Senate Resolution 755 By: Senators Sims of the 12th and Summers of the 13th

A RESOLUTION

Recognizing March 2024 as Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month and honoring the Georgia
 Colorectal Cancer Control program for its impact on increasing screenings in Federal
 Qualified Health Clinics in Southwest and Southeast Georgia; and for other purposes.

WHEREAS, cancer is the second leading cause of death in Georgia and throughout theUnited States; and

6 WHEREAS, colorectal cancer is the one of the state's deadliest preventable cancers; and

7 WHEREAS, screenings can remove precancerous growths and prevent 60 percent of 8 colorectal cancers, and 90 percent of cases can be cured if detected early; and

9 WHEREAS, the national guidelines for the recommended age to receive colorectal cancer
10 screening was recently decreased from 50 to 45 years of age; and

WHEREAS, the American Cancer Society estimates that there will be 4,940 new cases ofcolorectal cancer diagnosed and 1,660 deaths from this cancer this year in Georgia; and

WHEREAS, Georgia's overall colon cancer screening rate for those between 45 and 75 years
of age is 58 percent, and historically the average rate in Southwest Georgia was 53 percent
and Southeast Georgia was 33 percent; and

WHEREAS, the Georgia Center for Oncology Research and Education (CORE) partnered with the Medical College of Georgia and the School of Public Health at Augusta University, the Albany Area Primary Health Clinic, the East Georgia Healthcare Center, and Horizons Community Solutions and was awarded a five-year cooperative agreement from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to increase screening rates in Southeast and Southwest Georgia; and

WHEREAS, these partners formed the Georgia Colorectal Cancer Control Program
(GCRCCP) in 2020 and have since worked together since to increase awareness and bring
colorectal cancer screenings to uninsured and underinsured patients aged 45 to 75 in three
Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs) through 18 of their clinics; and

WHEREAS, screening rates last year increased from 57 percent to 60 percent in the Southwest GCRCCP clinics and from 33 percent to 44 percent in the Southeast GCRCCP clinics for those aged 50 to 75 as a result of this program; and

WHEREAS, this program is saving the lives of Georgians who may otherwise suffer fromlate-stage colorectal cancer; and

31 WHEREAS, March is recognized nationally as Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE that the members of this body
 recognize March 2024 as Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month and honor the Georgia
