A RESOLUTION

- Recognizing the month of March 2019 as "National Women's History Month" and March 8, 2019, as "International Women's Day" in
- Pennsylvania. 3
- WHEREAS, Women of every race, class and ethnic background
- 5 have made historic contributions to the growth and strength of
- the nation and the world in countless recorded and unrecorded 6
- 7 ways; and
- 8 WHEREAS, American women have played and continue to play a
- critical economic, cultural and social role in every sphere of
- life in the nation by constituting a significant portion of the 10
- labor force, working inside and outside the home; and 11
- 12 WHEREAS, American women were particularly important in the
- 13 establishment of early charitable, philanthropic and cultural
- 14 institutions in the nation; and
- WHEREAS, American women have been leaders, securing their own 15
- rights of suffrage and equal opportunity; and 16

- 1 WHEREAS, Through their contributions to the abolitionist
- 2 movement, the emancipation movement, the industrial labor
- 3 movement, the civil rights movement and especially the peace
- 4 movement, American women have created a more fair and just
- 5 society for all; and
- 6 WHEREAS, Despite these contributions, the role of women in
- 7 history has been consistently overlooked and undervalued in the
- 8 literature, teaching and study of American and world history;
- 9 and
- 10 WHEREAS, After the American Revolution, the notion of
- 11 education as a safeguard for democracy created opportunities for
- 12 women to gain a basic education only; and
- 13 WHEREAS, Pioneers of secondary education for young women
- 14 faced arguments from physicians and others that females were
- 15 incapable of intellectual development equal to that of men and
- 16 would be harmed by striving for it; and
- 17 WHEREAS, Women's commitment to educational equality
- 18 throughout academia has resulted in their involvement and
- 19 ascension in politics and government; and
- 20 WHEREAS, The National Women's History Project began with a
- 21 proclamation by President Jimmy Carter that declared the week of
- 22 March 8, 1980, as the first "National Women's History Week"; and
- 23 WHEREAS, This year, the theme for "National Women's History
- 24 Month, " "Visionary Women: Champions of Peace and Nonviolence,"
- 25 honors women who have led efforts to end war, violence and
- 26 injustice and pioneered the use of nonviolence to change
- 27 society; and
- 28 WHEREAS, Against social conventions and legal constraints,
- 29 women have created a legacy that broadens the frontiers of
- 30 possibility for future generations; and

- 1 WHEREAS, Women have demonstrated their character, courage and
- 2 commitment as mothers, educators, institution builders, relief
- 3 workers, CEOs and leaders in business, politics, religion and
- 4 their communities; and
- 5 WHEREAS, Women's lives and work inspire girls and women to
- 6 achieve their full potential and encourage boys and men to
- 7 respect the diversity and depth of women's experience; and
- 8 WHEREAS, The first "International Women's Day" was held in
- 9 1911; and
- 10 WHEREAS, "International Women's Day" is now celebrated
- 11 annually on March 8; and
- 12 WHEREAS, On "International Women's Day," thousands of events
- 13 are held throughout the world to inspire women and celebrate the
- 14 social, political and economic achievements of women while
- 15 focusing world attention on areas requiring further action; and
- 16 WHEREAS, This year, the theme of "International Women's Day"
- 17 is "#BalanceforBetter," which is a call to action for driving
- 18 gender balance across the world; and
- 19 WHEREAS, The vast array of communication channels, supportive
- 20 spokespeople, equality research, campaigns and corporate
- 21 responsibility initiatives means that everyone can be an
- 22 advocate inspiring change for women's advancement; and
- 23 WHEREAS, Thousands of events are occurring to mark the
- 24 economic, political and social achievements of women as
- 25 organizations, governments, charities, educational institutions,
- 26 women's groups, corporations and the media celebrate the day;
- 27 and
- WHEREAS, "National Women's History Month" and "International
- 29 Women's Day" observances are ideal venues for all Pennsylvanians
- 30 to reflect on women's struggle for equal educational rights and

- 1 their significant contributions to this Commonwealth and the
- 2 nation; and
- 3 WHEREAS, Recognizing the month of March 2019 as "National
- 4 Women's History Month" and March 8, 2019, as "International
- 5 Women's Day" highlights the achievements of the women across
- 6 this Commonwealth and the nation who have created a more fair
- 7 and just society for all people; therefore be it
- 8 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize the
- 9 month of March 2019 as "National Women's History Month" and
- 10 March 8, 2019, as "International Women's Day" in Pennsylvania
- 11 and invite the women, men and children of this Commonwealth to
- 12 explore the critical economic, cultural and social roles women
- 13 have played and continue to play in every sphere of life in this
- 14 Commonwealth and the nation.
