5 6 7 8	(a) A license holder or agent or employee of the license holder may sell alcoholic beverages only in a room having at least one plain glass window or door that allows an individual standing on the outside to observe the interior of the licensed premises [at] DURING all hours OF OPERATION .
9 10	(b) (1) [The] DURING ALL HOURS OF OPERATION, THE view afforded by the window or door may not be obstructed.
