1	A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION urging the President of the United States to
2	designate a state funeral for the last surviving Medal of Honor recipient from World War
3	II.
4	WHEREAS, World War II lasted from 1939 until 1945, and the United States
5	entered the war in 1941 following the attack on Pearl Harbor; and
6	WHEREAS, over 16 million Americans served their country and the Allied powers
7	over the course of the war; and
8	WHEREAS, the generation of men and women who served our country in World
9	War II has been called "the greatest generation" for their selfless sacrifice; and
10	WHEREAS, the Medal of Honor is the highest military decoration that is awarded
11	by the United States government; and
12	WHEREAS, the Medal of Honor is presented by the President of the United States,
13	in the name of Congress; and
14	WHEREAS, the Medal of Honor is only conferred upon members of the United
15	States Armed Forces who distinguish themselves through conspicuous gallantry and
16	intrepidity at the risk of life above and beyond the call of duty while engaged in action
17	against an enemy of the United States, while engaged in military operations involving
18	conflict with an opposing foreign force, or while serving with friendly forces engaged in
19	an armed conflict against an opposing armed force in which the United States is not a
20	belligerent party; and
21	WHEREAS, more than 3,400 Medals of Honor have been awarded to our nation's
22	bravest soldiers, sailors, airmen, marines, and coast guardsmen since the creation of the
23	award in 1861; and
24	WHEREAS, the Medal of Honor was awarded to 353 Americans during World War
25	II and only four of those 353 Americans are alive today; and
26	WHEREAS, Charles H. Coolidge of Tennessee, Francis S. Currey of New York,
27	Robert D. Maxwell of Oregon, and Hershel W. Williams of West Virginia all served their

- country with conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of life and therefore deserve
 the gratitude of the American people; and
- 3 WHEREAS, the President of the United States has the sole authority to designate a 4 state funeral: and
- 5 WHEREAS, historically, the President of the United States has designated state 6 funerals for former presidents, generals, and other extraordinary Americans; and

WHEREAS, designating a state funeral when the last surviving World War II
Medal of Honor recipient dies would be a wonderful way for the American people to
unite and honor all 16 million soldiers, sailors, and airmen who served in our Armed
Forces from 1941 to 1945.

11 NOW, THEREFORE,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, the Senate concurring therein:

Section 1. The members of the House of Representatives and the Senate of the
Commonwealth of Kentucky hereby urge the President of the United States to designate a
state funeral for the last surviving Medal of Honor recipient from World War II.
