1 A bill to be entitled 2 An act relating to intellectual freedom in 3 postsecondary education; amending s. 1001.03, F.S.; 4 defining the term "intellectual freedom and viewpoint 5 diversity"; requiring the State Board of Education to 6 require each Florida College System institution to 7 conduct an annual assessment related to intellectual 8 freedom and viewpoint diversity at that institution; 9 providing criteria relating to such assessment; 10 prohibiting the State Board of Education from 11 shielding Florida College System institution students 12 from certain speech; amending s. 1001.706, F.S.; requiring the Board of Governors to require each state 13 14 university to conduct an annual assessment related to intellectual freedom and viewpoint diversity at that 15 16 institution; providing criteria relating to such 17 assessment; prohibiting the Board of Governors from shielding state university students from certain 18 19 speech; amending s. 1004.097, F.S.; allowing students at public postsecondary institutions to record certain 20 21 audio and video in classrooms; providing an effective 22 date. 23 24

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Subsection (19) is added to section 1001.03, 27 Florida Statutes, to read: 28 1001.03 Specific powers of State Board of Education.-29 (19) INTELLECTUAL FREEDOM AND VIEWPOINT DIVERSITY 30 ASSESSMENT.-31 (a) For the purposes of this subsection, the term 32 "intellectual freedom and viewpoint diversity" means the 33 exposure of students to, and the encouragement of students' exploration of, a variety of ideological and political 34 35 perspectives. 36 The State Board of Education shall require each (b) 37 Florida College System institution to conduct an annual 38 assessment of the intellectual freedom and viewpoint diversity 39 at that institution. The State Board of Education shall select or create an objective, nonpartisan, and statistically valid 40 41 survey to be used by each institution which considers the extent 42 to which competing ideas and perspectives are presented and 43 members of the college community feel free to express their 44 beliefs and viewpoints on campus and in the classroom. The State 45 Board of Education shall annually compile and publish the 46 assessments by September 1 of each year, beginning on September 47 1, 2022. 48 (C) The State Board of Education may not shield students at Florida College System institutions from free speech 49

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(3) RIGHT TO FREE-SPEECH ACTIVITIES.-

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- (a) Expressive activities protected under the First Amendment to the United States Constitution and Art. I of the State Constitution include, but are not limited to, any lawful oral or written communication of ideas, including all forms of peaceful assembly, protests, and speeches; distributing literature; carrying signs; circulating petitions; and, not withstanding s. 934.03(1), the recording and publication, including the Internet publication, of video or audio recorded in outdoor areas of campus and in classrooms. Expressive activities protected by this section do not include commercial speech.
 - Section 4. This act shall take effect July 1, 2021.
