AN ACT

Amending the act of October 5, 1978 (P.L.1109, No.261), entitled 1 "An act requiring the licensing of practitioners of 2 osteopathic medicine and surgery; regulating their practice; providing for certain funds and penalties for violations and repeals," further providing for reasons for refusal, revocation or suspension of license. 5 6 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows: 9 Section 1. Section 15(a)(3) of the act of October 5, 1978 10 (P.L.1109, No.261), known as the Osteopathic Medical Practice 11 Act, is amended to read: Section 15. Reasons for refusal, revocation or suspension of 12 13 license. 14 The board shall have authority to refuse, revoke or 15 suspend the license of a physician for any of the following 16 reasons: 17 (3) Conviction of a felony, a crime involving moral 18 19 turpitude, or a crime related to the practice of osteopathic

- 1 medicine. Conviction shall include a finding or verdict of
- 2 guilt, an admission of guilt or a plea of nolo contendere, or
- 3 receiving probation without verdict, disposition in lieu of
- 4 trial, or an Accelerated Rehabilitative Disposition in the
- 5 disposition of felony charges. <u>Notwithstanding any other</u>
- 6 provision of this act, if a physician is convicted of an
- 7 offense under section 13(a)(12) of the act of April 14, 1972
- 8 (P.L.233, No.64), known as "The Controlled Substance, Drug,
- 9 Device and Cosmetic Act," or a substantially similar offense
- in another state, the board shall permanently revoke the
- 11 <u>license of the physician.</u>

- 13 Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
