ORANGE DURING THE VIETNAM WAR.
WHEREAS, our nation was conceived by individuals who
were willing to sacrifice their personal safety and concerns
to ensure our individual and collective freedom, and Alabama
is especially proud to be the home of so many valiant men and
women who have performed above and beyond the call of duty;
and
WHEREAS, the citizens of the United States have,
throughout the years, been called upon to take up arms against
the enemies of this great nation, risking their lives and
leaving their loved ones behind to safeguard the freedoms and
liberties guaranteed to all Americans and vanquishing those
who threaten our way of life; and
WHEREAS, more than 8 million citizens of this
country honorably served during the Vietnam War, during which
time Agent Orange was widely used in Vietnam by the United
States Armed Forces as part of the herbicidal warfare program,

Operation Ranch Hand, from 1961 until 1971; and

WHEREAS, nearly 20 million gallons of the orange 1 2 powder were sprayed over the land from helicopters or low-flying aircraft, destroying vegetation and crops in order 3 to deprive enemy querillas of food and cover for their 4 5 activities, which exposed 2.6 million American soldiers to the herbicide and defoliant chemical; and 6 7 WHEREAS, Agent Orange is a dioxin and cancer-causing 8 chemical that enters the body through physical contact or 9 ingestion and moves into the human cell nucleus, where it 10 attacks the genes and causes a number of serious illnesses, including leukemia, lymphoma, myeloma, ischemic, heart 11 disease, soft tissue sarcoma, amyloidosis, and diabetes, as 12 13 well as cancers of the throat, prostate, lungs, and colon; and 14 WHEREAS, Agent Orange also causes genetic damage, 15 and in some cases, the children and grandchildren of veterans exposed to Agent Orange have been born with spina bifida and 16 17 other abnormalities; and 18 WHEREAS, today, only 800,000 Vietnam Veterans exposed to Agent Orange survive, and approximately 300 deaths 19 20 occur among them every day; and 21 WHEREAS, while their fallen comrades are 22 memorialized on the wall at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C., those veterans who are victims of Agent 23 24 Orange are not recognized as fatalities of the Vietnam War; 25 and
