WHEREAS, the United States has a history of catastrophic natural disasters, including, but not limited to, hurricanes, tornadoes, floods, wildfires, earthquakes, and volcanic eruptions, and

WHEREAS, homeowner losses from catastrophic natural disasters have been on the rise as climate change triggers more frequent and increasingly more destructive hurricanes, tornadoes, floods, wildfires, earthquakes, and volcanic eruptions, and

WHEREAS, insurance companies continue to raise premiums in an attempt to remain solvent in the wake of increased claims resulting from catastrophic natural disasters, and

WHEREAS, small private insurance companies cannot singlehandedly afford substantial losses from having to pay claims from catastrophic natural disasters, and

WHEREAS, many parts of the nation, especially the State of Florida, have been overburdened by the increase in insurance rates and the unavailability of insurance, and

WHEREAS, multiple insurance companies have become insolvent or have stopped writing insurance in the State of Florida, and

WHEREAS, Citizens Property Insurance, the State of Florida's public insurer of last resort, has seen an increase of more than 544,311 insurance policies since September 2020 and now issues more than 1 million insurance policies, and

WHEREAS, residents of the State of Florida have not received direct financial relief from the various measures taken by the Florida Legislature to address the continuous rising cost of insurance premiums, and

WHEREAS, states currently have limited funding to cover insurance losses from federally declared catastrophic natural disasters, and

WHEREAS, Hurricane Ian caused damages totaling an estimated \$115 billion, and the Federal Government spent \$5.2 billion in recovery as a result of the hurricane, and

WHEREAS, Hurricane Idalia is projected to have caused damages totaling \$20 billion, but the full amount of federal funding for the recovery is yet to be determined, and

WHEREAS, the Federal Government has provided, and will continue to provide, resources to pay for losses from future catastrophic natural disasters, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

That the Congress of the United States is urged to establish a federal catastrophe pool to spread the risk and
