1.7	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.8	Section 1. [120B.25] HOLOCAUST, GENOCIDE OF INDIGENOUS PEOPLES,
1.9	AND OTHER GENOCIDE EDUCATION.
1.10	Subdivision 1. Definitions. (a) "Holocaust and genocide studies" means interdisciplinary
1.11	teaching and learning about the causes, impacts, and legacies of the Holocaust, other
1.12	genocides, and incidents of mass violence.
1.13	(b) The "Holocaust" was the systematic, state-sponsored persecution and murder of
1.14	6,000,000 Jews by the Nazi regime and its allies and collaborators.
1.15	(c) "Genocide" means an internationally recognized crime where acts are committed
1.16	with the intent to destroy, in whole or in part, a national, ethnic, racial, or religious group.
1.17	Acts of genocide, as defined by the United Nations and the Rome Statute, include the
1.18	following categories:
1.19	(1) killing members of the group;
1.20	(2) causing serious bodily or mental harm to members of the group;
1.21	(3) deliberately inflicting on the group conditions of life calculated to bring about its
1.22	physical destruction in whole or in part;

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2.1	(4) imposing measures intended to prevent births within the group; or
2.2	(5) forcibly transferring children of the group to another group.
2.3	Genocide also means a series of purposeful actions by a perpetrator or perpetrators to destroy
2.4	a collectivity through mass or selective murders of group members and suppressing the
2.5	biological and social reproduction of the collectivity. The perpetrator or perpetrators may
2.6	represent the state of the victim, another state, or another collectivity.
2.7	(d) "Incidents of mass violence" means extreme violence deliberately inflicted on a large
2.8	scale on civilians or noncombatants by state or nonstate actors. Incidents of mass violence
2.9	encompass the international crimes of genocide, crimes against humanity, war crimes, and
2.10	terrorism.
2.11	(e) "Center for Holocaust and Genocide Studies" means the Center for Holocaust and
2.12	Genocide Studies at the University of Minnesota.
2.13	Subd. 2. Requirements. (a) A school district must, at a minimum, offer as part of its
2.14	social studies curriculum for middle and high school education on the Holocaust, genocide
2.15	of Indigenous Peoples, and other genocides. Curriculum must:
2.16	(1) examine the history of the genocide of Indigenous Peoples and Indigenous remova
2.17	from Minnesota, including the genocide, dispossession, and forced removal of the Dakota
2.18	Ojibwe, and Ho-Chunk;
2.19	(2) analyze the connections between World War II, nationalism, fascism, antisemitism
2.20	and the Holocaust;
2.21	(3) analyze how individuals, groups, and societies around the world have been affected
2.22	by genocide, such as the genocide of Indigenous Peoples in the Americas and throughout
2.23	the world; Black genocide in the United States and the Americas; the genocide in German
2.24	Southwest Africa; Armenian genocide; the genocide of the Ukrainian people from 1932 to
2.25	1933, also known as the Holodomor; the Holocaust, including non-Jewish victims of Naz
2.26	persecution and genocide; Cambodian genocide; Guatemalan genocide; Rwandan genocide
2.27	genocide in the former Yugoslavia; genocide in Darfur; Rohingya genocide; and other
2.28	historical and contemporary cases of genocide and mass violence, especially those
2.29	experienced by communities expelled from, resettled in, migrated to, or living in Minnesota

4.13	in the United States and the Americas; the genocide in German Southwest Africa; Armenian
4.14	genocide; the genocide of the Ukrainian people from 1932 to 1933, also known as the

4.16	Cambodian genocide; Guatemalan genocide; Rwandan genocide; genocide in the former

4.19	(7) at least one public middle or high school social studies teacher with experience

4 32	Subd 2 Working group duties. (a) The working group must

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5.1	(1) advise the commissioner during the development of the social studies glossary
5.2	regarding the definitions of "Holocaust," "genocide," and "incidents of mass violence";
5.3	(2) identify professional learning opportunities for teachers and public school district
5.4	staff, including opportunities for continuing education to facilitate implementation of
5.5	education requirements under Minnesota Statutes, section 120B.25;
5.6	(3) identify training materials, strategies, skills, content, and resources for teachers and
5.7	public school district staff to successfully implement the education requirements under
5.8	Minnesota Statutes, section 120B.25;
5.9	(4) develop model lesson plans that teachers and public school district staff may use to
5.10	successfully implement the education requirements under Minnesota Statutes, section
5.11	<u>120B.25;</u>
5.12	(5) create a work plan that outlines the timeline to fulfill its duties under this subdivision;
5.13	(6) provide to the commissioner of education a list of recommended professional learning
5.14	opportunities, resources, strategies, skills, content, model lesson plans, and other materials
5.15	developed under this subdivision by May 1, 2025;
5.16	(7) coordinate with the commissioner to update the material and resources. The
5.17	commissioner must make all reasonable efforts to make the recommended materials publicly
5.18	available on the department's website by September 1, 2025, and in coordination with the
5.19	working group, must update the materials and resources; and
5.20	(8) by November 15, 2025, submit to the chairs and ranking minority members of the
5.21	committees of the senate and the house of representatives with primary jurisdiction over
5.22	kindergarten through grade 12 education policy and finance a report containing a list of
5.23	resources and materials provided to the commissioner of education for the commissioner
5.24	to make available to public school districts implementing requirements for education on
5.25	the Holocaust, genocide of Indigenous Peoples, and other genocides.
5.26	(b) The working group may:
5.27	(1) conduct a survey of the current state of education on the Holocaust, genocide of
5.28	Indigenous Peoples, and other genocides in Minnesota public school districts with a focus
5.29	on teacher preparedness, access and utilization of resources, and additional surveys of the
5.30	state of education on the Holocaust, genocide of Indigenous Peoples, and other genocides
5.31	following the conclusion of the 2024-2025 school year;

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(2) carry out any other tasks that it considers pertinent to support the ability of teach	ers
and public school district staff to facilitate the successful implementation of education	
requirements under Minnesota Statutes, section 120B.25; and	
(3) apply for and accept grants and receive gifts, donations, and other financial supp	ort
from private sources for the purposes of carrying out its work under this section.	
Subd. 3. Working group meetings and compensation. (a) The working group must	st
convene on at least a bimonthly basis and must hold the first meeting no later than Septem	ber
1, 2024.	
(b) Members of the working group shall receive a stipend of \$500 per month for the	eir_
time, work, and expertise.	
Subd. 4. Administration. The commissioner must provide meeting space and techni	ical
assistance for the working group.	
Subd. 5. Expiration. This section expires November 15, 2025, or the date upon wh	ich
the working group report required under subdivision 2 is submitted to the legislature,	
whichever is later.	
Sec. 3. APPROPRIATIONS.
