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traumatic brain injuries; and one person who is a traumatic brain injury researcher. Membership on the council is not a prerequisite for membership on the committee. Committee members shall serve without compensation or reimbursement for per diem or travel expenses. The committee shall:

1. Research and analyze state trends with respect to traumatic brain injuries.

- 2. Assess the eligibility requirements for and the delivery and availability of traumatic brain injury services provided by the department and other state agencies for individuals who have traumatic brain injuries and their family members and caregivers throughout the continuum of care.
- 3. Assess the delivery and availability of services provided by private businesses or entities, including home and community-based services and respite care services, for individuals who have traumatic brain injuries and education and support services to assist family members and caregivers throughout the continuum of care.
- 4. Review and assess the role of the state in providing community-based treatment, long-term care, and family and caregiver support, including respite care and education regarding the ongoing assessment and management of traumatic brain injuries for individuals who have traumatic brain injuries and their family members and caregivers.
- 5. Determine the needs of individuals who have traumatic brain injuries and examine the efficacy of immediate,

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intermediate.	rehabilitative,	and	community	<i>z</i> -based	treatment.
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- 6. Determine strategies for the provision of coordinated care, services, and support to individuals who have traumatic brain injuries and their family members and caregivers, and strategies to address identified gaps in the provision of services.
- 7. Report its findings and recommendations biannually to the council at its meetings and submit an annual written report to the State Surgeon General.
