DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

Citations Affected: IC 25-26-25.

Synopsis: Birth control prescriptions. Allows pharmacists to prescribe and dispense self-administered oral hormonal contraceptives and hormonal contraceptive patches (contraceptives). Establishes requirements for pharmacists who want to prescribe and dispense contraceptives. Requires health plans to provide coverage for contraceptives and certain services. Establishes an exception for nonprofit religious employers.

Effective: July 1, 2020.

HOUSE BILL No. 1141

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning professions and occupations.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. IC 25-26-25 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE
AS A NEW CHAPTER TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
JULY 1, 2020]:
Chapter 25. Hormonal Contraceptives
Sec. 1. The definitions in IC 25-26-13-2 apply to this chapter.
Sec. 2. As used in this section, "health plan" means:
(1) a policy of accident and sickness insurance (as defined in
IC 27-8-5-1); or
(2) an individual contract or a group contract with a health
maintenance organization under IC 27-13.
Sec. 3. As used in this chapter, "hormonal contraceptive patch"
means a transdermal patch applied to the skin of a patient, by the
patient or by a pharmacist, that releases a drug composed of a
combination of hormones that is approved by the federal Food and
Drug Administration to prevent pregnancy.
Sec. 4. As used in this chapter, "self-administered oral hormonal
contraceptive" means a drug:



1	(1) composed of a hormone or a combination of hormones
2	that is approved by the federal Food and Drug Administration
3	to prevent pregnancy; and
4	(2) that the patient to whom the drug is prescribed may take
5	orally to administer to oneself.
6	The term includes hormonal contraceptive patches and hormonal
7	contraceptive pills.
8	Sec. 5. A pharmacist may prescribe and dispense hormonal
9	contraceptive patches and self-administered oral hormonal
10	contraceptives to a person who is at least eighteen (18) years of age,
l 1	regardless of whether the person has evidence of a previous
12	prescription from a primary care practitioner or women's health
13	care practitioner for a hormonal contraceptive patch or
14	self-administered oral hormonal contraceptive.
15	Sec. 6. (a) The board shall adopt rules under IC 4-22-2 to
16	establish, in consultation with the medical licensing board of
17	Indiana, the Indiana state board of nursing, and the state
18	department of health, and in consideration of guidelines
19	established by the American Congress of Obstetricians and
20	Gynecologists, standard procedures for the prescribing of
21	hormonal contraceptive patches and self-administered oral
22	hormonal contraceptives by pharmacists.
23	(b) The rules adopted under this section must require a
24	pharmacist to do the following:
25	(1) Complete a training program approved by the board that
26	is related to prescribing hormonal contraceptive patches and
27	self-administered oral hormonal contraceptives. The board
28	may adopt a training program developed by another state.
29	(2) Provide a self-screening risk assessment tool that the
30	patient must use prior to the pharmacist's prescribing the
31	hormonal contraceptive patch or self-administered oral
32	hormonal contraceptive.
33	(3) Refer the patient to the patient's primary care practitioner
34	or women's health care practitioner upon prescribing and
35	dispensing the hormonal contraceptive patch or
36	self-administered oral hormonal contraceptive.
37	(4) Provide the patient with a written record of the hormonal
38	contraceptive patch or the self-administered oral hormonal
39	contraceptive prescribed and dispensed and advise the patient
10	to consult with a primary care practitioner or women's health
11	care practitioner.
12	(5) Dispense the hormonal contraceptive patch or



1	self-administered oral hormonal contraceptive to the patient
2	as soon as practicable after the pharmacist issues the
3	prescription.
4	(c) The rules adopted under this section must prohibit a
5	pharmacist from the following:
6	(1) Requiring a patient to schedule an appointment with the
7	pharmacist for the prescribing or dispensing of a hormonal
8	contraceptive patch or self-administered oral hormonal
9	contraceptive.
10	(2) Prescribing and dispensing a hormonal contraceptive
11	patch or self-administered oral hormonal contraceptive to a
12	patient who does not have evidence of a clinical visit for
13	women's health within the three (3) years immediately
14	following the initial prescription and dispensation of a
15	hormonal contraceptive patch or self-administered oral
16	hormonal contraceptive by a pharmacist to the patient.
17	(d) All state and federal laws governing insurance coverage of
18	contraceptive drugs, devices, products and services apply to
19	hormonal contraceptive patches and self-administered oral
20	hormonal contraceptives prescribed by a pharmacist under this
21	section.
22	Sec. 7. (a) A health plan must provide payment, coverage, or
23	reimbursement for:
24	(1) prescription contraceptives; and
25	(2) if covered for other drug benefits by the health plan,
26	outpatient consultations, including pharmacist consultations,
27	examinations, procedures, and medical services that are
28	necessary to prescribe, dispense, deliver, or distribute a
29	prescription contraceptive.
30	(b) The coverage required in subsection (a):
31	(1) may be subject to provisions of the health plan that apply
32	equally to other prescription drugs covered by the health
33	plan, including required copayments, deductibles, and
34	coinsurance; and
35	(2) must reimburse a health care provider or dispensing entity
36	for a dispensing of contraceptives intended to last for a:
37	(A) three (3) month period for the first dispensing of the
38	contraceptive to the patient; and
39	(B) twelve (12) month period for subsequent dispensings of
40	the same contraceptive to the patient regardless of whether
41	the insured was enrolled in the program, plan, or policy at
42	the time of the first dispensing.



1	(c) A religious employer that is a nonprofit organization under
2	Section 6033(a)(3)(A)(i) or Section 6033(a)(3)(A)(iii) of the Internal
3	Revenue Code is exempt from the requirements of this section with
4	respect to a health plan it provides to its employees.
