Relating to the Board of Pharmacy; relating to the practice of pharmacy; relating to pharmacies; relating to prescription drug manufacturers; relating to licensing and registration requirements for certain wholesale drug distributors; relating to prescriptions for epinephrine; relating to the administration of epinephrine; and providing for an effective date.

7	(a) There is created the Board of Pharmacy, composed of seven members, five
8	of whom shall be pharmacists licensed in the state who have been actively engaged in
9	the practice of pharmacy in the state for a period of three years immediately preceding
10	their appointment. One shall be a pharmacy technician licensed in the state for a
11	period of two years immediately preceding appointment. One [TWO] shall be <u>a</u>
12	person [PERSONS] with no direct financial interest in the health care industry.
