10	SECTION 1. Section 61-9-3 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1963,	
11	Chapter 92, Section 3, as amended) is amended to read:	
12	"61-9-3. DEFINITIONSAs used in the Professional	
13	Psychologist Act:	
14	A. "board" means the New Mexico state board of	
15	psychologist examiners;	
16	B. "conditional prescription certificate" means a	
17	document issued by the board to a licensed psychologist that	
18	permits the holder to prescribe psychotropic medication under	
19	the supervision of a supervising clinician pursuant to the	
20	Professional Psychologist Act;	
21	C. "independently licensed prescribing clinician"	
22	means a licensed physician, osteopathic physician, nurse	
23	practitioner, psychiatric nurse practitioner or clinical	
24	nurse specialist;	
25	D. "person" includes an individual, firm,	SB 9
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partnership, association or corporation;

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E. "prescribing psychologist" means a licensed psychologist who holds a valid prescription certificate;

F. "prescription certificate" means a document issued by the board to a licensed psychologist that permits the holder to prescribe psychotropic medication pursuant to the Professional Psychologist Act;

8 G. "psychotropic medication" means a controlled substance or dangerous drug that may not be dispensed or 9 administered without a prescription and whose primary 10 indication for use has been approved by the federal food and 11 drug administration for the treatment of mental disorders or 12 is listed as a psychotherapeutic agent in Drug Facts and 13 Comparisons 2017, or the most recent edition of that book, or 14 in American Hospital Formulary Service Drug Information; 15

"psychologist" means a person who engages in н. 16 the practice of psychology or holds the person's self out to 17 the public by any title or description of services 18 representing the person as a psychologist, which incorporates 19 the words "psychological", "psychologist", "psychology", or 20 when a person describes the person's self as above and, under 21 such title or description, offers to render or renders 22 services involving the application of principles, methods and 23 procedures of the science and profession of psychology to 24 persons for compensation or other personal gain; 25

"practice of psychology" means the observation, 1 I. 2 description, evaluation, interpretation and modification of 3 human behavior by the application of psychological principles, methods and procedures for the purpose of 4 preventing or eliminating symptomatic, maladaptive or 5 undesired behavior and of enhancing interpersonal 6 relationships, work and life adjustment, personal 7 8 effectiveness, behavioral health and mental health, and further means the rendering of such psychological services to 9 individuals, families or groups regardless of whether payment 10 is received for services rendered. The practice of 11 psychology includes psychological testing or 12 neuropsychological testing and the evaluation or assessment 13 of personal characteristics such as intelligence, 14 personality, abilities, interests, aptitudes and 15 neuropsychological functioning; counseling, psychoanalysis, 16 psychotherapy, hypnosis, biofeedback, behavior analysis and 17 therapy; diagnosis and treatment of a mental and emotional 18 disorder or disability, alcoholism and substance abuse, 19 disorders of habit or conduct and the psychological aspects 20 of physical illness, accident, injury and disability; and 21 psychoeducational evaluation, therapy, remediation and 22 consultation: 23

J. "school" or "college" means a university or other institution of higher education that is regionally

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accredited and that offers a full-time graduate course of study in psychology as defined by rule of the board or that is approved by the American psychological association; and

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K. "supervising clinician" means a licensed physician, osteopathic physician, nurse practitioner, psychiatric nurse practitioner or clinical nurse specialist who is supervising a psychologist in the prescribing of psychotropic medication."

SECTION 2. Section 61-9-10 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1963, Chapter 92, Section 9, as amended) is amended to read:

"61-9-10. LICENSURE OF PSYCHOLOGISTS FROM OTHER AREAS--11 RECIPROCITY.--Subject to the provisions of Section 61-9-10.1 12 NMSA 1978, upon application accompanied by a fee as required 13 by the Professional Psychologist Act, the board may, without 14 written or oral examination, issue a license to a person who 15 furnishes, upon a form and in such manner as the board 16 prescribes, evidence satisfactory to the board that the 17 person has been licensed or certified as a psychologist or 18 prescribing psychologist by another state, a territorial 19 possession of the United States, the District of Columbia or 20 another country for a minimum of five years. An applicant 21 seeking reciprocity shall demonstrate to the satisfaction of 22 the board that the training and education received by the 23 applicant is equivalent to the requirements for a doctoral 24 degree in psychology as provided in the Professional 25

Psychologist Act."

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SECTION 3. Section 61-9-13 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1963, Chapter 92, Section 12, as amended) is amended to read:

"61-9-13. DENIAL, REVOCATION OR SUSPENSION OF LICENSE.--

A. The board, by an affirmative vote of at least five of its eight members, shall withhold, deny, revoke or suspend a psychologist or psychologist associate license issued or applied for in accordance with the provisions of the Professional Psychologist Act or otherwise discipline a licensed psychologist or psychologist associate upon proof that the applicant, licensed psychologist or psychologist associate:

14 (1) has been convicted of a felony or an 15 offense involving moral turpitude, the record of conviction 16 being conclusive evidence thereof;

(2) is using a drug, substance or alcoholic beverage to an extent or in a manner dangerous to the psychologist or psychologist associate, any other person or the public or to an extent that the use impairs the psychologist's or psychologist associate's ability to perform the work of a professional psychologist or psychologist associate with safety to the public;

(3) has impersonated another person holding a psychologist or psychologist associate license or allowed

1 another person to use the psychologist's or psychologist 2 associate's license; 3 (4) has used fraud or deception in applying for a license or in taking an examination provided for in the 4 Professional Psychologist Act; 5 (5) has accepted commissions or rebates or 6 other forms of remuneration for referring clients to other 7 8 professional persons; (6) has allowed the psychologist's or 9 psychologist associate's name or license issued under the 10 Professional Psychologist Act to be used in connection with a 11 person who performs psychological services outside of the 12 area of that person's training, experience or competence; 13 (7) is legally adjudicated insane or 14 mentally incompetent, the record of such adjudication being 15 conclusive evidence thereof; 16 (8) has willfully or negligently violated 17 the provisions of the Professional Psychologist Act; 18 (9) has violated any code of conduct adopted 19 by the board; 20 (10) has been disciplined by another state 21 for acts similar to acts described in this subsection, and a 22 certified copy of the record of discipline of the state 23 imposing the discipline is conclusive evidence; 24 (11) is incompetent to practice psychology; 25

1 (12) has failed to furnish to the board or 2 its representative information requested by the board; 3 (13) has abandoned patients or clients; (14) has failed to report to the board 4 adverse action taken against the licensee by: 5 (a) another licensing jurisdiction; 6 a professional psychologist (b) 7 8 association of which the psychologist or psychologist associate is or has been a member; 9 (c) a government agency; or 10 (d) a court for actions or conduct 11 similar to acts or conduct that would constitute grounds for 12 action as described in this subsection; 13 (15) has failed to report to the board 14 surrender of a license or other authorization to practice 15 psychology in another jurisdiction or surrender of membership 16 on a health care staff or in a professional association 17 following a disciplinary investigation, or in lieu of or 18 while under a disciplinary investigation, by any of those 19 authorities for acts or conduct that would constitute grounds 20 for action as defined in this subsection; 21 (16) has failed to adequately supervise a 22 psychologist associate or a licensed psychologist holding a 23 conditional prescription certificate; 24 (17) has employed abusive billing practices; 25

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1 (18) has aided or abetted the practice of 2 psychology by a person not licensed by the board; or 3 (19) uses conversion therapy on a minor. B. A person who has been refused a license or 4 whose license has been restricted or suspended under the 5 provisions of this section may reapply for licensure after 6 more than two years have elapsed from the date the 7 8 restriction or suspension is terminated. C. As used in this section: 9 "conversion therapy" means any practice 10 (1) or treatment that seeks to change a person's sexual 11 orientation or gender identity, including any effort to 12 change behaviors or gender expressions or to eliminate or 13 reduce sexual or romantic attractions or feelings toward 14 persons of the same sex. "Conversion therapy" does not mean: 15 (a) counseling or mental health 16 services that provide acceptance, support and understanding 17 of a person without seeking to change gender identity or 18 sexual orientation; or 19 (b) mental health services that 20 facilitate a person's coping, social support, sexual 21 orientation or gender identity exploration and development, 22 including an intervention to prevent or address unlawful 23 conduct or unsafe sexual practices, without seeking to change 24 gender identity or sexual orientation; 25 SB 9

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(2) 1 "gender identity" means a person's 2 self-perception, or perception of that person by another, of 3 the person's identity as a male or female based upon the person's appearance, behavior or physical characteristics 4 that are in accord with or opposed to the person's physical 5 anatomy, chromosomal sex or sex at birth; 6 (3) "minor" means a person under eighteen 7 8 years of age; and (4) "sexual orientation" means 9 heterosexuality, homosexuality or bisexuality, whether actual 10 or perceived." 11 SECTION 4. Section 61-9-17 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1963, 12 Chapter 92, Section 16, as amended) is amended to read: 13 "61-9-17. DRUGS--MEDICINES.--14 A. Except as provided in Subsections B and C of 15 this section, psychologists or psychologist associates shall 16 not administer or prescribe drugs or medicine or in any 17 manner engage in the practice of medicine as defined by the 18 laws of this state. 19 B. A licensed psychologist holding a conditional 20 prescription certificate may prescribe psychotropic 21 medication under the supervision of a supervising clinician 22 pursuant to the Professional Psychologist Act. 23 C. A prescribing psychologist may prescribe 24 psychotropic medication pursuant to the Professional 25 SB 9 Page 9 1 Psychologist Act."

2 SECTION 5. Section 61-9-17.1 NMSA 1978 (being 3 Laws 2002, Chapter 100, Section 6) is amended to read: "61-9-17.1. CONDITIONAL PRESCRIPTION CERTIFICATE--4 PRESCRIPTION CERTIFICATE--APPLICATION--REQUIREMENTS--5 RULEMAKING BY BOARD--ISSUANCE, DENIAL, RENEWAL AND REVOCATION 6 OF CERTIFICATION. --7 8 A. A psychologist may apply to the board for a conditional prescription certificate. The application shall 9 be made on a form approved by the board and be accompanied by 10 evidence satisfactory to the board that the applicant: 11 (1) has completed a doctoral program in 12 psychology from an accredited institution of higher education 13 or professional school, or, if the program was not accredited 14 at the time of the applicant's graduation, that the program 15 meets professional standards determined acceptable by the 16 board; 17 (2) holds a current license to practice 18 psychology in New Mexico; 19 (3) has successfully completed 20 pharmacological training from an institution of higher 21 education approved by the board and the New Mexico medical 22 board or from a provider of continuing education approved by 23 the board and the New Mexico medical board; 24 (4) has passed a national certification 25

1	examination approved by the board and the New Mexico medical	
2	board that tests the applicant's knowledge of pharmacology in	
3	the diagnosis, care and treatment of mental disorders;	
4	(5) within the five years immediately	
5	preceding the date of application, has successfully completed	
6	an organized program of education approved by the board and	
7	the New Mexico medical board and consisting of didactic	
8	instruction of no fewer than four hundred fifty classroom	
9	hours in at least the following core areas of instruction:	
10	(a) neuroscience;	
11	(b) pharmacology;	
12	(c) psychopharmacology;	
13	(d) physiology;	
14	(e) pathophysiology;	
15	(f) appropriate and relevant physical	
16	and laboratory assessment; and	
17	(g) clinical pharmacotherapeutics;	
18	(6) within the five years immediately	
19	preceding the date of application, has been certified by each	
20	of the applicant's supervising independently licensed	
21	prescribing clinicians as having successfully completed a	
22	supervised and relevant clinical experience, approved by the	
23	board and the New Mexico medical board, of:	
24	(a) no less than an eighty-hour	
25	practicum in clinical assessment and pathophysiology under	SB 9 Page 11

the supervision of an independently licensed prescribing physician; and

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(b) an additional supervised practicum of at least four hundred hours treating no fewer than one hundred patients with mental disorders, the practica to have been supervised by any one or a combination of a psychiatrist or other appropriately trained independently licensed prescribing physician and determined by the board and the New Mexico medical board to be sufficient to competently train the applicant in the treatment of a diverse patient population. One-to-one supervision shall be provided either face-to-face, telephonically or by video conference; 12

(7) has malpractice insurance in place, 13 sufficient to satisfy the rules adopted by the board and the 14 New Mexico medical board, that will cover the applicant 15 during the period the conditional prescription certificate is 16 in effect; and 17

(8) meets all other requirements, as 18 determined by rule of the board, for obtaining a conditional 19 prescription certificate. 20

The board shall issue a conditional Β. 21 prescription certificate if it finds that the applicant has 22 met the requirements of Subsection A of this section. The 23 certificate shall be valid for a period of two years, at the 24 end of which the holder may again apply pursuant to the 25

provisions of Subsection A of this section. A psychologist with a conditional prescription certificate may prescribe psychotropic medication under the supervision of a supervising clinician subject to the following conditions:

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 (1) the psychologist shall continue to hold a current license to practice psychology in New Mexico and continue to maintain malpractice insurance;

(2) the psychologist shall notify the boardof the name of the psychologist's supervising clinician; and

10 (3) a supervising clinician shall notify the 11 supervising clinician's own licensing board of the name of 12 each psychologist under the supervising clinician's 13 supervision.

14 C. A supervising clinician shall not be liable for 15 the acts of a psychologist under the supervising clinician's 16 supervision unless the injury or loss arises from those acts 17 under the direction and control of the supervising clinician.

D. A psychologist may apply to the board for a prescription certificate. The application shall be made on a form approved by the board and be accompanied by evidence satisfactory to the board that the applicant:

(1) has been issued a conditional prescription certificate and has successfully completed two years of prescribing psychotropic medication as certified by the supervising clinician;

1 (2) has successfully undergone a process of 2 independent peer review approved by the board and the 3 New Mexico medical board; (3) holds a current license to practice 4 psychology in New Mexico; 5 (4) has malpractice insurance in place, 6 sufficient to satisfy the rules adopted by the board, that 7 8 will cover the applicant as a prescribing psychologist; and (5) meets all other requirements, as 9 determined by rule of the board, for obtaining a prescription 10 certificate. 11 The board shall issue a prescription Ε. 12 certificate if it finds that the applicant has met the 13 requirements of Subsection D of this section. A psychologist 14 with a prescription certificate may prescribe psychotropic 15 medication pursuant to the provisions of the Professional 16 Psychologist Act if the psychologist: 17 continues to hold a current license to (1)18 practice psychology in New Mexico and continues to maintain 19 malpractice insurance; and 20 (2) annually satisfies the continuing 21 education requirements for prescribing psychologists, as set 22 by the board, which shall be no fewer than twenty hours each 23 year. 24 The board shall promulgate rules providing for F. SB 9 25

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the procedures to be followed in obtaining a conditional prescription certificate, a prescription certificate and renewals of a prescription certificate. The board may set reasonable application and renewal fees.

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The board shall promulgate rules establishing 5 G. the grounds for denial, suspension or revocation of 6 conditional prescription certificates and prescription 7 8 certificates authorized to be issued pursuant to this section, including a provision for suspension or revocation 9 of a license to practice psychology upon suspension or 10 revocation of a certificate. Actions of denial, suspension 11 or revocation of a certificate shall be in accordance with 12 the Uniform Licensing Act." 13

SECTION 6. Section 61-9-17.2 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2002, Chapter 100, Section 7) is amended to read: "61-9-17.2. PRESCRIBING PRACTICES.--

A. A prescribing psychologist or a psychologist with a conditional prescription certificate may administer and prescribe psychotropic medication within the recognized scope of the profession, including the ordering and review of laboratory tests in conjunction with the prescription, for the treatment of mental disorders.

B. When prescribing psychotropic medication for a patient, the prescribing psychologist or the psychologist with a conditional prescription certificate shall maintain an SB 9

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ongoing collaborative relationship with the health care practitioner who oversees the patient's general medical care to ensure that necessary medical examinations are conducted, the psychotropic medication is appropriate for the patient's medical condition and significant changes in the patient's medical or psychological condition are discussed.

7 C. The ongoing collaborative relationship shall be
8 maintained pursuant to guidelines developed by the board and
9 the New Mexico medical board, which shall optimize patient
10 care.

D. The guidelines shall ensure that the 11 prescribing psychologist or the psychologist with a 12 conditional prescription certificate and the health care 13 practitioner coordinate, and collaborate on, the care of the 14 patient to provide optimal care. Nothing in this subsection 15 shall require a prescribing psychologist or psychologist with 16 a conditional prescription certificate to give prior notice 17 to or obtain prior approval from a health care practitioner 18 to prescribe psychotropic medication to a patient with whom 19 the prescribing psychologist has established a 20 psychologist-patient relationship; provided that the 21 psychologist provides written notice of the prescription to 22 the health care practitioner within twenty-four hours of its 23 issuance to such patient. 24

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E. A committee composed of members of the board

1 and the New Mexico medical board shall be established and, 2 pursuant to the guidelines, shall evaluate complaints. The 3 committee shall report its findings and recommendations to each board for each board's appropriate actions. 4 F. A prescription written by a prescribing 5 psychologist or a psychologist with a conditional 6 prescription certificate shall: 7 8 (1) comply with applicable state and federal laws; 9 (2) be identified as issued by the 10 psychologist as "psychologist certified to prescribe"; and 11 include the psychologist's (3) 12 board-assigned identification number. 13 G. A prescribing psychologist or a psychologist 14 with a conditional prescription certificate shall not 15 delegate prescriptive authority to any other person. Records 16 of all prescriptions shall be maintained in patient records. 17 When authorized to prescribe controlled H. 18 substances, a prescribing psychologist or a psychologist with 19 a conditional prescription certificate shall file with the 20 board in a timely manner all individual federal drug 21 enforcement administration registrations and numbers. The 22 board and the New Mexico medical board shall maintain current 23 records on every psychologist, including federal 24 registrations and numbers. 25

1 I. The board shall provide to the board of 2 pharmacy and the New Mexico medical board an annual list of 3 prescribing psychologists and psychologists with conditional prescription certificates that contains the information 4 agreed upon between the board, the New Mexico medical board 5 and the board of pharmacy. The board shall promptly notify 6 the board of pharmacy of psychologists who are added to or 7 8 deleted from the list. J. For the purpose of this section: 9 "collaborative relationship" means a 10 (1)cooperative working relationship between a prescribing 11 psychologist or a psychologist with a conditional 12 prescription certificate and a health care practitioner in 13 the provision of patient care, including diagnosis and 14 cooperation in the management and delivery of physical and 15 mental health care; and 16 (2) "health care practitioner" means a 17 physician, osteopathic physician, nurse practitioner, 18 physician assistant or clinical nurse specialist." 19 SECTION 7. A new section of the Nursing Practice Act is 20 enacted to read: 21 "SUPERVISION OF PSYCHOLOGIST IN THE PRESCRIBING OF 22 PSYCHOTROPIC MEDICATION BY NURSE PRACTITIONER OR CLINICAL 23 NURSE SPECIALIST .--24 Subject to rules promulgated by the board, a Α. 25

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nurse practitioner or clinical nurse specialist may supervise a psychologist in the prescribing of psychotropic medication pursuant to the Professional Psychologist Act.

No later than January 1, 2020, the board shall Β. promulgate regulations for a nurse practitioner or clinical nurse specialist who supervises a psychologist in the 6 prescribing of psychotropic medication pursuant to the Professional Psychologist Act."

SECTION 8. A new section of the Professional 9 Psychologist Act is enacted to read: 10

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"PRESCRIPTION MONITORING PROGRAM--BOARD TO PROMULGATE RULES.--By January 1, 2020, the board shall promulgate rules 12 to carry out the provisions of the prescription monitoring 13 program established by Section 26-1-16.1 NMSA 1978 insofar as that program applies to prescribing psychologists." 15

SECTION 9. A new section of the Osteopathic Medicine Act is enacted to read:

"SUPERVISION OF PSYCHOLOGIST IN THE PRESCRIBING OF PSYCHOTROPIC MEDICATION BY OSTEOPATHIC PHYSICIAN. --

Subject to rules promulgated by the board, an Α. 20 osteopathic physician may supervise a psychologist in the 21 prescribing of psychotropic medication pursuant to the 22 Professional Psychologist Act. 23

No later than January 1, 2020, the board shall Β. 24 promulgate regulations for an osteopathic physician who
