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COLLEGES/UNIVERSITIES. Creates scholarships for spouses of police officers killed or disabled in performance of duty and police officers injured in performance of duty. (gov sig)

AN ACT

2 To enact R.S. 17:1681(G) and 1681.2, relative to scholarships for spouses of police officers killed or disabled in performance of duty; to provide for definitions; to provide for 3 scholarship requirements; and to provide for related matters. 4 5 Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana: Section 1. R.S. 17:1681(G) and 1681.2 are hereby enacted to read as follows: 6 7 §1681. Children of police officers and deputy sheriffs; definitions 8 9 G. "Spouse" means the wife or husband of the police officer or deputy sheriff who is living in the same household and who is dependent upon the 10 11 police officer or deputy sheriff for support if the police officer or deputy sheriff is alive and permanently disabled. Spouse also means the wife or husband of a 12 13 police officer or deputy sheriff who is deceased and who was living in the same household and was dependent upon the police officer or deputy sheriff for 14 support at the time of the injury which resulted in the police officer or deputy 15 16 sheriff's death.

§1681.2. Scholarships for spouses of police officers killed or disabled in performance of duty

A. The spouse of a police officer who is injured in the course and scope of the performance of his duties and the injury causes death or serious injury resulting in an inability to be employed, which spouse is otherwise eligible and meets all of the entrance requirements of a college or university, shall be admitted to a college or university without the payment of any fees, tuition, or other charges, including room and board charges. As long as the spouse meets the academic requirements and maintains a "C" average for each semester and complies with the rules and regulations of the college or university required for attendance, as a full-time student, the spouse shall receive the exemption. The exemption shall exist for the spouse for the number of semesters required of a full-time student to obtain one bachelor degree offered by the college or university. In addition, the spouse shall be entitled to a cash grant of two hundred fifty dollars per semester from the college or university as an allowance for books and all of the above sums shall be paid out of funds appropriated from the general fund of the state of Louisiana.

B. In no event shall any spouse be allowed more than ten semesters under the provisions of this Section.

C. Any police officer who is injured in the performance of duties as a police officer and such injury results in an inability to be employed, and the police officer is otherwise eligible and meets all of the entrance requirements of a college or university, such police officer shall be admitted to such college or university without the payment of any fees, tuition, or other charges, including room and board charges, as long as such police officer meets the academic requirements and maintains a "C" average for each semester and complies with the rules and regulations of such college or university required for attendance therein as a full-time student. Such exemption shall exist for such police officer for the number of semesters required of a full-time student to obtain one

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1 bachelor degree offered by such college or university. In addition thereto, such 2 police officer shall be entitled to a cash grant of two hundred fifty dollars per 3 semester from such college or university as an allowance for books and all of the 4 above sums shall be paid out of funds appropriated from the general fund of the 5 state of Louisiana. D. In no event shall any injured police officer be allowed more than ten 6 7 semesters under the provisions of this Section. 8 Section 2. This Act shall become effective upon signature by the governor or, if not 9 signed by the governor, upon expiration of the time for bills to become law without signature 10 by the governor, as provided by Article III, Section 18 of the Constitution of Louisiana. If 11 vetoed by the governor and subsequently approved by the legislature, this Act shall become 12 effective on the day following such approval.

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<u>Proposed law</u> defines "spouse" to mean the wife or husband of the police officer or deputy sheriff living in the same household with and dependent upon the police officer or deputy sheriff for support. <u>Proposed law</u> further defines "spouse" to mean the wife or husband of a police officer or deputy sheriff who is deceased and who was living in the same household and was dependent upon the police officer or deputy sheriff for support at the time of the injury which resulted in the police officer or deputy sheriff's death.

<u>Present law</u> (R.S. 17:1681.1) provides scholarships for the children of police officers, deputy sheriffs, or certain probation and parole officers killed or permanently disabled in performance of duty.

<u>Proposed law</u> retains <u>present law</u> and provides that the spouse of a police officer injured in the course and scope of the performance of his duties, which injury causes death or serious injury resulting in an inability to be employed, and if the spouse is otherwise eligible and meets all of the entrance requirements of a college or university, shall be awarded a scholarship for not more than 10 semesters which covers all fees, tuition, or other charges, including room and board charges. In order to maintain the scholarship the spouse must meet the academic requirements and maintain a "C" average for each semester and maintain full-time status as a student.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides that the spouse be entitled to a cash grant of \$250 per semester from the college or university as an allowance for books.

<u>Proposed law</u> requires that the scholarship can not exceed 10 semesters.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides that a police officer who is injured in the performance of duties as a police officer and such injury results in an inability to be employed, and if the police

officer is otherwise eligible and meets all of the entrance requirements of a college or university, shall be awarded a scholarship for not more than 10 semesters which covers all fees, tuition, or other charges, including room and board charges. In order to maintain the scholarship the police officer must meet the academic requirements and maintain a "C" average for each semester and maintain full-time status as a student.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides that the police officer be entitled to a cash grant of \$250 per semester from the college or university as an allowance for books.

Effective upon signature of the governor or lapse of time for gubernatorial action.
