## AN ACT

7	The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
8	hereby enacts as follows:
9	Section 1. Section 15(a)(3) of the act of October 5, 1978
10	(P.L.1109, No.261), known as the Osteopathic Medical Practice
11	Act, is amended to read:
12	Section 15. Reasons for refusal, revocation or suspension of
13	license.
14	(a) The board shall have authority to refuse, revoke or
15	suspend the license of a physician for any of the following
16	reasons:
17	* * *
18	(3) Conviction of a felony, a crime involving moral
19	turpitude, or a crime related to the practice of osteopathic

1	medicine. Conviction shall include a finding or verdict of
2	guilt, an admission of guilt or a plea of nolo contendere, or
3	receiving probation without verdict, disposition in lieu of
4	trial, or an Accelerated Rehabilitative Disposition in the
5	disposition of felony charges. Notwithstanding any other
6	provision of this act, if a physician is convicted of an
7	offense under section 13(a)(12) of the act of April 14, 1972
8	(P.L.233, No.64), known as "The Controlled Substance, Drug,
9	Device and Cosmetic Act," or a substantially similar offense
10	in another state, the board shall permanently revoke the
11	license of the physician.

13	Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
