6	A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "AN ACT ESTABLISHING A MILITARY STRATEGIC AND ECONOMIC
7	IMPACT TASK FORCE CONCERNING RETENTION AND DEVELOPMENT OF MILITARY INSTALLATIONS
8	AND FORCE STRUCTURES TO PROVIDE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES IN MONTANA;
9	ALLOCATING THE TASK FORCE TO THE DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE FOR ADMINISTRATIVE
10	PURPOSES; PROVIDING FOR TASK FORCE MEMBERSHIP, EXPENSE REIMBURSEMENT, AND DUTIES;
11	PROVIDING APPROPRIATIONS; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE."
12	
13	WHEREAS, the Montana National Guard provides more than \$182 million in economic impetus to the
14	State of Montana, and the total federal economic impetus of the Montana Department of Military Affairs and the
15	National Guard to the State of Montana is over \$196 million; and
16	WHEREAS, Malmstrom Air Force Base provides more than \$610 million in economic impetus to the State
17	of Montana, airmen stationed at Malmstrom own an estimated 1,116 homes in Montana, military construction and
18	service contracts provide more than \$34 million to local developers, the base spends more than \$10.4 million for
19	utilities, and Malmstrom services more than 7,000 miles of roads in Montana, which benefits Montana's
20	commerce; and
21	WHEREAS, the federal sequestration, fiscal cliff, base realignment and closure activities, and other
22	cost-cutting measures will put current military missions and assets in Montana and, therefore, Montana's
23	economic well-being at risk now and well into the future; and
24	WHEREAS, states with military missions and assets have formed statewide advocacy groups to help
25	protect existing military force structures in their states, identify new missions, educate the public, and promote
26	economic development tied to the military, and Montana is the last state to lack such a statewide organization,
27	which clearly affects Montana's ability to be successful as national cuts to the military are implemented.

1	NEW SECTION. Section 1. Montana military STRATEGIC AND economic impact task force
2	membership compensation duties. (1) (A) There is a Montana military STRATEGIC AND economic impact
3	task force consisting of five <u>SEVEN</u> voting <u>MEMBERS APPOINTED BY THE GOVERNOR UPON RECOMMENDATION OF THE</u>
4	PERSON OR ENTITIES, IF APPLICABLE, AS PROVIDED FOR IN SUBSECTION (1)(B) and two UP TO THREE nonvoting
5	members <del>, as follows:</del> <u>APPOINTED BY THE LEGISLATURE. EACH MEMBER MUST BE A RESIDENT OF MONTANA.</u>
6	(a) The voting members are:
7	(i) the adjutant general, who shall represent the Montana national guard;
8	(ii) a member appointed by the governor to represent Montana's business community;
9	(iii) a member appointed by the highest ranking active component military commander on active duty in
10	Montana to be a liaison to the task force if the commander agrees to make the appointment. If the commander
11	is unwilling or unable to make the appointment, the member must be appointed by the governmental body of the
12	county where the military has the highest economic impact in the state.
13	(iv) a veteran of the armed forces appointed by the governor who is knowledgeable about active and
14	reserve component force structures and how various force structures may be configured in Montana to support
15	national defense missions as well as state disaster and emergency services; and
16	(v) a member with knowledge of the employment challenges experienced by national guard and federal
17	reserve members during and after their service, to be appointed by the Montana department of military affairs.
18	(B) THE VOTING MEMBERS MUST BE AS FOLLOWS:
19	(I) THE ADJUTANT GENERAL;
20	(II) A MEMBER REPRESENTING THE BUSINESS COMMUNITY AS RECOMMENDED BY A STATEWIDE ORGANIZATION
21	THAT REPRESENTS MONTANA BUSINESSES;
22	(III) A MEMBER REPRESENTING THE INTERESTS OF THE ACTIVE DUTY MILITARY IN MONTANA AS RECOMMENDED
23	BY THE STATE'S HIGHEST ACTIVE DUTY MILITARY COMMANDER OR, IN THE ABSENCE OF A RECOMMENDATION FROM THE
24	COMMANDER, BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE COUNTY WHERE THE MILITARY HAS THE HIGHEST ECONOMIC IMPACT IN
25	THE STATE;
26	(IV) A MEMBER REPRESENTING VETERANS OF THE ARMED FORCES;
27	(V) A MEMBER WITH KNOWLEDGE ABOUT THE EMPLOYMENT CHALLENGES EXPERIENCED BY NATIONAL GUARD AND
28	FEDERAL RESERVE SERVICE MEMBERS AS RECOMMENDED BY A STATEWIDE ORGANIZATION THAT ADVOCATES FOR SERVICE
29	MEMBERS AND THEIR EMPLOYERS;
30	(VI) A MEMBER REPRESENTING THE ENLISTED MEN AND WOMAN OF THE ARMED FORCES AS RECOMMENDED BY

2	(VII) A MEMBER REPRESENTING MILITARY AND AEROSPACE MANUFACTURING IN MONTANA AS RECOMMENDED BY
3	A STATEWIDE ORGANIZATION THAT REPRESENTS MANUFACTURING BUSINESS IN MONTANA.
4	(b)(C) The nonvoting members are:
5	(i) a state senator appointed by the president of the senate;
6	(ii) a state representative appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives:
7	(III) A STATE SENATOR OR STATE REPRESENTATIVE SELECTED JOINTLY BY THE MINORITY LEADERS OF THE SENATE
8	AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES IF THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES ARE CONTROLLED BY THE
9	SAME PARTY.
10	(2) (a) The task force shall elect a presiding officer from among its voting members. Task force meetings
11	are subject to the open meetings laws provided in Title 2, chapter 3, part 2.
12	(b) The task force is allocated to the department of commerce for administrative purposes only, as
13	provided in 2-15-121, which shall provide staff and administrative support to the task force.
14	(c) Task force members are entitled to reimbursement for expenses as provided in 2-18-501 through
15	2-18-503.
16	(3) The purpose of the task force is to:
17	(a) advocate for retention and development of military missions, installations, and force structures that
18	provide economic development opportunities in Montana AND SERVE A ROLE IN THE DEFENSE STRATEGY OF THE
19	NATION; and
20	(b) educate the public, legislature, and congressional delegation about the economic AND STRATEGIC
21	impact of current and future military development in Montana.
22	(4) In fulfilling its purpose under subsection (3), the task force shall:
23	(a) examine potential base realignment and closure actions;
24	(b) study the economic impact that the active and reserve component military missions and force
25	structures in Montana have on Montana's economy AND THE STRATEGIC IMPACT FOR THE NATION OF THOSE
26	PROGRAMS AND ASSETS;
27	(c) develop a strategic plan for how to position Montana with respect to potential base realignment and
28	closure actions so that Montana has the best possible opportunity to retain and develop future military economic
29	development opportunities AND TO PLAY A ROLE IN THE NATION'S STRATEGY FOR NATIONAL DEFENSE;
30	(d) provide regular updates on task force activities to the governor, the president of the senate, and the

2	(e) prepare reports and presentations consistent with its purpose and duties;
3	(f) lobby members of congress and act as a liaison with civilian and military personnel engaged in making
4	decisions concerning current and potential military missions and active and reserve component force structures
5	in Montana; and
6	(g) work and coordinate with other local and state military advocacy organizations as necessary.
7	(5) A member's term of office is 4 years MEMBERS MUST BE APPOINTED TO 4-YEAR STAGGERED TERMS. A
8	legislative member may continue to serve for the 4 years even if the member's legislative term expires. A member
9	appointed to fill a vacancy may serve only for the remainder of the previous member's term. A member may be
10	reappointed.
11	(6) THE TASK FORCE SHALL FORMULATE A BUDGET AND SUBMIT A COPY OF THAT BUDGET TO THE STATE
12	ADMINISTRATION AND VETERANS' AFFAIRS INTERIM COMMITTEE BY DECEMBER 31, 2013.
13	
14	NEW SECTION. Section 2. Appropriations. There is appropriated from the general fund to the
15	department of commerce:
16	(1) \$250,000 for the biennium ending June 30, 2015, for the conduct of the study described in [section
17	1(4)]; and
18	(2) \$163,000 in each year of the biennium ending June 30, 2015, for the purposes of implementing
19	[section 1].
20	
21	NEW SECTION. Section 3. Implementation of staggered appointments. To implement the
22	STAGGERED APPOINTMENT CRITERIA ESTABLISHED IN [SECTION 1(5)], THE INITIAL APPOINTMENTS OF THE FOLLOWING
23	MEMBERS OF THE MONTANA MILITARY STRATEGIC AND ECONOMIC IMPACT TASK FORCE MUST BE FOR 2 YEARS:
24	(1) THE BUSINESS COMMUNITY REPRESENTATIVE APPOINTED UNDER [SECTION 1(1)(B)(II)];
25	(2) THE ACTIVE DUTY LIAISON MEMBER APPOINTED UNDER [SECTION 1(1)(B)(III)]; AND
26	(3) THE EMPLOYMENT CHALLENGES MEMBER APPOINTED UNDER [SECTION $1(1)(B)(V)$ ].
27	
28	NEW SECTION. Section 4. Codification instruction. [Section 1] is intended to be codified as an
29	integral part of Title 2, chapter 15, part 18, and the provisions of Title 2, chapter 15, part 18, apply to [section 1].
