A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

- AN ACT TO CREATE A LEGISLATIVE STUDY COMMITTEE TO STUDY
 COMMUNITY-BASED SENTENCING ALTERNATIVES FOR PEOPLE WHO HAVE
 BEEN CONVICTED OF NONVIOLENT CRIMES AND WHO ARE THE PRIMARY
 CARETAKERS OF DEPENDENT CHILDREN.
- 6 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

7 **SECTION 1.** There is established a Joint Legislative Study Committee on 8 Alternative Sentencing (Committee). The Committee shall study community-based sentencing 9 alternatives for people who have been convicted of nonviolent crimes and who are the primary 10 caretakers of dependent children.

SECTION 2. The Committee shall consist of 12 members. Six members of the 11 12 Committee shall be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives (Speaker). Five of 13 the Speaker appointees shall be members of the North Carolina General Assembly, two of whom shall be members of the minority political party, and one Speaker appointee shall be a member 14 of the public that at one time served an active criminal sentence for a nonviolent offense while 15 being the primary caretaker of a dependent child. Six members of the Committee shall be 16 appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate (President Pro Tem). Five of the President 17 18 Pro Tem appointees shall be members of the North Carolina General Assembly, two of whom shall be members of the minority political party, and one President Pro Tem appointee shall be a 19 20 member of the public that at one time served an active criminal sentence for a nonviolent offense 21 while being the primary caretaker of a dependent child. The Speaker and the President Pro Tem 22 shall each appoint a cochair for the Committee. A quorum of the Committee is a majority of its 23 members.

SECTION 3. Members of the Committee shall receive per diem, subsistence, and
 travel allowances in accordance with G.S. 120-3.1 or G.S. 138-5, as appropriate.

26 SECTION 4. Subject to the approval of the Legislative Services Commission, the 27 Committee may meet in the State Legislative Building or the Legislative Office Building. The Legislative Services Commission, through the Legislative Services Officer, shall assign 28 29 professional staff to assist in the work of the Committee. The House of Representatives' and the 30 Senate's Directors of Legislative Assistants shall assign clerical staff to the Committee, and the 31 expenses relating to the clerical employees shall be borne by the Committee. The Committee, 32 while in the discharge of its official duties, may exercise all the powers provided under the 33 provisions of G.S. 120-19 and G.S. 120-19.1 through G.S. 120-19.4, including the power to 34 request all officers, agents, agencies, and departments of the State to provide any information, 35 data, or documents within their possession, ascertainable from their records, or otherwise

1	available to them and the power to subpoena witnesses. The appointing authority shall fill
2	vacancies.
3	SECTION 5. The Committee may report its findings and recommendations to the
4	General Assembly in an interim report by April 1, 2020, and shall make a final report by

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SECTION 6. This act is effective when it becomes law.
