## AN ACT

- Amending Title 42 (Judiciary and Judicial Procedure) of the 1
- Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in sentencing, providing 2
- for alternative sentencing for primary caretakers.
- The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania 4
- hereby enacts as follows:
- 6 Section 1. Title 42 of the Pennsylvania Consolidated
- Statutes is amended by adding a section to read:
- § 9722.1. Alternative sentencing for primary caretakers. 8
- 9 (a) Sentencing. -- Notwithstanding any other provision of law
- 10 and except as otherwise provided under this section, immediately
- after the conviction of an individual for a nonviolent offense, 11
- the court shall determine if the person convicted is a primary 12
- caretaker of a dependent child. If the court determines that the 13
- 14 person convicted of a nonviolent offense is a primary caretaker
- 15 of a dependent child, the court shall impose an individually
- assessed sentence without confinement in a prison, work camp, 16
- halfway facility or similar institution and based on community 17

- 1 rehabilitation with a focus on parent-child unity and support.
- 2 (b) Conditions. -- In imposing a sentence on a primary
- 3 caretaker of a dependent child convicted of a nonviolent
- 4 offense, the court may require the individual to meet certain
- 5 conditions that the court considers appropriate, including, but
- 6 not limited to, any of the following:
- 7 (1) Drug and alcohol treatment.
- 8 (2) Domestic violence education and prevention.
- 9 <u>(3) Physical and sexual abuse counseling.</u>
- 10 <u>(4) Anger management.</u>
- 11 (5) Vocational and educational services.
- 12 (6) Job training and placement education.
- 13 (7) Affordable and safe housing assistance education.
- 14 <u>(8) Financial literacy.</u>
- 15 (9) Parenting classes.
- 16 (10) Family and individual counseling.
- 17 (11) Family case management services.
- 18 (c) Appearance. -- The court may require a primary caretaker
- 19 of a dependent child serving a sentence under this section to
- 20 appear in court at any time during the individual's sentence for
- 21 the following purposes:
- 22 (1) Evaluating the individual's progress in treatment or
- 23 rehabilitation.
- 24 (2) Determining if the individual has violated any
- 25 condition of the sentence.
- 26 (d) Modification. -- During an appearance in court under
- 27 <u>subsection (c), the court may:</u>
- 28 (1) modify the conditions of a sentence imposed in
- 29 accordance with this section;
- 30 (2) decrease the duration of a sentence imposed under

1	this section based on the individual's successful
2	advancement; or
3	(3) sanction the individual for a violation of any
4	condition of the sentence imposed under this section,
5	including, but not limited to, requiring the individual to
6	serve a term of imprisonment within the range of the sentence
7	for an individual who is not a primary caretaker of a
8	dependent child as specified under the laws of this
9	Commonwealth.
10	(e) Definitions As used in this section, the following
11	words and phrases shall have the meanings given to them in this
12	subsection unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:
13	"Dependent child." An individual who is under 18 years of
14	age.
15	"Nonviolent offense." An offense which is not a crime of
16	violence as defined in section 9714(g) (relating to sentences
17	for second and subsequent offenses).
18	"Primary caretaker of a dependent child." As follows:
19	(1) Any of the following:
20	(i) A parent who has consistently assumed
21	responsibility for the housing, health and safety of a
22	child prior to incarceration.
23	(ii) A woman who has given birth to a child after or
24	while awaiting her sentencing hearing and expresses a
25	willingness to assume responsibility for the housing,
26	health and safety of her child.
27	(2) A parent who, in the best interest of the child, has

	arranged for the temporary care of the child in the home of a
29	arranged for the temporary care of the child in the home of a relative or other responsible adult shall not, for that
