9	of Education is authorized to issue emergency
10	teaching certificates, which are valid for one

14	certificates as urgent certificates, would extend
15	the validity of an urgent teaching certificate to
16	two years, with the ability of being renewed twice,
17	for a maximum validity of six years, and would make
18	technical corrections to update the language of the
19	amended code sections.

22	TO BE ENTITLED
23	AN ACT
24	
25	To amend Sections 16-3-16, 16-23-3, 16-23-16.1, and
26	16-24C-3, Code of Alabama 1975, relating to provisional
27	teaching certificates; to rename an emergency certificate as

an urgent certificate; to extend the length of time for which an urgent certificate is valid from one to two years, with the ability of being renewed twice, for a maximum validity of six years; and to make technical corrections to update the language of the amended code sections.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. Sections 16-3-16, 16-23-3, 16-23-16.1, and 16-24C-3 of the Code of Alabama 1975, are amended to read as follows:

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"§16-3-16.

"(a) Subject to the provisions of Chapter 23 of this 11 title, the State Board of Education, through its executive 12 13 officer, shall prescribe rules and regulations governing the training and the certification of teachers in the public 14 15 schools of the state, and for the acceptance of the diplomas of the colleges and universities of Alabama, as well as of 16 other states. The State Board of Education, with the advice of 17 18 the State Superintendent of Education, shall have full power and authority to promulgate and adopt rules and regulations 19 20 governing the issuance of professional and special, 21 alternative, and emergency urgent certificates consistent with 22 the provisions of Chapter 23 of this title.

"(b) Alabama shall use certification by the National
 Boards of Professional Teaching Standards as national
 reciprocity when national certification has been fully
 implemented.

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27 "§16-23-3.
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"(a) It is the intent of the Legislature that the 1 2 State of Alabama shall modify its policies relative to the certification of teachers to permit an expanded alternative 3 certification program for prospective teachers for grades six 4 5 through 12. In addition to certificates issued pursuant to 6 this chapter to persons individuals graduating from approved 7 teacher education programs, the State Board of Education shall adopt policies, procedures, rules, regulations, and/or 8 standards authorizing an alternative certificate to be issued 9 10 by the State Superintendent of Education to an individual person, regardless of whether such person the individual is a 11 12 graduate of an approved teacher education program, where the 13 applicant shall:

14 "(1) Hold an earned bachelor's or higher degree from15 a regionally accredited institution of higher education.

16 "(2) Submit the required application forms and fees
17 and, when required, a separate fingerprint fee, along with
18 fingerprints and release forms.

19 "(3) Be recommended for certification by the 20 employing Alabama local school superintendent or private 21 school administrator.

"(4) Be assigned a mentor by the employingsuperintendent or private school administrator.

"(5) Meet the requirements of the Alabama
Prospective Teacher Testing Program as set forth by the State
Board of Education.

1 "(6) Verify compliance with one of the following
2 admission criteria:

"a. That at least 32 semester hours credit, 19 of
which must shall be upper division level, have been earned in
the field for which certification is sought.

6 "b. An earned bachelor's or higher degree from a 7 regionally accredited institution of higher education with a 8 non-education major in the academic area for which 9 certification is sought.

"c. A passing score on the appropriate Praxis II
 content test of the Alabama Prospective Teacher Testing
 Program.

13 "(7) Request that an official transcript be sent 14 directly to the employing superintendent or private school 15 administrator.

16 "(b) Any alternative certificate shall be valid for 17 the period of time as shall be set by policies, procedures, 18 rules, regulations, and/or standards which shall be adopted by 19 the State Board of Education but in no event shall such period 20 extend beyond four years from the July 1 beginning date of the 21 initial alternative certificate.

"(c) Where a person <u>an individual</u> has received an alternative certificate or certificates and has been employed for three full years by no more than two county or city school boards or private schools while holding alternative certificates, <u>such person</u> an individual may be granted a

1 teaching certificate issued by the State Superintendent of 2 Education pursuant to Section 16-23-1, when:

3 "(1) Approved by the State Superintendent of4 Education.

5 "(2) Approved according to policies, procedures, rules, regulations, and/or standards which shall be adopted by 6 7 the State Board of Education. Such policies, procedures, rules, regulations, and/or standards shall require that the 8 9 recipient of an alternative certificate successfully complete 10 no more than the equivalent of twelve 12 semester hours of college course work in education related courses, as may be 11 determined by the State Board of Education based upon factors 12 13 such as the recipient's individual educational background, prior to the issuance of a teaching certificate pursuant to 14 15 Section 16-23-1.

"(d) Any person individual granted a teaching 16 17 certificate issued by the State Superintendent of Education 18 pursuant to Section 16-23-1, following the receipt of an alternative certificate, as herein provided, may be eligible 19 20 to attain continuing service status pursuant to Chapter 24, of 21 this title. Time served as a teacher pursuant to an 22 alternative certificate shall be counted in determining continuing service status pursuant to Section 16-24-2. 23

"(e) The State Superintendent of Education in cases
 of emergency when certified teachers, including teachers who
 may have received alternative certificates pursuant to this
 section, are not available may grant <u>emergency urgent</u>

certificates of the different kinds and grades, but any such 1 2 emergency urgent certificate shall not be valid for a period 3 to exceed one year two years but shall expire at the end of the scholastic year for which it is issued, and such 4 5 emergency. An urgent certificate shall not may be extended or renewed two times as provided by policies, procedures, rules, 6 7 regulations, and/or standards adopted by the State Board of Education, for a maximum validity of six years. Time served as 8 9 a teacher pursuant to an emergency urgent certificate shall 10 not be counted in determining continuing service status pursuant to Section 16-24-2. 11

12 "(f) Any alternative certificate issued pursuant to 13 this section shall be limited to persons <u>individuals</u> teaching 14 grades six through 12; provided, however, that an alternative 15 certificate may be issued for <u>persons individuals</u> teaching 16 grades kindergarten through eight if limited to the subject 17 areas of the fine arts <u>and/or or</u> foreign languages, <u>or both</u>. 18 "\$16-23-16.1.

"(a) The Legislature finds that Alabama is alone 19 20 among the southern states in not testing teacher candidates 21 before allowing them in the classroom, and acknowledges that 22 the need exists to establish, maintain, and enforce minimum professional standards for teacher candidates in the State of 23 24 Alabama. In response to such that need, there is hereby 25 created a Professional Teachers Standards Commission (the commission) for the State of Alabama. The commission shall 26 27 consist of 11 members appointed by the Governor in the

1 following manner: The Alabama Congress of Parents and Teachers 2 Association, Alabama Association of School Board Association Boards, Alabama Council for School Administration and 3 Supervision, Alabama Education Association, and the Alabama 4 5 Association of Colleges for Teacher Education shall each 6 designate a representative that together shall form a 7 nominating committee which shall meet at the call of the 8 Governor and submit to him or her a list of 20 names to be 9 considered for initial appointment to the commission. All such 10 nominees shall have demonstrated experience and ability in the science of test development and administration. Such The names 11 shall be submitted to the Governor within 30 days immediately 12 13 following July 23, 1991. If nominations are not received by 14 the Governor within such the 30-day period, he the Governor 15 shall proceed to make such appointments by the various categories as described below from his or her own selection. 16 17 The nominations shall include an appropriate number of names 18 to ensure the selection of three practicing elementary 19 teachers for (grades kindergarten through five), one 20 practicing middle school teacher for (grades six through 21 eight), and two practicing secondary teachers for (grades nine 22 through 12; two school administrators consisting of one 23 school principal and one school superintendent; one member 24 from the faculty of a teacher preparation program; and one 25 member of a local board of education. In addition to the 26 foregoing 10 members, the Governor shall appoint one member from his or her own selection, which member shall serve at the 27

pleasure of the Governor. Four of the members initially 1 2 appointed shall serve for three years, four shall serve for two years, and three shall serve for one year. Thereafter, the 3 terms of all members shall be for three years. The Governor 4 5 shall designate at the time of the initial appointments which members' terms shall be for one, two, or three years in 6 7 duration. At the expiration of the term of any appointee, 8 other than the Governor's discretionary appointee, the 9 nominating committee shall recommend to the Governor at least 10 two persons individuals for appointment to the position created by the expired term. Vacancies occurring on the 11 commission shall be filled from the same respective categories 12 13 as described above and the replacement or reappointed member(s) member of the commission shall serve for the 14 15 remainder of the unexpired term of his or her predecessor. The 16 Governor may reject any name(s) name submitted by the nominating committee and in such a case the Governor shall 17 18 call upon the nominating committee to submit additional names for the initial appointees or additional names for the filling 19 20 of any vacancy on the commission. No member of the commission 21 shall serve more than two full terms.

"(b) (1) The Legislature recognizes that the National Teacher Examination (NTE) or some component thereof is utilized as an examination for teacher candidates in 33 states, including the majority of our surrounding southern states. It is therefore the intent of the Legislature that the commission select a nationally recognized pre-certification

examination such as the NTE for initial certification of 1 teacher candidates in Alabama. The commission is directed to 2 determine the conditions, if any, which must shall be 3 satisfied for use of the NTE for the purposes set forth 4 5 herein. The commission is further authorized to may utilize all means necessary to comply with such conditions so as to 6 7 allow usage of the NTE as an entry-level pre-certification examination for teacher candidates in Alabama, or to otherwise 8 9 promote full implementation of this section.

10 "(2) In the event that the commission is prohibited from utilizing the NTE, its successor examination, or a 11 12 component of either, for pre-certification, after exhausting 13 all available remedies, then the commission is authorized to 14 may designate or develop a pre-certification examination. Such 15 The examination shall adhere to generally accepted test construction methodology and those test construction practices 16 reflected in the NTE, and shall permit evaluation of 17 18 functional academic skills of teacher candidates including, but not limited to, reading, writing, and mathematics. 19

20 "(c) Any pre-certification examination designated or 21 developed pursuant to this section shall be administered by the commission to all teacher candidates seeking certification 22 23 for the 1994-95 school year. Candidates must shall demonstrate 24 required satisfactory proficiency, as determined by the 25 commission from time to time, on such the examination prior to 26 before becoming eligible to receive a certificate pursuant to 27 this chapter; provided, however, that such satisfactory

1 proficiency shall not be required for persons to become 2 eligible to receive emergency urgent certificates pursuant to Section 16-23-3. Candidates shall have only five opportunities 3 to demonstrate the required satisfactory proficiency, and if 4 5 such a candidate fails to demonstrate the required satisfactory proficiency in the fifth attempt, such the 6 7 candidates shall not be eligible for certification in the State of Alabama. 8

9 "(d) It is the intent of the Legislature that 10 Alabama teacher preparation institutions support the performance of their graduates on such pre-certification 11 examinations and such that institutions shall be responsible 12 13 for providing remediation without any cost to the student who 14 has successfully completed all course requirements for the 15 teacher preparation program but has failed the pre-certification test. The failure of any institution to 16 17 comply with the provisions of this section shall be grounds 18 upon which the institution's rights to prepare teachers may be withdrawn. It is the intent of the Legislature that upon the 19 20 designation or development of a pre-certification examination 21 for initial certification of teacher candidates, the 22 commission shall then proceed to address the improvement of 23 standards for teacher preparation programs. As a result of the 24 administration of the test and to the extent fewer minorities 25 are licensed to teach in Alabama, the commission shall develop 26 a remedial plan which will shall be implemented by teacher 27 preparation institutions.

"(e) Scores from the tests required under the 1 2 provisions of The Alabama Education Improvement Act of 1991 (Acts 1991, No. 91-323) shall be reported to and kept by the 3 commission. Scores shall be given to the candidates tested. 4 5 Personally identifiable scores shall not be open or made available to the public, but reports may be prepared and 6 7 released by the commission with respect to overall results of scores. Reports of scores as authorized herein may be made at 8 9 such a frequency as the commission may deem appropriate.

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"§16-24C-3.

11 "For purposes of this chapter, the following terms 12 shall have the following meanings:

13 "(1) CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER. The chief 14 administrative and executive officer of an entity, 15 institution, agency, or political subdivision of the state 16 that is subject to this chapter and includes, without 17 limitation, superintendents of city or county boards of 18 education and presidents of two-year educational institutions operated under authority and control of the Department of 19 20 Postsecondary Education. The term includes persons individuals 21 serving in such a capacity on an acting or interim basis under 22 lawful appointment or by operation of law.

"(2) CLASSIFIED EMPLOYEE. All adult bus drivers, all
full-time lunchroom or cafeteria workers, janitors,
custodians, maintenance personnel, secretaries and clerical
assistants, instructional aides or assistants, whether or not
certificated, non-certificated supervisors, and, except as

hereinafter provided, all other persons individuals who are 1 2 not teachers as defined herein who are full-time employees of a city or county board of education, two-year educational 3 institutions operated under the authority and control of the 4 5 Department of Postsecondary Education Alabama Community College System, the Alabama Institute for Deaf and Blind, 6 7 including production workers at the Alabama Industries for the Blind, and educational and correctional institutions under the 8 9 control of the Department of Youth Services. The term does not 10 include the employer's chief executive officer, vice president, or chief school financial officer. Full-time 11 employees include adult bus drivers and other employees whose 12 13 duties require 20 or more hours in each normal working week of 14 the school term, excluding holidays that are recognized by the 15 employer. Employees who are eligible for coverage under the 16 state Merit System are not covered by this chapter. A 17 probationary classified employee is a classified employee who 18 has not attained nonprobationary status.

19 "(3) EMPLOYEE. Unless otherwise specified, and as 20 appropriate to the context, the term includes either a teacher 21 or a classified employee, or both, whose employment is subject 22 to this chapter.

"(4) EMPLOYER. The entity, institution, agency, or political subdivision of the state by which an employee who is subject to this chapter is employed. Employers subject to this chapter include all city and county boards of education, all educational and correctional institutions under the control of

the Department of Youth Services, the Alabama Institute for 1 2 Deaf and Blind, and two-year educational institutions operated under the authority and control of the Department of 3 Postsecondary Education Alabama Community College System. Each 4 5 two-year institution operated under the authority and control 6 of the Department of Postsecondary Education Alabama Community 7 College System is a separate employer for purposes of this 8 chapter.

"(5) GOVERNING BOARD. The body of elected or 9 10 appointed officials that is granted authority by law, regulation, or policy to make employment decisions on behalf 11 of the employer. If final decision-making authority with 12 13 respect to employment decisions is conferred by law, 14 regulation, or duly adopted policy on an official, 15 administrator, or organizational unit other than a separate governing board, the decision or action of such the official, 16 administrator, or organizational unit, including the president 17 18 of a two-year educational institution operated under the authority and control of the Department of Postsecondary 19 20 Education Alabama Community College System, is that of the 21 governing board for purposes of this chapter, and no 22 additional approval of such the decision or action shall be 23 required. Under such circumstances, the official, 24 administrator, president, or organizational unit shall assume 25 and exercise the duties of the governing board established by 26 this chapter. For purposes of this chapter, the State Board of Education shall not be deemed to be or authorized to function 27

as the employer or the governing board of any employer covered
 by this chapter.

"(6) PROFESSIONAL EDUCATOR'S CERTIFICATE. A 3 certificate or license, by whatever name, designation, or 4 5 subclassification known or identified, issued by the State Department of Education, or recognized under an approved 6 7 interstate reciprocity program, and that must shall be 8 maintained by the employee in order to be employed as a teacher in the county and city schools of this state. A 9 10 professional educator's certificate does not include provisional, alternative, or emergency urgent certificates, or 11 certificates or licenses that are issued to instructional 12 13 aides or assistants, to substitute teachers, or to business, technical, operational, or other employees whose job duties do 14 15 not require or entail the instruction of students or the regular supervision of or interaction with employees with such 16 17 those job duties.

18 "(7) SCHOOL YEAR. The period beginning with the first day of the annual school term and ending with the last 19 20 day of the annual school term on which classroom instructors 21 are required to report for duty, as established by the 22 governing board. For a two-year educational institution, the 23 school year shall be deemed to begin on the first day of the 24 fall academic semester and continuing through the final day of 25 the spring academic semester, but shall not include the summer academic semester. 26

"(8) TEACHER. All employees of entities that are 1 2 covered by this chapter who are required by law, regulation, or employer policy to maintain a professional educator's 3 certificate issued by the State Department of Education and 4 5 who are employed by a city or county board of education, the Alabama Institute for Deaf and Blind, or educational and 6 7 correctional institutions under the control of the Department of Youth Services. The term also includes instructors employed 8 9 by two-year educational institutions operated under the 10 authority and control of the Department of Postsecondary Education Alabama Community College System and principals who 11 had attained tenure under prior law, but who have not elected 12 13 to become contract principals under subsection (h) of Section 16-24B-3. The term does not include an employer's chief 14 15 executive officer, chief school financial officer, or a principal who is employed as or who has elected to become a 16 17 contract principal under subsection (h) of Section 16-24B-3, 18 whether or not certification is required for those positions by law or policy, and does not include the president or vice 19 20 president of a two-year educational institution operated under 21 the authority and control of the Department of Postsecondary 22 Education Alabama Community College System. A probationary teacher is a teacher who has not attained tenure." 23

24 Section 2. This act shall become effective 25 immediately following its passage and approval by the 26 Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
