## DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

Citations Affected: IC 14-19-1-1.5.

**Synopsis:** Statewide trail policy. Requires the division of outdoor recreation of the department of natural resources to develop a statewide recreational trail policy to address the following issues as they relate to recreational trails: (1) Clear statement of ownership and management of each trail. (2) Right-of-way inconsistencies. (3) Fence line issues. (4) Drainage issues, including tile drains. (5) Tree and brush control. (6) Weed and mowing issues. (7) Law enforcement jurisdiction issues. (8) Signage issues. (9) Conflict resolution procedures. (10) Appeal procedures.

Effective: July 1, 2015.

## **HOUSE BILL No. 1471**

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning natural and cultural resources.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. IC 14-19-1-1.5 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE
AS A <b>NEW</b> SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY
1, 2015]: Sec. 1.5. (a) Before October 1, 2015, the department shall,
through the division of outdoor recreation, develop a statewide
recreational trail policy and amend the policy as necessary or
advisable thereafter. The policy must address at least the following
issues:
(1) Clear statement of ownership and management of each
trail.
(2) Right-of-way inconsistencies.
(3) The division of responsibility for maintenance of fences,
for drainage, and for maintenance of drainage or drain tiles.
(4) Tree, weed, and brush removal between responsible
parties and landowners adjacent to recreational trails.
(5) Mowing responsibility.

5	(b) In developing the recreational trail policy described in
6	subsection (a), the division shall consult with various groups
