,
grandfather, sister, brother, mother-in-law, and father-in-law
who were wholly supported by a deceased peace officer,
firefighter, or rescue squad member at the time of his or her
death and for a reasonable period of time prior thereto shall
be considered his or her dependents and payment of
compensation may be made to them as hereinafter authorized.

8 "(c) If a paid or volunteer firefighter, peace officer, certified police officer, reserve law enforcement 9 10 officer, or rescue squad member is killed while engaged in the performance of his or her duties and there are no designated 11 beneficiaries, then the compensation shall be paid to his or 12 13 her dependents or partial dependents in the manner prescribed 14 by Section 36-30-3, and if there are none, the compensation 15 shall be paid to his or her non-dependent children, and if there are none, the compensation shall be paid to his or her 16 parents, and if there are none, the compensation shall be paid 17 18 to the estate of the deceased.

"(d) Any member of the class named in subdivision 19 20 (3) of subsection (b) who regularly derived part of his or her 21 support from the earnings of the deceased peace officer, 22 firefighter, or rescue squad member, as the case may be, at the time of his or her death and for a reasonable time 23 24 immediately prior thereto shall be considered his or her 25 partial dependent and payment of compensation may be made to 26 such partial dependent as hereinafter authorized.

27 "§36-30-2.

"(a) In the event a peace officer, a firefighter, a 1 2 volunteer firefighter who is a member of an organized volunteer fire department registered with the Alabama Forestry 3 Commission, or a rescue squad member is killed, either 4 5 accidentally or deliberately, or dies as a result of injuries received while engaged in the performance of his or her 6 7 duties, or dies as a direct and proximate result of a heart attack or stroke, his or her beneficiaries or dependents shall 8 9 be entitled to compensation in the amount of one hundred 10 thousand dollars (\$100,000) to be paid from the State Treasury as provided in Section 36-30-3, unless such death was caused 11 by the willful misconduct of the officer, firefighter, or 12 13 rescue squad member or was due to his or her own intoxication or his or her willful failure or refusal to use safety 14 15 appliances provided by his or her employer or his or her willful refusal or neglect to perform a statutory duty or any 16 other willful violation of a law or his or her willful breach 17 18 of a reasonable rule or regulation governing the performance of his or her duties or his or her employment of which rule or 19 20 regulation he or she had knowledge. Any peace officer, 21 firefighter, volunteer firefighter, or rescue squad member 22 whose death results proximately from an injury received while performing his or her duties shall, for the purposes of this 23 24 article, be deemed to have been killed while in the performance of such duties. A volunteer firefighter or a 25 26 member of an organized rescue squad who dies of cardiac arrest, cerebrovascular accident, or pulmonary edema within 24 27

1 hours after preparing to respond to a called emergency or 2 responding to an emergency; or after serving in his or her 3 capacity at an emergency; or after participating in a required physical training exercise shall be presumed to have died in 4 5 the performance of his or her duties. If the State Health Officer determines from all available evidence that a 6 7 volunteer firefighter, who is a member of an organized 8 volunteer fire department registered with the Alabama Forestry 9 Commission, has become totally disabled as a result of any 10 injury received while engaged in the performance of his or her fire-fighting duties and the disability is likely to continue 11 for more than 12 months from the date the injury is incurred, 12 13 then the firefighter shall be entitled to receive disability 14 compensation in the amount of one hundred thousand dollars 15 (\$100,000) to be paid from the State Treasury as provided in 16 Section 36-30-3. The term total disability shall be 17 interpreted to mean that the injured party is medically 18 disabled to the extent that he or she cannot perform the 19 duties of the job occupation or profession in which he or she 20 was engaging at the time the injury was sustained. The State 21 Health Officer may seek the assistance of any state agency in 22 making the determination of disability and the state agencies 23 shall cooperate with the State Health Officer in such regard. 24 The State Health Officer shall render a decision within 30 25 days of the time a claim is filed. If such volunteer firefighter disagrees with any officer, he or she may appeal 26

the determination to the State Board of Adjustment in
 accordance with such board's procedures for such appeals.

"(b) Beginning in calendar year 2009, the 3 compensation amounts payable under this section shall be 4 5 adjusted on January 1 of each year to reflect any increase 6 during the preceding calendar year in the consumer price index 7 as published by the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor 8 Statistics. The adjustment shall equal the percentage change 9 in the consumer price index during the preceding calendar 10 year.

"(c) Any person who currently serves or previously 11 served as a firefighter or law enforcement peace officer who 12 13 dies as a result of a firefighter's occupational disease as defined in Section 11-43-144 or 36-30-40, or law enforcement 14 15 peace officer's occupational disease as defined in Section 36-30-20 shall be qualified for a state death benefit as 16 17 provided in subsection (a) as if the person died in the 18 performance of his or her duties, provided he or she satisfies the three years' service requirement and physical examination 19 20 requirements set forth in Section 11-43-144, 36-30-22, or 21 36-30-41, respectively.

"(d) Any application for the state death benefit that was submitted during the period from April 29, 2010, until May 27, 2015, and denied because the firefighter or law enforcement peace officer was no longer employed on the date of death may be resubmitted based on subsection (c) within six

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1	months of May 27, 2015, and reconsidered and granted by the
2	awarding authority.
3	"(e) The provisions of this section as amended by
4	the act adding this amendatory language shall be retroactive
5	to any death covered by this chapter as amended after January
6	<u>1, 2019."</u>
7	" (e) The provisions of this section as amended by
8	the act adding this amendatory language shall be retroactive
9	to any death covered by this chapter as amended after January
10	1, 2019, including any individual application for death
11	benefits filed with the Board of Adjustment with a date of
12	death after January 1, 2019, and any claim denied by the board
13	with a date of death after January 1, 2019, shall be
14	reconsidered based on the amendments provided by the act
15	adding this amendatory language."
16	Section 3. This act shall become effective
17	immediately following its passage and approval by the

18 Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
