1 A RESOLUTION recognizing March 2024 as Irish American Heritage Month for 2 the Commonwealth of Kentucky. 3 WHEREAS, from our country's earliest days, Irish immigrants and their 4 descendants have contributed leadership, wisdom, and vitality to not only Kentucky but 5 America as a whole. Through nine signers of the Declaration of Independence and 23 6 Presidents with Irish roots, Irish Americans have made an indelible mark in the shaping 7 of the great city of Louisville and the Commonwealth of Kentucky; and 8 WHEREAS, throughout their long history, the Irish have been ardent in their 9 passion for liberty, their hatred of oppression, and renowned for their loyalty. The Irish 10 have from the beginning been prominent in the defense of this nation. Twenty of George 11 Washington's generals and an estimated quarter of his Continental Army were composed 12 of Irish Americans. The first officer commissioned by Washington in the newly formed 13 Navy was an Irishman named John Barry, who became Commodore of the Continental 14 Navy; and 15 WHEREAS, in 1804, pirates had attacked the United States Navy and civilian ships 16 were kidnapped and imprisoned in Derne and Tripoli. When negotiations to pay a ransom 17 of \$100,000 failed to gain their release and the American flag staff was cut down in front 18 of the United States Consulate, war was declared against Tripoli. On April 27, 1805, 19 Lieutenant Presley O'Bannon of Kentucky led a charge passing through a shower of 20 enemy gunfire and took possession of enemy batteries, posting an American flag on its 21 ramparts and turning the guns on the enemy. Victory was won in the ensuing two-hour 22 battle and for the first time in United States history, an American flag flew over a fortress 23 of the Old World. O'Bannon's deeds are remembered in the Marine Corps Hymn and the 24 flag of the Corps, and the sword used in the dress uniform of the Corps is a copy of the 25 one presented to O'Bannon by Hamet, a chieftain and ally of the United States in the 26 Mediterranean. The final resting place of Lieutenant O'Bannon is the cemetery on the hill 27 overlooking our State Capitol in Frankfort; and

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WHEREAS, Ralph Waldo Rose, born in Louisville in 1885 of Irish parents,
attended the University of Michigan on scholarship to compete on the track team in the
shotput, discus, and hammer throw. In 1904, Rose competed in the Olympics in St. Louis
winning a gold, silver, and bronze medal in these events respectively. Rose was selected
by the 1908 Olympic Committee to carry the United States flag in the opening
ceremonies in the Summer Olympics in London. When passing King Edward the
Seventh, Rose broke tradition and refused to dip the flag to the British King. No United
States flag has ever been dipped to any monarch since; and
WHEREAS, on Election Day August 6, 1855, in Louisville, Kentucky, numerous
Irish were among the immigrants who were brutally murdered. The crimes occurred as
the immigrants were trying to go to the polls to cast their ballots in attacks orchestrated
by a local political group known as the "Know Nothings," because they felt that the large
influx of immigrants would "undermine the American way of life"; and
WHEREAS, the Irish community of Louisville has a distinguished tradition of
putting on the St. Patrick's Parade, a 501(c)(3) charity event hosted by the Ancient Order
of Hibernians, the Saturday before St. Patrick's Day on March 17, thereby renewing their
connections to the land of their ancestry as they pass along the traditions of the Irish
people to the next generation and celebrating their pride, heritage, and charitable giving
with the community irrespective of ethnicity; and
WHEREAS, a new Hibernian division was established in 2018 in Lexington and
named for Dr. Pearse Lyons, Irish founder of Alltech in Nicholasville, a large employer
in the Commonwealth and the first naming sponsor of the World Equestrian Games when
it came to the United States and to Kentucky for the first time in 2010 and whereas the St.
Patrick's Day parade in Lexington, begun in 1980 and produced by the city's Department
of Parks and Recreation with support of local business and cultural organizations, is the
longest-running citywide civic event in the city; and

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WHEREAS, it is fitting and proper to celebrate the rich culture, heritage, and

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valuable contributions of the Irish people during the month of March, when people of

- 2 Irish descent celebrate the Patron Saint of Ireland, St. Patrick, on March 17;
- 3 NOW, THEREFORE,
- 4 Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the
- 5 Commonwealth of Kentucky:
- 6 → Section 1. Due to the overwhelming number of citizens within the
- 7 Commonwealth of Kentucky who are Irish or are descendants of Irish immigrants and the
- 8 tremendous contributions of Irish Americans to our nation, our Commonwealth, and our
- 9 communities, the House of Representatives hereby recognizes March as Irish American
- 10 Heritage Month for Kentucky.
