1	A RESOLUTION recognizing the 50th anniversary of the merger of Lexington and
2	Fayette County.
3	WHEREAS, the city of Lexington was founded in 1775, and Fayette County was
4	founded in 1780; and
5	WHEREAS, after almost 200 years of prosperity and growth, it was recognized by
6	city leaders that efficiencies could be gained and certain problems minimized if the city
7	and the county worked more closely together; and
8	WHEREAS, the blueprints for merger were drafted by bold and courageous leaders,
9	each of whom had to deal with a myriad of technical concerns arising during the multi-
10	year process; and
11	WHEREAS, in 1972, the voters, by a margin exceeding 70 percent, approved the
12	merger of Lexington and Fayette County and the charter that would dictate how the
13	merged government operated; and
14	WHEREAS, on January 1, 1974, the merger became effective, making Lexington-
15	Fayette Urban-County Government the first merged government in Kentucky, with
16	Foster Pettit becoming its first mayor; and
17	WHEREAS, the work of those original leaders, and the leaders following them, has
18	promoted an efficient government while avoiding duplicative services; and
19	WHEREAS, the leadership of Lexington-Fayette Urban-County Government
20	hosted a commemoration of its founding on March 21, 2024;
21	NOW, THEREFORE,
22	Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of
23	Kentucky:
24	→ Section 1. The Senate recognizes the 50th anniversary of the founding of the
25	Lexington-Fayette Urban-County Government and furthermore commends its leadership,
26	both past and present, for providing its citizens with a prosperous, scenic, and history-rich
27	home in which to work and live.
