11	RELATING TO BEHAVIORAL HEALTH; ENACTING THE RURAL WRAPAROUND
12	SERVICES ACT; PROVIDING COMMUNITY-BASED SUPPORT SERVICES FOR
13	ADULTS DIAGNOSED WITH SERIOUS MENTAL ILLNESS AND YOUTH
14	DIAGNOSED WITH SERIOUS EMOTIONAL DISTURBANCE; PROVIDING POWERS
15	AND DUTIES; CREATING THE RURAL WRAPAROUND SERVICES FUND; MAKING
16	AN APPROPRIATION; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.
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18	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
19	SECTION 1. [<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] SHORT TITLEThis act may be
20	cited as the "Rural Wraparound Services Act".
21	SECTION 2. [<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] DEFINITIONSAs used in the
22	Rural Wraparound Services Act:
23	A. "comprehensive community-based mental health
24	system" means a system of care that includes mental and
25	physical health services, rehabilitation services, employment
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1 services, housing services, educational services, substance 2 abuse services, medical and dental care and other support services with federal, state and local public and private 3 resources to enable persons to function outside of inpatient or 4 residential institutions to the maximum extent of their 5 capabilities, including services provided by local school 6 7 systems pursuant to the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act: 8

9 B. "department" means the human services10 department;

C. "division" means the behavioral health services division of the department;

D. "fund" means the rural wraparound services fund;

E. "psychosocial rehabilitation services" means a set of services designed to help a person in the target population to achieve optimum functioning in the personal and social dimensions of the person's life;

F. "serious emotional disturbance" means one or more diagnosable behavioral, mental or emotional conditions as defined in the most recent *Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders*, published by the American psychiatric association that results in functional impairment that substantially interferes with or limits the role or functioning in family, school or community activities of a youth between the ages of sixteen and twenty-two;

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G. "serious mental illness" means one or more diagnosable behavioral, mental or emotional conditions as defined in the most recent *Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders*, published by the American psychiatric association, which condition substantially interferes with or limits one or more major life activities of an adult;

H. "target population" means adults who have been diagnosed with serious mental illness or youths between the ages of sixteen and twenty-two who have been diagnosed within the last year with serious emotional disturbance and includes adults or youths who live in rural areas or are homeless;

I. "targeted case management" means a service that assists a person to gain access to needed medical, social, educational and other services and that ensures that services are coordinated among all providers of such services;

J. "transitional housing" means up to eighteen months of housing;

K. "urgent need" means circumstances of sufficient concern that if not addressed within twenty-four hours could reasonably result in hospitalization, detention or incarceration;

L. "value-added service" means a service that is not a medicaid-funded service that a medicaid managed care organization or contractor may offer to a medicaid recipient; and

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M. "wraparound services" means a component of a comprehensive community-based mental health system that consists of outcome-focused support services tailored to the needs of a person in the target population.

SECTION 3. [<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] DIVISION DUTIES--COMPREHENSIVE SYSTEM--RURAL WRAPAROUND SERVICES.--The division shall design and implement a comprehensive community-based mental health system in rural areas of the state that provides wraparound services to achieve one or more of the following:

A. to prevent or reduce the likelihood of relapse following discharge from inpatient care or recidivism following release from detention or incarceration;

B. to correct, reduce or ameliorate the physical, mental, cognitive or developmental effects of serious mental illness or serious emotional disturbance;

C. to reduce or ameliorate the pain or suffering caused by serious mental illness or serious emotional disturbance;

D. to assist the person to achieve or maintain maximum functional capacity in performing the activities of daily living; or

E. to assist the person with life skills needed to live independently in the community.

SECTION 4. [<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] RURAL WRAPAROUND SERVICES FUND CREATED--USES AND ADMINISTRATION OF FUND.--

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1	A. The "rural wraparound services fund" is created
2	as a nonreverting fund in the state treasury. The fund
3	consists of appropriations, value-added services payments,
4	gifts, grants, donations and income earned on investment of the
5	fund and any other money deposited in the fund. The division
6	shall administer the fund and money in the fund is appropriated
7	to the department to contract for services as provided in this
8	section. Money in the fund shall be expended only for the
9	purposes specified in the Rural Wraparound Services Act.
10	Expenditures from the fund shall be by warrant of the secretary
11	of finance and administration on vouchers signed by the
12	division director or the director's authorized representative.
13	B. Money in the fund shall be used to provide,
14	arrange for or assist with:
15	(1) targeted case management;
16	(2) transitional and long-term housing for the
17	target population; and
18	(3) psychosocial rehabilitation and wraparound
19	services for the target population.
20	C. Money in the fund shall not be used to pay for
21	goods or services covered by medicaid or to match federal
22	funding for medicaid.
23	D. Expenses of administering the fund shall be paid
24	by the department.
25	SECTION 5. [<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] CONTRACT REQUIREMENTS

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1 Contracts awarded from the rural wraparound Α. 2 services fund shall: be for a period of at least four years; 3 (1)be awarded to contractors that demonstrate 4 (2)5 the ability to achieve outcomes specified by the division; (3) give preference to proposals for 6 7 communities that have few or no behavioral health providers or services: and 8 allow innovative, flexible and creative 9 (4) uses of local resources other than traditional providers of 10 behavioral health services. 11 12 Β. The division may require contractors to demonstrate in-kind or other support from the local community 13 where the contracted services will be provided or from 14 behavioral health providers or services located anywhere in the 15 state. 16 C. The department shall enter into a contract for 17 procurement after evaluating competitive proposals and shall 18 19 not design requests for proposals to provide for only sole 20 source contracts. The department shall conduct its own procurement, but shall conduct all procurement in accordance 21 with the Procurement Code; provided that Section 13-1-98.1 NMSA 22 1978 shall not apply to procurement pursuant to the Rural 23 Wraparound Services Act. 24 Medicaid managed care organizations or 25 D.

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1 contractors shall not be eligible for contracts awarded 2 pursuant to the Rural Wraparound Services Act. [NEW MATERIAL] STANDARDS AND PERFORMANCE 3 SECTION 6. MEASURES FOR CONTRACTS .--4 5 The department shall promulgate standards and Α. performance measures for contracts awarded pursuant to the 6 7 Rural Wraparound Services Act that, at a minimum, require: 8 identification and tracking of each person (1)9 served; acceptance of referrals from all sources 10 (2) for persons in the target population; 11 12 (3) an assessment performed and service plan 13 developed within no more than: 14 (a) twenty-four hours of referral for persons in crisis; 15 (b) forty-eight hours prior to a 16 person's discharge from inpatient care or release from 17 18 detention or incarceration; 19 (c) five business days before a youth 20 leaves foster care; or two business days following referral 21 (d) for all other persons served; 22 the assignment of a community support 23 (4) worker to be responsible for assisting in the assessment of the 24 person and in the development of the service plan; 25 .210901.1 - 7 -

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1 (5) the initiation of services within one 2 calendar day of the assessment for persons with urgent needs and within five calendar days for persons with non-urgent 3 4 needs;

immediate access to crisis stabilization 5 (6) services, with twenty-four-hour telephone response and next 6 7 calendar day appointments; and

continuing support for persons served. (7) Β. Standards and performance measures for contracts awarded pursuant to the Rural Wraparound Services Act shall not 10 be so stringent that only traditional providers of behavioral 12 health services can meet them.

C. Contractors shall be required to report outcomes as determined by the department.

> SECTION 7. [NEW MATERIAL] VALUE-ADDED SERVICES PAYMENT .--

The department shall require a medicaid managed Α. care organization or medicaid fee-for-service contractor to pay quarterly an amount equal to five percent of the amount spent by the organization or contractor for behavioral health services in the previous quarter to the rural wraparound services fund, to be deemed a value-added service.

Medicaid funds shall not be used to make the Β. quarterly payment to the rural wraparound services fund required in this section.

SECTION 8. APPROPRIATION. -- Seven million dollars .210901.1

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	1	(\$7,000,000) is appropriated from the general fund to the rural
	2	wraparound services fund for expenditure in fiscal year 2020
	3	and subsequent fiscal years to contract for services as
	4	provided in the Rural Wraparound Services Act. Any unexpended
	5	or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of a fiscal year
	6	shall not revert to the general fund.
	7	SECTION 9. EMERGENCYIt is necessary for the public
	8	peace, health and safety that this act take effect immediately.
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
