A RESOLUTION

Urging the United States Environmental Protection Agency to exercise its waiver authority in Clean Air Act Section 211(o) 2 (7)(A)(i) to reduce nationwide Renewable Fuel Standard volume 3 mandates to provide relief to refiners in Pennsylvania, the 4 East Coast and elsewhere and to implement additional reforms going forward which will allow for the blending of renewable fuels consistent with the original intention of the Renewable 7 Fuel Standard program, while containing costs for independent 8 refiners. 9 10 WHEREAS, In the last year, spiking Renewable Identification Number (RIN) prices and the dramatic reduction in the use of 11 12 fuel precipitated by the COVID-19 pandemic have devastated 13 United States refiners, leading to refinery closures across the 14 country; and 15 WHEREAS, The United States Environmental Protection Agency 16 (EPA) has authority to waive the Renewable Fuel Standard (RFS) 17 program's renewable fuel requirements "in whole or in part" if 18 the EPA Administrator determines that "implementation of the 19 requirement would severely harm the economy" of a "State, a 20 region, or the United States"; and WHEREAS, Many refineries already struggle with slim margins, 21

- 1 and the RFS program's RIN requirements and the manner in which
- 2 the RIN market operates are currently inflicting serious
- 3 economic harm on those businesses; and
- 4 WHEREAS, Current RFS compliance expenses exceed refineries'
- 5 annual labor, utilities and maintenance expenses combined,
- 6 making the compliance costs refineries' largest expense other
- 7 than crude oil; and
- 8 WHEREAS, RINs have dramatically increased from about 14 cents
- 9 at the beginning of 2020 to nearly \$2.00 today, resulting in
- 10 roughly 30 additional cents per gallon to the cost of making
- 11 gasoline; and
- 12 WHEREAS, The harmful effects of the RFS program are
- 13 especially severe in the current market conditions, with the
- 14 demand for refined products suppressed by the COVID-19 pandemic
- 15 and not expected to fully recover in the near future; and
- 16 WHEREAS, The pandemic caused an unprecedented year-over-year
- 17 decline in the demand for petroleum and other liquid fuels,
- 18 leading to temporary and permanent refinery closures and other
- 19 capacity reductions throughout the United States; and
- 20 WHEREAS, The United States Department of Energy, Energy
- 21 Information Administration (EIA), has shown for several years
- 22 that there is no relationship between RIN price and the amount
- 23 of ethanol actually blended into the gasoline supply; and
- 24 WHEREAS, The EIA recently noted that in 2020, 800 million
- 25 fewer RINs were actually generated than what was required to
- 26 meet the 2020 RFS standard; and
- 27 WHEREAS, According to a study performed by the Commonwealth
- 28 of Pennsylvania, each refining job in southeastern Pennsylvania
- 29 has a large multiplier effect on the regional and national
- 30 economy, supporting an estimated 18.3 jobs in southeastern

- 1 Pennsylvania, 22 jobs across this Commonwealth and 61 jobs
- 2 nationwide, many of which are in the skilled trades; and
- 3 WHEREAS, Refining and petrochemical industries contribute
- 4 approximately \$600 billion annually to the national economy and
- 5 employ over three million industrial workers in 33 states; and
- 6 WHEREAS, The recent Colonial Pipeline hacking incident has
- 7 shown the vulnerability of the nation's energy supply and
- 8 highlights the need to keep our refineries open; and
- 9 WHEREAS, Governor Tom Wolf has already petitioned the EPA to
- 10 issue a waiver from RFS volume mandates to address the severe
- 11 economic harm caused by the mandates; therefore be it
- 12 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives urge the United
- 13 States Environmental Protection Agency to exercise its waiver
- 14 authority in Clean Air Act Section 211(o)(7)(A)(i) to reduce
- 15 nationwide Renewable Fuel Standard volume mandates to provide
- 16 relief to refiners in Pennsylvania, the East Coast and elsewhere
- 17 and to implement additional reforms going forward which will
- 18 allow for the blending of renewable fuels consistent with the
- 19 original intention of the Renewable Fuel Standard program, while
- 20 containing costs for independent refiners; and be it further
- 21 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives urge the Biden
- 22 Administration and the Environmental Protection Agency to set
- 23 2021 and 2022 volumes, and reform and restructure the RFS
- 24 program going forward, so as to maintain low and stable RIN
- 25 prices while allowing for the blending of renewable fuels
- 26 consistent with the original intention of the program.
