9		recruitment and providing incentives, waiving administrative regulations
10		when needed, and other assistance as deemed necessary;
11	(e)	Discontinue approval of programs that do not meet standards or whose

13	(f)	Issue, renew, revoke, suspend, or refuse to issue or renew; impose

Programs or campuses of any out-of-state postsecondary education institution 5 (c) 6 that is licensed by the Council on Postsecondary Education to operate in 7 Kentucky and whose institutional programs are not composed solely of 8 sectarian instruction, but in which accreditation by the Southern Association 9 of Colleges and Schools is not an option, shall be reviewed and approved by 10 the Council on Postsecondary Education based on accreditation criteria that 11 mirrors Southern Association of Colleges and Schools accreditation criteria in 12 order to qualify as an eligible institution in which a student may enroll and 13 receive a Kentucky tuition grant. All costs associated with the institutional 14 reviews shall be the responsibility of the institution seeking approval by the 15 council. The Council on Postsecondary Education shall promulgate 16 administrative regulations in accordance with KRS Chapter 13A to carry out 17 the provisions of this paragraph.

18 Section 3. West Louisville Historically Black Colleges and Universities Pilot 19 **Project:** Kentucky State University shall explore and pursue opportunities to partner with 20 any other historically black college or university in the Commonwealth to offer courses 21 during each fall, spring, and summer academic sessions. These courses shall include, but 22 not be limited to onsite, in-person courses delivered by Kentucky State University at or in 23 conjunction with any other historically black college or university in the Commonwealth. 24 The courses shall include dual credit courses for high school students, undergraduate 25 level courses, graduate level courses, and courses for credit toward certificates and 26 badges. The course credits shall be transferrable in and between Kentucky State 27 University and any other historically black college or university in the Commonwealth,

even if the course credits are not expressly articulated for other colleges or universities in the Commonwealth. Any memorandum of understanding or memorandum of agreement between Kentucky State University and any other historically black college or university in the Commonwealth shall be submitted to the Council on Postsecondary Education for review. Kentucky State University and the Council on Postsecondary Education shall submit a report on the results of the pilot project, including but not limited to the number of students served, to the Interim Joint Committee on Education by September 1, 2022.

8 → Section 4. West Louisville Health and Wellness Pilot Project: The Kentucky 9 State University shall partner with the Cabinet for Health and Family Services and any 10 other historically black college or university (HBCU) in the Commonwealth to design and 11 implement a pilot project to help address issues of health education, wellness, and food 12 insecurity in African-American communities encompassing or adjacent to an HBCU in 13 West Louisville. Kentucky State University shall make referrals for community 14 employment services and shall coordinate with the Cabinet for Health and Family 15 Services to assist with the delivery of public assistance, social support services, and 16 health and nutrition services to anyone eligible for such assistance and services. The 17 Cabinet for Health and Family Services may utilize a service delivery model as used in 18 the Neighborhood Place or a similar model which is deemed effective to implement the 19 pilot project. The Kentucky State University and the Cabinet for Health and Family 20 Services shall submit a report on the results of the West Louisville Health and Wellness 21 Pilot Project, including but not limited to the number of individuals served and the types 22 of services provided to the Interim Joint Committee on Health, Welfare, and Family 23 Services by September 1, 2022.

24 → Section 5. The pilot programs created in Sections 3 and 4 of this Act are
25 mandated programs.

26 → Section 6. There is hereby appropriated General Fund moneys in the amount of
27 \$200,000 for fiscal year 2021-2022 to Kentucky State University for the purpose of

1 implementing the pilot programs created in Sections 3 and 4 of this Act.
