A RESOLUTION

1 Recognizing and commending Greenbriar Children's Center; and for other purposes.

WHEREAS, because there was no orphanage for black children, for nearly a century
Chatham County black youth were often placed at the old "Brown Farm," a 400 acre county
penal farm, and girls were sent to the Chatham County Protective Home, operated by the
Savannah Federation of Colored Women's Clubs; and

6 WHEREAS, this sad situation persisted until Greenbriar Children's Center was established;7 and

8 WHEREAS, in 1965, Greenbriar began its first outreach program under the auspices of the 9 Economic Opportunity Authority (EOA); under the program, mothers of children too young 10 for day-care centers who wished to attend vocational training classes offered by the EOA 11 could leave their children in private homes under the supervision of Greenbriar; and

WHEREAS, in June of 1970, Greenbriar expanded its services to operate an on-campus
day-care center for 25 children whose mothers were part of the Work Incentive Program of
the Georgia Department of Family and Children's Services; and

WHEREAS, in February of 1971, Windy's Play Skool, an off-campus extension of Greenbriar, opened its doors and became the first day-care facility in Georgia to receive federal funds under Title IV-A of the Social Security Act and, unlike other centers, to accept

18 pre-school children of any age, including infants, so as to keep family members together; and

19 WHEREAS, in 1987, Greenbriar established its second outreach program currently called 20 Family Preservation and Support Services. This was a multiservice program linked to other 21 community agencies to provide intensive counseling within the home. This program was 22 established because it is understood that many community problems involving children are 23 related to deteriorating family relationships. Also, the historical role of the family as the 24 center of cultural continuity and social cohesion might be rescued and preserved through an 25 aggressive, preventive counseling program to strengthen parental skills and family structures; 26 and

WHEREAS, under the leadership of three Executive Directors: Doris E. Roberts 1953-1985;
Yvette Johnson-Hagins 1989-2003; and Gena P. Taylor 2004-current, Greenbriar through its
programs and services has been a beacon of hope and love to thousands of families and
children.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE that the members of this body
recognize and commend Greenbriar Children's Center for the role it has played in preserving
and strengthening families in Chatham County.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Senate is authorized and directed
to make an appropriate copy of this resolution available for distribution to Greenbriar
Children's Center.
