14	criteria for expenditure; providing for change in expenditure purpose; creating the Teacher Salary
15	Supplement Committee; establishing duties; providing for appointments to the Teacher Salary Supplement
16	Committee; providing for staggered terms and appointment of successors; providing for removal for
17	cause; providing for travel reimbursement; providing for election of officers; limiting terms; requiring
18	quorum to transact business; directing adherence to certain Acts; providing for staffing; providing for
19	submission of certain report on expenditures; prohibiting the supplanting or replacement of certain
20	existing state funds; directing the State Board of Equalization to examine and investigate expenditures,
21	issue findings and a report; providing for supplanted amount to be specified by the Board; requiring the
22	Legislature to replenish state funding under certain circumstances; creating the Oklahoma Building Bonds
23	Common Education Sinking Fund; providing for use of fund; directing the State Treasurer to make certain
24	deposits; amending 62 O.S. 2011, Section 57.303, as

last amended by Section 435, Chapter 304, O.S.L. 2012 (62 O.S. Supp. 2014, Section 57.303); directing the Oklahoma Building Bonds Commission to perform certain other duties; providing for codification; and providing an effective date.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:

6 SECTION 1. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified 7 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 4021 of Title 70, unless there 8 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

9 There is hereby created a trust fund to be known as the Α. "Common Education Trust Fund" to support teacher salary supplements, 10 11 recruit and retain teachers, programs that benefit all students in 12 the state, and other educational endeavors. The trust fund principal shall consist of all funds generated through the issuance 13 of obligations authorized by Enrolled Senate Joint Resolution No. 15 14 15 of the 1st Session of the 55th Oklahoma Legislature and any other monies that may be appropriated or otherwise directed to the trust 16 fund by the Legislature. 17

B. There is hereby created the Board of Investors of the Common
Education Trust Fund. The Board of Investors of the Common
Education Trust Fund shall:

Manage the assets of the Common Education Trust Fund;
 Invest the Common Education Trust Fund monies exercising the
 judgment and care, under circumstances then prevailing, which
 persons of prudence, discretion and intelligence exercise in the

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1 management of their own affairs, not for speculation, but with 2 regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the 3 probable safety of their capital as well as the probable income to 4 be derived; and

3. Certify, on or before September 1 of each year, the amount
of funds available for expenditure each year from the Common
Education Trust Fund, which shall be limited to the earnings from
the trust fund, including but not limited to interest, dividends,
and realized capital gains from investments of the trust fund for
the previous fiscal year ending June 30.

11 C. The Board of Investors of the Common Education Trust Fund 12 shall be composed of five (5) members as follows:

The State Treasurer, or a designee, who shall serve as
 chair;

15 2. An appointee of the Governor;

16 3. An appointee of the State Auditor and Inspector;

4. An appointee of the Speaker of the House of Representatives;and

5. An appointee of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate.
 Each appointed member of the Board of Investors of the Common
 Education Trust Fund shall have demonstrated experience in public or
 private investment fund management.

D. The initially appointed members shall serve staggered termsas follows:

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The term of the appointee of the Governor shall expire on
 June 30, 2016;

3 2. The term of the appointee of the State Auditor and Inspector4 shall expire on June 30, 2017;

5 3. The term of the appointee of the Speaker of the House of6 Representatives shall end on June 30, 2018; and

7 4. The term of the appointee of the President Pro Tempore of8 the Senate shall expire on June 30, 2019.

9 Thereafter, successors shall be appointed for terms of four (4)10 years. An appointee may be removed for cause.

E. Members of the Board of Investors of the Common Education Trust Fund shall receive no salary for serving on the Board of Investors of the Common Education Trust Fund. All members shall receive necessary travel expenses for the performance of their duties from the Office of the Governor in accordance with the provisions of the State Travel Reimbursement Act.

F. The Board of Investors of the Common Education Trust Fund 17 shall annually elect a vice chair, who shall preside over meetings 18 in the absence of the chair, and any other officers, provided that 19 no member shall be elected vice chair for more than two (2) 20 consecutive years. The Board of Investors of the Common Education 21 Trust Fund shall meet at least quarterly. Three (3) members of the 22 Board of Investors of the Common Education Trust Fund shall 23 constitute a quorum to transact business, but no vacancy shall 24

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impair the right of the remaining members to exercise all of the
 powers of the Board of Investors of the Common Education Trust Fund.

G. The Board of Investors of the Common Education Trust Fund
shall be subject to the Oklahoma Open Meeting Act, the Oklahoma Open
Records Act and the Administrative Procedures Act.

6 H. Staffing for the Board of Investors of the Common Education7 Trust Fund shall be provided by the Office of the State Treasurer.

8 I. The Board of Investors of the Common Education Trust Fund 9 shall submit a report of the Common Education Trust Fund's 10 investments and asset value annually to the Governor, the State 11 Treasurer, the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the 12 President Pro Tempore of the Senate.

J. On or before September 30 of each year, the State Treasurer shall transfer the amount certified by the Board of Investors for the Common Education Trust Fund available for expenditure each year from the Common Education Trust Fund to the State Department of Education.

18 K. Earnings from the Common Education Trust Fund shall be 19 expended for the following purposes:

## 20 1. Supplement teacher salaries;

2. Recruit and retain common education teachers certified to
 teach science, technology, engineering, mathematics or medicine
 courses;

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3. Recruit and retain faculty and staff certified to teach
 science, technology, engineering, mathematics or medicine courses in
 technology center schools;

4 4. Fund programs and opportunities that benefit all students in5 the State of Oklahoma; and

5. Support other educational endeavors as directed by the7 Legislature.

8 L. The Legislature may change the purposes for which 9 expenditures may be made to address specific issues in common 10 education.

11 SECTION 2. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified 12 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 4022 of Title 70, unless there 13 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

14 A. There is hereby created the Teacher Salary Supplement15 Committee. The Teacher Salary Supplement Committee shall:

Review the salaries of teachers in the state to determine if
 salary supplements are appropriate and the amount of such
 supplements, if they are deemed appropriate; and

Solicit proposals for programs and opportunities that would
 benefit all students in the State of Oklahoma and determine if
 funding is warranted.

B. The Teacher Salary Supplement Committee shall be composed ofseven (7) members as follows:

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A member from the state at large, to be appointed by the
 President Pro Tempore of the Senate, who shall serve as chair;
 A member from the state at large, to be appointed by the
 Speaker of the House of Representatives;

3. A member from a statewide organization representing public
school teachers, to be appointed by the Commissioners of the Land
Office;

8 4. A member from a statewide organization representing public
9 school administrators, to be appointed by the Commissioners of the
10 Land Office;

5. A member from a statewide organization representing parents of public school students, to be appointed by the Commissioners of the Land Office;

14 6. A member who represents a technology center school, to be15 appointed by the Commissioners of the Land Office; and

167. A member from a statewide business organization, to be17 appointed by the Commissioners of the Land Office.

18 C. The initially appointed members shall serve staggered terms 19 as follows:

The term of the appointee of the President Pro Tempore of
 the Senate shall expire on June 30, 2016;

22 2. The term of the appointee of the Speaker of the House of23 Representatives shall expire on June 30, 2017;

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3. The term of the appointee from a statewide organization
 representing public school teachers shall end on June 30, 2018;

3 4. The term of the appointee from a statewide organization
4 representing public school administrators shall expire on June 30,
5 2019;

5. The term of the appointee from a statewide organization
representing parents of public school students shall expire on June
30, 2020;

9 6. The term of the appointee who represents a technology center10 school district shall expire on June 30, 2021; and

11 7. The term of the appointee from a statewide business12 organization shall expire on June 30, 2022.

13 Thereafter, successors shall be appointed for terms of four (4)14 years. An appointee may be removed for cause.

D. Members of the Teacher Salary Supplement Committee shall receive no salary for serving on the Committee. All members shall receive necessary travel expenses for the performance of their duties from the Office of the Governor in accordance with the provisions of the State Travel Reimbursement Act.

E. The Teacher Salary Supplement Committee shall annually elect a vice chair, who shall preside over meetings in the absence of the chair, and any other officers, provided that no member shall be elected vice chair for more than two (2) consecutive years. The Teacher Salary Supplement Committee shall meet at least quarterly.

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Four (4) members of the Teacher Salary Supplement Committee shall constitute a quorum to transact business, but no vacancy shall impair the right of the remaining members to exercise all of the powers of the Teacher Salary Supplement Committee.

F. The Teacher Salary Supplement Committee shall be subject to
the Oklahoma Open Meeting Act, the Oklahoma Open Records Act and the
Administrative Procedures Act.

8 G. Staffing for the Teacher Salary Supplement Committee shall9 be provided by the State Department of Education.

H. Each fiscal year, the Teacher Salary Supplement Committee
shall submit a report to the President Pro Tempore of the Senate,
Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Governor on
expenditures made from the Common Education Trust Fund.

14 SECTION 3. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified 15 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 4023 of Title 70, unless there 16 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

A. The monies expended from the Common Education Trust Fund shall not be used to supplant or replace existing state funds used for the financial support of public schools and technology center schools.

B. In order to ensure that the funds expended from the Common
Education Trust Fund are used to enhance and not supplant state
funds used for the financial support of public schools and
technology center schools, the State Board of Equalization shall

examine and investigate legislative appropriations made for the 1 2 financial support of public schools and technology center schools 3 each year. At the meeting of the State Board of Equalization held in February of each year, the State Board of Equalization shall 4 5 issue a finding and report which shall state whether funds from the Common Education Trust Fund were used to enhance or supplant 6 legislative appropriations made for the financial support of public 7 schools and technology center schools. If the State Board of 8 9 Equalization finds that legislative appropriations made for the 10 financial support of public schools and technology center schools 11 were supplanted by funds expended from the Common Education Trust Fund, the Board shall specify the amount by which such funding was 12 supplanted. In this event, the Legislature shall make an 13 appropriation for the ensuing fiscal year in the amount by which 14 15 such funding was supplanted.

16 SECTION 4. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified 17 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 57.318 of Title 62, unless there 18 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

A. There is hereby created in the State Treasury a special fund to be known and designated as the "Oklahoma Building Bonds Common Education Sinking Fund", which is hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the interest on and the principal of the obligations issued pursuant to Enrolled Senate Joint Resolution No. 15 of the 1st Session of the 55th Oklahoma Legislature. The monies to the

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credit thereof shall be paid out only in the manner and at the time
 and places provided for in the resolution or indenture of the
 Oklahoma Building Bonds Commission authorizing the issuance of such
 obligations.

5 в. Upon receiving the monthly transmittal of the state sales tax revenue collected pursuant to the Oklahoma Sales Tax Code, it 6 7 shall be the duty of the State Treasurer to set aside, from revenues that would otherwise be apportioned to the General Revenue Fund, an 8 9 amount equal to one-twelfth (1/12) of the principal payment and one-10 sixth (1/6) of the interest payment on the obligations issued 11 pursuant to Senate Joint Resolution No. 15 of the 1st Session of the 12 55th Oklahoma Legislature. The State Treasurer shall deposit such monies into the Oklahoma Building Bonds Common Education Sinking 13 Fund for debt service payments. 14

15 SECTION 5. AMENDATORY 62 O.S. 2011, Section 57.303, as 16 last amended by Section 435, Chapter 304, O.S.L. 2012 (62 O.S. Supp. 17 2014, Section 57.303), is amended to read as follows:

Section 57.303. A. The <u>Oklahoma Building Bonds</u> Commission acting for and on behalf of the State of Oklahoma shall be the agency by and through which the State of Oklahoma shall incur indebtedness in the sum of Three Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$350,000,000.00) as principal for the purpose of restoring and modernizing the state's infrastructure, for constructing new buildings and other capital improvements, and for equipping,

The Commission, acting for and on behalf of the State of 4 Β. 5 Oklahoma, shall issue, sell and deliver as hereinafter provided "Oklahoma Building Bonds of 1992" in a total principal amount of 6 Three Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$350,000,000.00). It is hereby 7 expressly provided and pledged for the benefit of the purchasers, 8 9 owners and holders of said bonds that the tax on each package of 10 cigarettes levied by Section 302 of Title 68 of the Oklahoma 11 Statutes, constituting the remainder of revenue available from the 12 revenues lawfully levied and collected by the State of Oklahoma on the sale of cigarettes not already committed to other obligations of 13 the State of Oklahoma, and the tax levy on cigarettes pursuant to 14 Sections 302-2 and 302-4 of Title 68 of the Oklahoma Statutes, or so 15 much as may be necessary, shall be devoted irrevocably to the 16 payment and discharge of the interest on, and the principal of, the 17 bonds issued hereunder as the same become due, and to create an 18 adequate reserve to assure such payments when due; and said revenues 19 shall be, and hereby are, irrevocably pledged for such purposes. 20

<u>C. The Commission shall perform other duties as directed by the</u>
 <u>Legislature.</u>
