## A RESOLUTION

- 1 Recognizing February 21, 2023, as Dyslexia Day at the state capitol; and for other purposes.
- 2 WHEREAS, dyslexia is a specific learning disability that is neurological in origin; and
- 3 WHEREAS, dyslexia is the most common learning disability, affecting approximately one
- 4 in five individuals and approximately 80 percent of all individuals with a learning disability;
- 5 and
- 6 WHEREAS, the condition is often unexpected because those it affects can have a very high
- 7 level of intelligence but read at a much lower level; and
- 8 WHEREAS, dyslexia causes difficulty with phoneme segmentation, the ability to break
- 9 words down into individual sounds; and
- 10 WHEREAS, an individual with dyslexia may have weaknesses in decoding and reading
- 11 fluency, but they are often surrounded by a sea of strengths in reasoning, problem solving,
- 12 concept formation, critical thinking, and vocabulary; and

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WHEREAS, early diagnosis is critical for early remediation and evidence-based intervention

- 14 that leads to self-awareness, self-empowerment, self-esteem, and necessary accommodations
- 15 to ensure student, school, and life success; and
- 16 WHEREAS, it is abundantly fitting and proper to draw attention to the profound educational
- impact of dyslexia on the education and lives of countless children, adults, and students in
- 18 the State of Georgia.
- 19 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES that
- 20 the members of this body recognize February 21, 2023, as Dyslexia Day at the state capitol.
- 21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Clerk of the House of Representatives is authorized
- 22 and directed to make appropriate copies of this resolution available for distribution to the
- 23 public and the press.
