Resolve, to Establish the Blue Ribbon Commission to Make Recommendations to Update Laws Governing the Continuum of Long-term Care Options

**Emergency preamble.** Whereas, acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

**Whereas,** the State's system of care to serve those who need residential supports or long-term care is failing to meet the needs of the State's population, resulting in hospitalized patients using inpatient beds when they need lower levels of care; and

Whereas, nursing facilities, assisted living facilities and other residential options that are intended to meet the needs of individuals who can no longer live safely at home are unable to provide adequate access as a result of the closure of facilities and reduced bed capacity due to financial and labor market pressures; and

**Whereas,** Maine's laws governing residential supports have not been reviewed in over a decade; and

Whereas, immediate review of the laws governing residential supports is necessary in order to prevent more facility closures and bed capacity reduction; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

- **Sec. 1. Blue Ribbon Commission established. Resolved:** That the Blue Ribbon Commission to Make Recommendations to Update Laws Governing the Continuum of Long-term Care Options, referred to in this resolve as "the Blue Ribbon Commission," is established.
- **Sec. 2. Blue Ribbon Commission membership. Resolved:** That, notwithstanding Joint Rule 353, the Blue Ribbon Commission consists of 11 members as follows:
- 1. The executive director of the long-term care ombudsman program as established in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 22, section 5106, subsection 11-C or the executive director's designee;
- 2. Two members appointed by the President of the Senate who represent nursing facilities;
- 3. One member appointed by the President of the Senate who represents assisted living providers;
- 4. Two members appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives who represent an organization that represents hospitals;
- 5. One member appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives who represents families with experience with the continuum of long-term care in the State;
- 6. One member appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives who represents an organization that advocates on aging issues;
- 7. One member appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives who is associated with a veterans' organization;
  - 8. One member appointed by the Governor who represents the executive branch; and

9. One member appointed by the Governor who is a physician and who represents medical directors of long-term care facilities.

- **Sec. 3. Chairs. Resolved:** That, notwithstanding Joint Rule 353, the first-named member appointed by the President of the Senate and the first-named member appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives serve as chairs of the Blue Ribbon Commission.
- **Sec. 4. Appointments; convening of the Blue Ribbon Commission. Resolved:** That all appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the effective date of this resolve. The appointing authorities shall notify the Executive Director of the Legislative Council once all appointments have been completed. After appointment of all members, the chairs shall call and convene the first meeting of the Blue Ribbon Commission. If 30 days or more after the effective date of this resolve a majority of but not all appointments have been made, the chairs may request authority and the Legislative Council may grant authority for the Blue Ribbon Commission to meet and conduct its business.
- **Sec. 5. Duties. Resolved:** That the Blue Ribbon Commission shall review the laws governing residential options for individuals in need of residential supports, including but not limited to long-term care, assisted living facilities and other licensed residential options, and make recommendations to the Legislature on changes to the State's laws in order to reflect the State's changing demographics and labor market conditions and to ensure that the State has the capacity to meet the current and future needs for people needing residential supports. The Blue Ribbon Commission shall review:
- 1. The demographics of the State and projected need for different levels of residential supports, including but not limited to bed capacity at each level of support within a hospital service area over the next 10 years;
- 2. The needs of the State's current population needing residential supports and the barriers to accessing appropriate levels of care;
- 3. Labor market conditions for residential supports, including projections over the next 10 years;
- 4. Laws governing clinical assessments and admission requirements for different levels of residential supports;
  - 5. Laws governing MaineCare coverage and payment;
- 6. Laws governing the growth of long-term care facilities, including but not limited to certificate of need requirements and so-called budget neutrality; and
- 7. Laws governing home care and hospice services to ensure that the State is maximizing the use of those services.
- **Sec. 6. Staff assistance. Resolved:** That, notwithstanding Joint Rule 353, the Legislative Council shall provide necessary staffing services to the Blue Ribbon Commission, except that Legislative Council staff support is not authorized when the Legislature is in regular or special session.

**Sec. 7. Report. Resolved:** That, no later than December 6, 2023, the Blue Ribbon Commission shall submit a report that includes its findings and recommendations, including suggested legislation, to the Second Regular Session of the 131st Legislature.

**Emergency clause.** In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this legislation takes effect when approved.

6 SUMMARY
