## A RESOLUTION

- Recognizing the week of October 18 through 24, 2020, as "National Teen Driver Safety Week" in Pennsylvania.
- WHEREAS, Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death 3
- for adolescents and young adults, 15 to 18 years of age, in the
- 5 United States and many of these deaths are preventable; and
- WHEREAS, In 2018, there were 2,121 people killed in crashes 6
- 7 involving a teen passenger driver of which 719 deaths were the
- 8 teen driver; and
- WHEREAS, The crash rate in the United States for teen
- drivers, based on miles driven, is nearly three times the crash 10
- 11 rate for drivers 20 years of age or older; and
- 12 WHEREAS, In 2018, among teen drivers involved in fatal
- 13 crashes, almost 10% were reported as distracted at the time of
- 14 the crash; and
- WHEREAS, Wearing a seat belt is one of the simplest ways for 15
- 16 teens to stay safe; and

- 1 WHEREAS, Forty-five percent of teen drivers who have died
- 2 were not wearing a seat belt and 9 out of 10 of the passengers
- 3 in a teen driver's fatal crash were also not wearing a seat
- 4 belt; and
- 5 WHEREAS, More than 28% of all teen drivers of passenger
- 6 vehicles involved in fatal crashes were speeding at the time of
- 7 the crash, and males were more likely to be involved in fatal
- 8 crashes than females; and
- 9 WHEREAS, It is necessary to explore effective ways to reduce
- 10 the crash risk for young drivers by focusing research and
- 11 outreach efforts on areas of teen driving that show the most
- 12 promise for improving safety; and
- 13 WHEREAS, The National Young Driver Survey, developed with
- 14 input from teenagers and administered by the Children's Hospital
- 15 of Philadelphia, demonstrates a nationwide need to increase
- 16 overall awareness about the safe use of electronic handheld
- 17 devices, the risks of nighttime and fatigued driving, the
- 18 importance of consistent seat belt use and the practice of
- 19 gradually increasing driver privileges over time as a young
- 20 driver gains more experience under supervised conditions; and
- 21 WHEREAS, Recognizing the third week of October as "National
- 22 Teen Driver Safety Week" is expected to increase awareness of
- 23 these important issues among teenagers and the adults who care
- 24 about them in this Commonwealth; and
- 25 WHEREAS, Avoiding impaired driving helps teens avoid becoming
- 26 a statistic; therefore be it
- 27 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize the
- 28 week of October 18 through 24, 2020, as "National Teen Driver
- 29 Safety Week" in Pennsylvania.
