The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the One Hundred and Ninety-First General Court (2019-2020)

An Act to reduce barriers to education and career opportunities.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

Subsection (i) of section 1D of chapter 69 of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2016 Official Edition, is hereby amended by inserting after the second sentence, in line 64, the following sentence:-

"Students who have demonstrated competency under this section by passing the state's assessment tests, the Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System, and any successors thereto, shall be granted a Commonwealth Diploma issued by the state department of education. Students who have demonstrated competency under this section by meeting the academic standards and curriculum frameworks enumerated in this section by satisfying the requirements of their local school committee shall be granted a Horace Mann Diploma issued by the local

school committee. Students may receive both diplomas. Issuance of either the Commonwealth

Diploma or the Horace Mann Diploma will certify that a student has met the competency

determination described in this section and will entitle a student to all the rights and privileges of

13 high school graduation.".

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
