House Resolution

A resolution designating September 2017 as "Gynecologic Cancer Awareness Month" in Florida.

WHEREAS, gynecologic cancer represents the uncontrolled growth and spread of malignant cells originating in the female reproductive organs, and

WHEREAS, it is estimated that in the United States, 107,470 women will be diagnosed with a gynecologic cancer and approximately 31,600 women will succumb to the disease in 2017, and

WHEREAS, cervical cancer occurs most often in women over the age of 30 and it is estimated that, in 2017, 12,820 new cases of cervical cancer will be diagnosed in the United States and 4,210 women will die from the disease, and

WHEREAS, of all the gynecologic cancers, only cervical cancer has proven prevention and screening tools, including the Papanicolaou test, and

WHEREAS, the Papanicolaou test only screens for cervical cancer, and with no reliable way to screen for any other gynecologic cancer it is important that women recognize warning signs and understand risk reduction strategies, and

WHEREAS, the human papillomavirus (HPV) is the primary cause of the majority of cases of cervical cancer, and that

discovery has resulted in the development and use of a vaccine that could eliminate this disease, and

WHEREAS, uterine cancer, also known as endometrial cancer, starts in the uterus and typically affects women over the age of 50, and

WHEREAS, it is estimated that 61,380 women in the United States will be diagnosed with uterine cancer and 10,920 women will die from this cancer in 2017, and

WHEREAS, ovarian cancer is the deadliest of all the gynecologic cancers and all women are at risk for this cancer, and

WHEREAS, 90 percent of women who get ovarian cancer are over the age of 40, and in 2017, it is estimated that 22,440 new cases will be diagnosed and 14,080 women will die from this form of cancer in the United States, and

WHEREAS, vulvar cancer, often linked to HPV, accounts for approximately 4 percent of cancers of the female reproductive organs and 0.6 percent of all cancers in women, and

WHEREAS, in 2017, it is estimated that 6,020 women in the United States will be diagnosed with vulvar cancer and 1,150 women will die from this disease, and

WHEREAS, each year, approximately 4,810 women in the United States are affected by vaginal cancer and 1,240 women will die from this disease, and while vaginal cancer is very rare, when detected early, treatment of the disease is most effective, and

WHEREAS, recent advances in cancer genetics have led to the identification of genes that may cause significantly increased risk for certain cancers, and

WHEREAS, the purple ribbon is the national symbol for gynecologic cancer awareness, and

WHEREAS, founded in 2011 and based in southwest Florida, the Betty Allen Gynecologic Cancer Foundation is dedicated and actively engaged in providing programs to help increase education and raise awareness about gynecologic cancers in order to save lives, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Florida:

That the Florida House of Representatives commends the Betty Allen Gynecologic Cancer Foundation for its efforts to educate residents in the state about gynecologic cancer and designates September 2017 as "Gynecologic Cancer Awareness Month" in the State of Florida.
