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1	AN ACT relating to wildlife rehabilitation.
2	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:
3	→Section 1. KRS 150.280 is amended to read as follows:
4	(1) As used in this section:
5	(a) ''Ambassador animal'' means an animal that:
6	<u>1. A licensed Kentucky veterinarian has certified in writing is</u>
7	nonreleasable;
8	2. A permit holder has certified in writing does not currently carry rabies
9	and is inoculated against rabies;
10	3. A permit holder has certified in writing is free from any disease or
11	ailment which may be harmful to a person or animal that comes in
12	contact with that animal;
13	4. Is housed and maintained under the supervision of a permit holder;
14	and
15	5. Is exhibited and displayed by a permit holder for wildlife conservation
16	and rehabilitation education purposes;
17	(b) ''Permit holder'' means a holder of a valid wildlife rehabilitation permit
18	issued by the department;
19	(c) ''Volunteer'' means a person who assists a permit holder with wildlife
20	rehabilitation and is certified in writing by the permit holder to be:
21	<u>1.</u> Trained by a permit holder in wildlife rehabilitation;
22	2. Inoculated against rabies, if they are working with rabies vector
23	species; and
24	3. Supervised by the permit holder any time that the volunteer performs
25	wildlife rehabilitation work; and
26	(d) ''Wildlife rehabilitation'' means the process of obtaining, rescuing, raising,
27	providing supportive care, regularly transporting, and arranging for

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1		veterinary medical care of orphaned, sick, displaced, or injured wildlife with
2		the goal of releasing the wildlife back into its natural habitat.
3	<u>(2)</u> [(1)]	Except as provided by administrative regulation, a person shall not propagate
4	or he	old protected wildlife without obtaining a permit to do so from the department.
5	The	department shall promulgate administrative regulations governing all such
6	activ	vity and prescribing permit fees. Any permit issued pursuant to this section may
7	be re	evoked for a violation by the holder thereof of any of the provisions of this
8	chap	ter, any administrative regulation of the department, or hunting, fishing, or
9	wild	life laws of the federal government.
10	<u>(3)[(2)]</u>	The department shall by administrative regulation identify species of wildlife
11	pote	ntially damaging to native ecosystems and shall prohibit the transporting or
12	hold	ing of these wildlife.
13	<u>(4) Any</u>	administrative regulation promulgated under this chapter relating to wildlife
14	<u>reha</u>	bilitation shall be subject to the following requirements and limitations:
15	<u>(a)</u>	Permit holders may house and maintain nonreleasable wildlife as
16		ambassador animals for wildlife conservation and rehabilitation education
17		purposes. Ambassador animals shall be exempt from all administrative
18		regulations regarding exhibit and display restrictions, release requirements,
19		restrictions on housing and maintaining wildlife, including rabies vector
20		species, and any requirements and restrictions regarding release of wildlife;
21	<u>(b)</u>	Volunteers may assist permit holders in all areas of wildlife rehabilitation.
22		Volunteers shall be exempt from the restrictions that apply to persons who
23		do not hold permits and may perform all wildlife rehabilitation duties
24		available to permit holders;
25	<u>(c)</u>	A permit holder shall release wildlife immediately upon recovery from
26		injury or illness, when of a suitable age to reasonably survive in the wild,
27		and into an appropriate habitat for that species, subject to the following

1	<u>requirements:</u>
2	1. A permit holder shall only keep wildlife in a rehabilitation facility for
3	the amount of time necessary to achieve a reasonable expectation of
4	survivability for that particular species. A stay in rehabilitation facility
5	shall not exceed one hundred eighty (180) days unless:
6	a. A licensed Kentucky veterinarian certifies in writing that the
7	animal is nonreleasable;
8	b. A permit holder certifies in writing that, upon one hundred
9	eighty (180) days in captivity, the weather or environmental
10	conditions of the habitat in which the animal should be released
11	<u>are not suitable or appropriate for release and require an</u>
12	extension of stay; or
13	c. Written documentation from the United States Fish and Wildlife
14	Service is provided; and
15	2. Wildlife shall be released at the time and location that is most
16	appropriate for survival of that species. If the permit holder chooses to
17	depart from any release guidelines found in administrative regulations
18	promulgated under this chapter, the permit holder shall certify in
19	writing to the department his or her reason for departing from the
20	guidelines; and
21	(d) A permit holder may possess, rehabilitate, or attempt to rehabilitate a rabies
22	vector species, regardless of the location of the rehabilitation facility and
23	the collection location of the animal if the permit holder has been
24	inoculated against rabies.
