Page 1, strike the title, enacting clause and entire bill and insert 16 17 "An Act relating to schools; making an appropriation to the State Board of Education; providing purpose; 18 directing the State Department of Education to establish certain pilot program to employ a literacy instructional team; providing for technical 19 assistance and program implementation guidance to 20 team members and schools; directing team members to be placed regionally statewide; providing duties for 2.1 team; providing training requirements for team members; providing for Department oversight of team; establishing minimum criteria for team employees; 22 providing hiring preferences for team members with 23 certain knowledge and training; requiring submission of report by certain date; prescribing contents of 24

report; providing for codification; providing an effective date; and declaring an emergency.

- BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
- 5 SECTION 1. There is hereby appropriated to the State Board of
- 6 | Education from any monies not otherwise appropriated from the
- 7 | General Revenue Fund of the State Treasury for the fiscal year
- 8 beginning July 1, 2023, the sum of Ten Million Dollars
- 9 (\$10,000,000.00). These monies shall be used to implement the
- 10 provisions of Section 2 of this act.
- 11 SECTION 2. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
- 12 | in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 1210.508H of Title 70, unless
- 13 | there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:
- 14 A. Beginning with the 2023-2024 school year, the State
- 15 Department of Education shall establish a three-year pilot program
- 16 to employ a literacy instructional team to support school districts
- 17 | in implementation of the requirements of Section 1210.508C of Title

- 19 assistance for literacy instruction, dyslexia, and related

- B. The Department shall employ a literacy instructional team
- 24 | with team members who are placed regionally across the state. The

- 1 | literacy instructional teams shall assist general education and
- 2 | special education teachers in recognizing educational needs to
- 3 | improve literacy outcomes for all students including those with
- 4 dyslexia or identified with the risk characteristics associated with
- 5 dyslexia. The role of the literacy instructional team shall also
- 6 include increasing professional awareness and instructional
- 7 | competencies to meet the educational needs of all students including
- 8 | those with dyslexia or identified with risk characteristics
- 9 associated with dyslexia. The Department shall prioritize supports
- 10 and interventions including enrollment in reading trainings and
- 11 | professional development for schools which have the highest
- 12 percentage of students who do not demonstrate sufficient reading
- 13 | skills as established by the State Board of Education.
- 14 C. Literacy instructional team members employed by the
- 15 | Department shall have training in:
- 16 1. The science of how students learn to read including
- 17 | phonological awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, comprehension,
- 18 writing, and language;
- 19 2. Foundation of multisensory, explicit, systematic, and
- 20 structured reading instruction;
- 3. Identification of and the appropriate interventions,
- 22 accommodations, and teaching techniques for struggling students;
- 4. The requirements of the Reading Sufficiency Act;
- 5. Special education laws and procedures; and

6. Appropriate interventions, accommodations, and assistive technology supports for students with dyslexia or a related disorder.

- D. The literacy instructional team members employed by the Department shall report to the Director of Reading Sufficiency and have:
- 1. A minimum of five regional literacy leads, at least one who shall be designated by the Department as a dyslexia specialist to provide school districts with support and resources that are necessary to assist students with dyslexia. The Department shall give preference to educators applying for regional literacy lead who:
 - a. have an endorsement or certification as a certified structured literacy dyslexia specialist or certified academic language therapist,
 - b. are knowledgeable of multitiered systems of support, and
 - c. have been trained in the identification of and intervention for dyslexia and related disorders including best practice interventions and treatment models for dyslexia; and
- 2. A minimum of ten literacy specialists. The Department shall give preference to educators applying for literacy specialist who:
 - a. have training in the science of reading,

1 b. are knowledgeable of multitiered systems of support, and have been trained in the identification of and 3 c. 4 intervention for dyslexia and related disorders 5 including best practice interventions and treatment models for dyslexia. 6 7 The State Department of Education shall submit a report to Ε. the Governor, the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, and the 8 Speaker of the House of Representatives by December 31, 2026, that 10 includes an evaluation of the pilot program by school districts, 11 data on whether the program had an impact on increasing the number 12 of students who demonstrate proficiency in reading, and 13 recommendations for changes to the Reading Sufficiency Act. 14 SECTION 3. This act shall become effective July 1, 2023. 15 SECTION 4. It being immediately necessary for the preservation 16 of the public peace, health, or safety, an emergency is hereby 17 declared to exist, by reason whereof this act shall take effect and 18 be in full force from and after its passage and approval." 19 20 2.1 22 23

14	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
15	SECTION 5. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 6-133, is
16	amended to read as follows:
17	Section 6-133. A. As used in this section:
18	1. "Provider" means an eligible entity that seeks or has
19	obtained approval of an alternative teacher preparation program
20	consistent with this section; and
21	2. "Program" means content provided by a provider that leads
22	toward licensure in a specific content area.
23	B. The State Board of Education shall identify providers to

implement new and innovative pathways toward teacher certification

- on a pilot program basis. Providers seeking to participate in the pilot program shall submit applications to the State Board of Education.
 - C. A provider chosen by the State Board of Education to participate in the pilot program shall offer a program that:
 - 1. Provides evidence and history of fiscal solvency, capacity, operation, and program effectiveness;
 - 2. Provides evidence of necessary infrastructure to provide accurate, timely, and secure data for the purpose of admission, teacher candidate monitoring, testing, and certification recommendations;
 - 3. Has policies and procedures in place ensuring the security of teacher candidate records under applicable laws and regulations;
 - 4. Has the instructional capacity or within an existing novice teacher support program, the ability to obtain the instructional capacity, or has established a partnership with an accredited higher education institution to provide adequate instruction in accordance with this subsection;
 - 5. Offers an instructional phase that provides intensive preparation before the teacher candidates assume classroom responsibilities;
- 6. Offers a research-based and results-oriented approach focused on best teaching practices to increase student achievement and growth measured against state academic standards;

- 7. Provides assessment, supervision, and evaluation of teacher candidates to determine their specific needs throughout the program and to support efforts to successfully complete the program;
- 8. Provides intensive and ongoing professional development opportunities that accelerate a teacher candidate's professional growth, support student learning, and provide a workplace orientation, professional staff development, and mentoring;
- 9. Offers peer review focused on standards of professional practice and continuous professional growth; and
- 10. Provides a process to review a teacher candidate's final competency of required certification content standards that leads to a potential candidate being recommended for teacher certification in accordance with subsection F of this section.
- D. The State Board of Education shall ensure that providers approved to participate in the pilot program allow teacher candidates to demonstrate pedagogy and content standard proficiency in school-based programs and through other nontraditional means.

 Nontraditional means may include, but not be limited to, previous work experience, teacher experience, educator evaluations, industry-recognized certifications, and other essentially equivalent demonstrations.
- E. If the State Board of Education determines that a provider fails to meet or is deficient in any of the requirements of this section, it may suspend or revoke the approval of the provider after

- providing notification of the deficiencies and an opportunity to remedy the deficiencies.
- F. A teacher candidate that completes a program offered by an approved provider shall be eligible for certification, provided he or she meets the certification requirements set forth in Section 6-187 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes this title in the area of specialization for which certification is sought and is recommended for certification by the approved provider.
- G. The State Board of Education shall issue a certificate to teach to any person who meets the requirements set forth in this section and who has on file with the Board a current Oklahoma criminal history record check from the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation as well as a national criminal history record check as defined in Section 150.9 of Title 74 of the Oklahoma Statutes. The person applying for the certificate shall be responsible for the cost of the criminal history records record checks.
- H. A provider shall submit a report to the State Department of Education after one (1) year of operation showing the percentage of teacher candidates who have completed the program and who have successfully completed or who have failed the competency examinations for certification and the provider's efforts to help candidates successfully pass the examinations. A provider shall annually submit evidence a report to the State Department of

1	Education after the pilot year with evidence of outlining the
2	success of the program.
3	I. The State Board of Education may promulgate rules to
4	implement the provisions of this section.
5	J. The pilot program created in this section shall end no later
6	than July 1, 2024 <u>2026</u> .
7	SECTION 6. This act shall become effective July 1, 2023.
8	SECTION 7. It being immediately necessary for the preservation
9	of the public peace, health or safety, an emergency is hereby
10	declared to exist, by reason whereof this act shall take effect and
11	be in full force from and after its passage and approval.
