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22	BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA, That this
23	act may be cited as the "Pathways to Behavioral Health Degrees Act of 2023".
24	Sec. 2. Definitions.
25	For the purposes of this subtitle, the term:
26	(1) "Accredited Master's Degree" means an accredited master's degree under the
27	Middle States Commission on Higher Education in counseling, school counseling, clinical
28	mental health counseling, social work or other masters' degree programs accepted by the Board
29	of Professional Counseling or the Board of Social Work for the purposes of licensure in a
30	behavioral health and human services occupation.
31	(2) "Behavioral health and human services occupation" means an occupation that
32	requires a worker to be licensed by the Board of Professional Counseling or the Board of Social
33	Work

34	(3) "DCPS" means the District of Columbia Public Schools.
35	(4) "Health care provider organization" means any entity licensed under federal,
36	state, or District law to provide health care services, including provider organizations certified by
37	the Department of Behavioral Health and including group practice provider organizations
38	enrolled in the District's Medicaid program.
39	(5) "LEA" means local education agency, which is DCPS or any individual or
10	group of public charter schools operating under a single charter.
11	(6) "Program" means the Behavioral Health and Human Services Scholarship
12	Program established pursuant to this act.
13	(7) "UDC" means the University of the District of Columbia.
14	Sec. 3. Program establishment.
15	(a)(1) There is established a Behavioral Health and Human Services Scholarship Program
16	at UDC to provide financial assistance to individuals who seek to obtain an accredited master's
17	degree from UDC and become licensed in a behavioral health or human services occupation to
18	work for a District government agency or for an LEA or health care provider organization
19	located in the District.
50	(b) Through UDC, the Program shall provide:
51	(1) Education to Program participants that may lead to:
52	(A) The successful completion of an accredited master's degree program at
53	UDC;
54	(B) Passage of licensure exams if required to become licensed in a
55	behavioral health and human services occupation; and

56	(C) Hiring by District LEAs, District government agencies, or health care
57	provider organizations located in the District in a behavioral health and human services
58	occupation; and
59	(2) Financial assistance to Program participants for payment of:
60	(A) Tuition at UDC, to the extent charged;
61	(B) Academic costs, including the cost of books and supplies;
62	(C) Stipends to be used toward living expenses and transportation; and
63	(D) Fees associated with obtaining a license for a behavioral health and
64	human services occupation in the District.
65	(c) UDC shall select individuals to participate in the Program, consistent with the
66	eligibility criteria established pursuant to section 4.
67	(d) Program marketing and public education shall be provided by UDC to attract District
68	residents and employees to the Program and for the duration of the Program.
69	(e) Among other authorized uses, UDC may use local funds appropriated to the Program
70	to provide:
71	(1) Salaries and fringe benefits for faculty and staff directly engaged in the
72	provision of courses necessary to obtain an accredited master's degree;
73	(2) Instructional materials used in courses necessary to obtain an accredited
74	master's degree;
75	(3) For marketing and recruitment activities to attract individuals to the Program;

77	(4) The financial assistance for Program participants described in subsection (b)
78	of this section.
79	Sec. 4. Program participant eligibility.
80	(a) To be eligible for financial assistance provided through the Program, an individual
81	shall:
82	(1) Meet the relevant requirements for the accredited master's degree program at
83	UDC in which the individual enrolls;
84	(2) Be:
85	(A) A resident of the District;
86	(B) A graduate of a District LEA; or
87	(C) Employed by a District government agency or health care provider
88	organization;
89	(3) Be enrolled in a UDC accredited master's degree program necessary to obtain
90	licensure in a behavioral health and human services occupation in the District;
91	(4) Have a stated interest in pursuing a license in a behavioral health and human
92	services occupation and to work in a behavioral health or human services occupation in the
93	District; and
94	(5) Meet other criteria specified by UDC.
95	(b) To maintain eligibility for financial assistance through the Program, an individual
96	shall:
97	(1) Maintain satisfactory academic progress, as determined by UDC;

98	(2) Be consecutively enrolled as a full-time or part-time student in an accredited
99	master's degree program at UDC; and
100	(3) Meet any other requirement determined by UDC to be necessary or
101	appropriate for Program participation.
102	(c) In exchange for accepting Program financial assistance, a Program participant shall
103	commit to working for a District government agency or an LEA or health care provider
104	organization located in the District for a minimum of 2 years after receiving an accredited
105	master's degree and earning the appropriate licensure or certification needed to practice in a
106	behavioral health and human services occupation in the District.
107	Sec. 5. Fiscal impact statement.

109	impact statement required by 4a of the General Legislative Procedures Act of 1975, approved

111	Sec. 6. Effective date.
112	This act shall take effect following approval by the Mayor (or in the event of veto by the
113	Mayor, action by the Council to override the veto), a 30-day period of Congressional review as
114	provided in sections 602(c)(1) of the District of Columbia Home Rule Act, approved December
115	24, 1973 (87 Stat. 813; D.C. Official Code § 1-206.02(c)(1)), and publication in the District of
116	Columbia Register.
