# **LEGISLATIVE BILL 1347**

# Committee:

- 1 A BILL FOR AN ACT relating to schools; to adopt the Community Schools
- 2 Act.
- 3 Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

1 Section 1. Sections 1 to 9 of this act shall be known and may be

- 2 <u>cited as the Community Schools Act.</u>
- 3 Sec. 2. The Legislature finds that:
- 4 (1) Every child should be able to grow up and have the opportunity
- 5 to achieve his or her dreams and contribute to the well-being of society.
- 6 Every neighborhood deserves a public school that fully delivers on that
- 7 promise;
- 8 (2) A student achieves greater educational and life outcomes when
- 9 such student's family can be fully engaged in the student's education.
- 10 Families that participate in the education of the children in such family
- 11 support the long-term success of such children and the community; and
- 12 (3) Community schools provide comprehensive programs and services
- 13 that are carefully selected to meet the unique needs of students and
- 14 <u>families</u>, such as lack of stable housing, inadequate medical and dental
- 15 care, hunger, trauma, and exposure to violence, so students can do and
- 16 become their best.
- 17 Sec. 3. For purposes of the Community Schools Act:
- 18 (1) Community school means a public school that includes all of the
- 19 following:
- 20 <u>(a) Integrated student supports that address out-of-school barriers</u>
- 21 to learning through partnerships with social and health service agencies
- 22 and providers, that are coordinated by a community school director, and
- 23 that may include, but are not necessarily limited to, medical, dental,
- 24 vision care, and mental health services or counselors to assist with
- 25 housing, transportation, nutrition, immigration, or criminal justice
- 26 issues;
- 27 (b) Expanded and enriched learning time and opportunities, including
- 28 before-school, after-school, weekend, and summer programs, that provide
- 29 <u>additional academic instruction, individualized academic support,</u>
- 30 enrichment activities, and learning opportunities emphasizing real-world
- 31 learning and community problem solving and that may include, but are not

- 1 <u>necessarily limited to, art, music, drama, creative writing, hands-on</u>
- 2 experience with engineering or science, tutoring and homework help, and
- 3 recreational programs that enhance and are consistent with the school
- 4 curriculum;
- 5 (c) Active family and community engagement strategies that bring a
- 6 student's family and the community into the school as partners in the
- 7 student's education and makes the school a neighborhood hub and that
- 8 provides adults with educational opportunities, including, but not
- 9 limited to, English as a second language classes, green card or
- 10 citizenship preparation, computer skills, art, or other programs that
- 11 bring community members into the building for meetings and events; and
- 12 (d) Collaborative leadership and practices that build a culture of
- 13 professional learning, collective trust, and shared responsibility using
- 14 <u>strategies which shall, at a minimum, include a school-based leadership</u>
- 15 team, a community school director, and a communitywide leadership team
- and may include, but are not necessarily limited to, other leadership and
- 17 governance teams, teacher learning communities, and other staff to manage
- 18 the multiple, complex joint work of school and community organizations;
- 19 (2) Community school director means a person who:
- 20 (a) Is a full-time staff member serving one eligible school;
- 21 (b) Is responsible for the identification, implementation, and
- 22 coordination of integrated student supports, expanded and enriched
- 23 <u>learning time and opportunities, active family and community engagement</u>
- 24 strategies, and collaborative leadership and practices;
- (c) Serves as a member of the school-based leadership team;
- 26 (d) Serves as the lead for the needs and assets assessment and the
- 27 <u>community school plan described in subdivisions (1)(a) and (b) of section</u>
- 28 6 of this act; and
- 29 <u>(e) Leads the needs and assets assessment and stakeholder-driven</u>
- 30 approach to problem solving and continuous improvement;
- 31 (3) Community school initiative director means a person who:

- 1 (a) Aids implementation and coordination of integrated student
- 2 <u>supports</u>, <u>expanded</u> and <u>enriched learning time and opportunities</u>, <u>active</u>
- 3 family and community engagement strategies, and collaborative leadership
- 4 and practices, if a local education agency has more than three eligible
- 5 schools operating community school programs in its jurisdiction; and
- 6 (b) Provides support and guidance to community school directors;
- 7 (4) Communitywide leadership team means a team at the local
- 8 education agency level that is responsible for guiding the vision,
- 9 policy, resource alignment, implementation, oversight, and goal-setting
- 10 for community school programs within a local education agency. Such team
- 11 <u>shall include representatives from the local education agency, teachers,</u>
- 12 <u>school leaders, students and family members from the eligible schools,</u>
- 13 <u>community members, state-level partners that involve representatives from</u>
- 14 government agencies, relevant unions, nonprofit and other community-based
- 15 partners, and if applicable, the community school initiative director;
- 16 (5) Eligible applicant means:
- 17 <u>(a) A local education agency; or</u>
- 18 <u>(b) At least one nonprofit organization that partners with a local</u>
- 19 <u>education agency with approval from the governing entity responsible for</u>
- 20 <u>the local education agency;</u>
- 21 (6) Eligible school means a public school that:
- 22 (a) Has a student body with at least forty percent of students who
- 23 are eligible for free or reduced-price lunch pursuant to the Richard B.
- 24 Russell National School Lunch Act, 42 U.S.C. 1751 et seq., as such act
- 25 existed on January 1, 2024; or
- 26 <u>(b) Has been identified for comprehensive or targeted support and</u>
- 27 intervention pursuant to section 1111(c)(4)(D) of the federal Elementary
- 28 and Secondary Education Act of 1965, as such act existed on January 1,
- 29 <u>2024</u>, or otherwise identified by the State Department of Education as in
- 30 <u>need of additional support;</u>
- 31 (7) Local education agency means a school district or an educational

- 1 service unit;
- 2 (8) School-based leadership team means a school-level team that is
- 3 responsible for assessing a school's needs, developing its goals,
- 4 selecting its programming and services, and implementing programs to meet
- 5 the requirements of a community school. The team shall be comprised of at
- 6 least twelve but no more than fifteen members with at least one-third of
- 7 such members being parents or local residents and at least one-third of
- 8 such members being school staff, representatives of nonprofit
- 9 organizations that serve the school, and, for high schools, students at
- 10 <u>the school. The members shall select a member of the team to act as the</u>
- 11 <u>chairperson; and</u>
- 12 <u>(9) Teacher learning communities means a group of primarily</u>
- instructional staff in an eligible school who are given common planning
- 14 <u>time to participate in ongoing decision making and planning that examine</u>
- 15 the teaching practice and student performance to improve school policy
- 16 and classroom teaching.
- 17 Sec. 4. (1) The Commissioner of Education shall employ up to three
- 18 full-service community school coordinators in separate geographical
- 19 regions across the state. Such coordinators shall provide technical
- 20 <u>assistance</u>, ensure the evaluation and effectiveness of programming, and
- 21 <u>coordinate local and community services in such coordinator's region</u>
- 22 relating to the implementation of the Community Schools Act.
- 23 (2) The State Department of Education shall provide technical
- 24 assistance to local education agencies which shall include:
- 25 (a) Distributing materials that describe the elements and advantages
- 26 of community schools, including references to governmental and nonprofit
- 27 reports if applicable;
- 28 (b) Assisting any local education agency in forming a taskforce to
- 29 <u>study the creation and administration of a community school;</u>
- 30 (c) Informing local education agencies of the availability of grants
- 31 under the Community Schools Act and answering any technical questions

- 1 about the application process;
- 2 (d) Informing local education agencies of other sources of funding
- 3 for community schools and assisting efforts to secure such funding; and
- 4 (e) Facilitating effective coordination among state agencies in the
- 5 <u>deployment of resources and services such as health, nutrition, and other</u>
- 6 <u>supports</u>.
- 7 (3) The State Department of Education shall provide planning,
- 8 <u>implementation</u>, and renewal grants to eligible applicants who meet the
- 9 requirement for such grants. An eligible applicant may apply for and
- 10 receive each type of grant. Such grants shall include:
- 11 (a) A one-time, one-year planning grant of up to fifty thousand
- 12 dollars;
- 13 (b) A one-time implementation grant of up to one hundred twenty-five
- 14 thousand dollars per year for a period of three years; and
- 15 (c) A renewal grant of up to seventy-five dollars per year for a
- 16 period of three years for an applicant that demonstrated success at the
- 17 <u>conclusion of the implementation or previous renewal grant as determined</u>
- 18 by the evaluation pursuant to section 6 of this act.
- 19 Sec. 5. <u>(1) An eligible applicant may submit an application for a</u>
- 20 planning grant to the State Department of Education. The application
- 21 <u>shall include:</u>
- 22 (a) A description of the following:
- 23 (i) The initial communitywide leadership team and the school-based
- 24 leadership team or the process that will be put in place to establish
- 25 such teams;
- 26 <u>(ii) The process and timelines for conducting a needs and assets</u>
- 27 <u>assessment and community school plan for each eligible school as required</u>
- by subdivisions (1)(a) and (b) of section 6 of this act; and
- 29 <u>(iii) If applicable, plans for hiring additional staff, plans for</u>
- 30 providing additional compensation to existing staff, or plans for
- 31 contracting with a nonprofit entity or entities to help the eligible

- 1 applicant apply for an implementation grant; and
- 2 (b) An assurance that the eligible applicant intends to apply for an
- 3 implementation grant within six months after receipt of a planning grant.
- 4 (2)(a) A planning grant shall be used to:
- 5 (i) Establish or provide additional support to a communitywide
- 6 <u>leadership team and school-based leadership team; and</u>
- 7 (ii) Conduct a needs and assets assessment and develop a community
- 8 <u>school plan for each eligible school as required pursuant to subdivisions</u>
- 9 (1)(a) and (b) of section 6 of this act.
- 10 (b) A planning grant may also be used for hiring additional staff,
- 11 providing additional compensation to existing staff, or contracting with
- 12 <u>a nonprofit entity or entities to aid in the activities necessary to</u>
- 13 <u>apply for an implementation grant.</u>
- Sec. 6. (1) An eligible applicant may submit an application for an
- 15 <u>implementation or renewal grant to the State Department of Education. The</u>
- 16 application shall include for each eligible school:
- 17 (a) A needs and assets assessment that includes:
- 18 <u>(i) If available and applicable, student demographic, academic</u>
- 19 achievement, and school climate data, disaggregated by major demographic
- 20 groups, including, but not limited to, race, ethnicity, English language
- 21 proficiency, students with an individualized education program, and
- 22 students eligible for free or reduced-price lunch;
- 23 (ii) Access to and need for integrated student supports as described
- 24 <u>in subdivision (1)(a) of section 3 of this act;</u>
- 25 (iii) Access to and need for expanded and enriched learning time and
- 26 opportunities as described in subdivision (1)(b) of section 3 of this
- 27 act;
- 28 (iv) School funding information, including federal, state, local,
- 29 and private education funding and per-pupil spending, based on actual
- 30 <u>salaries of personnel assigned to the eligible school;</u>
- 31 (v) Information on the number, qualifications, and stability of

- 1 school staff, including the number and percentage of certified teachers
- 2 <u>and rates of teacher turnover;</u>
- 3 (vi) Active family and community engagement strategies information,
- 4 including:
- 5 (A) Family and community needs based on surveys, information from
- 6 public meetings, or information gathered by other means;
- 7 (B) Measurers of family and community engagement in the eligible
- 8 school, including volunteering in school activities, attendance at back-
- 9 <u>to-school nights</u>, and parent-teacher conferences;
- 10 (C) Efforts to provide culturally and linguistically relevant
- 11 <u>communication between the eligible school and families of students in</u>
- 12 such school; and
- 13 <u>(D) Access to and need for family and community engagement</u>
- 14 activities as described in subdivision (1)(c) of section 3 of this act;
- 15 <u>(vii) Collaborative leadership and practices, including a</u>
- 16 <u>description of the communitywide leadership team, school-based leadership</u>
- 17 team, teacher learning communities, and common planning time for
- 18 educators;
- 19 <u>(viii) Opportunities for partnerships with nonprofit organizations,</u>
- 20 community-based institutions, postsecondary institutions, hospitals,
- 21 museums, businesses, and other community entities that can partner with
- 22 the eligible school; and
- 23 (ix) Community climate indicator data, including housing
- 24 instability, unemployment, poverty, jobs that offer a living wage, health
- 25 <u>indicators</u>, youth employment, access to parks, environmental hazards,
- 26 <u>crime</u>, and gang activity; and
- 27 <u>(b) A community school plan that includes:</u>
- 28 (i) How the community school director and, as applicable, the
- 29 community school initiative director are expected to fulfill their
- 30 responsibilities as described in subdivisions (2) and (3) of section 3 of
- 31 this act;

1 (ii) The collaborative leadership and practices structures and

- 2 <u>strategies;</u>
- 3 (iii) The integrated student supports, expanded and enriched
- 4 learning time and opportunities, and active family and community
- 5 <u>engagement strategies that will be tailored to the needs and assets</u>
- 6 assessment;
- 7 (iv) How the eligible school will provide culturally and
- 8 <u>linguistically relevant communication between the eligible school and</u>
- 9 <u>families with students attending such school;</u>
- 10 <u>(v) How the eligible school will establish and maintain partnerships</u>
- 11 <u>with nonprofit organizations, community-based institutions, postsecondary</u>
- 12 <u>institutions</u>, <u>hospitals</u>, <u>museums</u>, <u>businesses</u>, <u>and other community</u>
- 13 entities that will help to implement and sustain the community school
- 14 plan;
- 15 (vi) How activities chosen will reinforce existing programs and
- 16 activities at the eligible school; and
- 17 (vii) If applicable, a description of the federal, state, local, and
- 18 private funds that will be available to implement the community school
- 19 <u>plan.</u>
- 20 (2) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (3) of this section,
- 21 <u>an implementation or renewal grant shall be used to:</u>
- 22 (a) Provide a community school director and, as applicable, a
- 23 community school initiative director to coordinate services across the
- 24 eligible school or schools;
- 25 (b) Establish or maintain a school-based leadership team and teacher
- 26 learning communities, and, for the local education agency, a
- 27 communitywide leadership team;
- 28 <u>(c) Implement at least two of the following integrated student</u>
- 29 <u>supports:</u>
- 30 (i) Health services that may be based in the eligible school or
- 31 provided in the community, including primary health, dental, and mental

- 1 health care, including trauma-informed care;
- 2 (ii) Nutrition services, including providing additional meals or

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- 3 <u>assistance in accessing food assistance programs; or</u>
- 4 (iii) Programs that provide assistance to students who have been
- 5 <u>chronically absent, suspended, or expelled such as:</u>
- 6 (A) Mentoring and other youth development programs;
- 7 (B) Programs that support a positive school atmosphere;
- 8 (C) Juvenile crime prevention and rehabilitation programs;
- 9 (D) Specialized instruction supports services;
- 10 (E) Homelessness prevention services;
- 11 (F) Developmentally appropriate physical education programs;
- 12 (G) Legal services, including immigration related legal services;
- 13 (H) Dropout prevention programs; or
- 14 (I) Transportation services necessary for students to access
- 15 <u>integrated student support services</u>, expanded and enriched learning time
- 16 and opportunities, active family and community engagement strategies, or
- 17 other services and activities identified to support the development of
- 18 students;
- 19 (d) Implement expanded and enriched learning time and opportunities,
- 20 which may include additional academic instruction, before-school, after-
- 21 school, and summer school programs, mentorship programs, job training,
- 22 <u>internships</u>, apprenticeships, and service-learning opportunities, and
- 23 time for the community school director and school staff to have school-
- 24 based learning time and to plan, coordinate, and integrate such
- 25 opportunities; and
- 26 (e) Implement at least two active family and community engagement
- 27 strategies, which may include:
- 28 (i) Onsite early childhood education programs and child care;
- 29 (ii) Home visitation services by teachers and other professionals;
- 30 (iii) Adult education, including instruction in English as a second
- 31 language or a diploma of high school equivalency program;

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1 (iv) Job search and preparation services and career advancement

- 2 <u>activities;</u>
- 3 (v) Legal services, such as help with citizenship preparation;
- 4 (vi) Programs that aid family and community well-being, including
- 5 accessing homelessness prevention services;
- 6 (vii) Programs that promote parental involvement and family
- 7 literacy, provide volunteer opportunities, promote inclusion in school-
- 8 <u>based leadership teams</u>, and empower and strengthen families and
- 9 <u>communities; or</u>
- 10 <u>(viii) Other programming or services designed to meet school and</u>
- 11 <u>community needs identified in the needs and assets assessment.</u>
- 12 (3) Required activities under subsection (2) of this section shall
- 13 <u>not be duplicative of existing programs and activities at the eligible</u>
- 14 school.
- 15 (4) The State Department of Education shall develop an evaluation
- 16 for each implementation grant or renewal grant to evaluate each community
- 17 school. The evaluation shall include, but not be limited to:
- 18 <u>(a) Information obtained in the needs and assets assessment and</u>
- 19 <u>community school plan and the activities and programs that were</u>
- 20 <u>implemented as a result of such information pursuant to subsection (2) of</u>
- 21 this section; and
- 22 (b) The impact on academic achievement and opportunities, school
- 23 atmosphere, integrated student supports, expanded and enriched learning
- 24 time and opportunities, active family and community engagement
- 25 strategies, the collaborative leadership and processes in place, and
- 26 changes in school spending information.
- 27 (5) The department shall evaluate each eligible applicant that
- 28 received an implementation or renewal grant for each eligible school at
- 29 the end of the third year of an implementation grant or at the end of
- 30 every third year of a renewal grant.
- 31 Sec. 7. By July 1, 2025, and each July 1 thereafter, the State

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- 1 Department of Education shall electronically submit a report to the
- 2 Legislature on the impact of the Community Schools Act and any
- 3 <u>recommended revisions. The report shall be made available to the public</u>
- 4 <u>on the department's website.</u>
- 5 Sec. 8. <u>It is the intent of the Legislature to appropriate one</u>
- 6 million dollars from the General Fund to the State Department of
- 7 Education to carry out the Community Schools Act.
- 8 Sec. 9. The State Board of Education may adopt and promulgate rules
- 9 and regulations to carry out the Community Schools Act.
