INTRODUCED AS NONCONTROVERSIAL RESOLUTION UNDER RULE 35, APRIL 2, 2019

A RESOLUTION

- Designating April 27, 2019, as "Don't Text and Drive Day" in Pennsylvania.
- 3 WHEREAS, Texting while driving poses a significant risk to
- 4 drivers, passengers, pedestrians and other individuals sharing
- 5 the road; and
- 6 WHEREAS, Texting while driving can lead to devastating
- 7 injuries, fatalities and property damage; and
- 8 WHEREAS, With behaviors encompassing manual, visual and
- 9 cognitive tasks, texting while driving is one of the most
- 10 dangerous driver distractions; and
- 11 WHEREAS, Evidence shows the prevalence of texting while
- 12 driving, its dangers on our roadways, its damage to property and
- 13 its destruction of lives and livelihoods through injury or
- 14 death; and
- 15 WHEREAS, Sending or receiving a text message diverts a

- 1 driver's attention for approximately 5 seconds, which at 55
- 2 miles per hour means blindly driving the length of a football
- 3 field; and
- 4 WHEREAS, The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration
- 5 (NHTSA) has found that the percentage of drivers text messaging
- 6 or visibly manipulating handheld devices increased from 1.6% in
- 7 2013 to 2.0% in 2016; and
- 8 WHEREAS, NHTSA's most recent data shows that texting while
- 9 driving creates a crash risk 23 times greater than driving while
- 10 not distracted; and
- 11 WHEREAS, The National Safety Council estimates that cell
- 12 phone-related vehicle accidents account for 27% of all crashes
- 13 and texting-related vehicle accidents account for 6% of all
- 14 crashes; and
- WHEREAS, A 2016 United States Department of Transportation
- 16 study notes that, at any given moment during daylight hours,
- 17 more than 481,000 vehicles were driven by someone using a
- 18 handheld cell phone; and
- 19 WHEREAS, Data collected by the University of Michigan
- 20 Transportation Research Institute shows that approximately 25%
- 21 of teenagers have responded to a text message while driving and
- 22 that 20% of teenagers and 10% of parents have had extended
- 23 multimessage texting conversations while driving; and
- 24 WHEREAS, The Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts has
- 25 reported that 12,201 distracted driving violations were cited in
- 26 Pennsylvania between 2012 and 2017 and approximately 7,889 of
- 27 those violations were specific to texting; and
- 28 WHEREAS, The Pennsylvania Department of Transportation's PA
- 29 Crash Facts & Statistics indicate that fatalities occurred in
- 30 371 of the 89,424 crashes involving distracted driving in this

- 1 Commonwealth between 2012 and 2017; and
- 2 WHEREAS, The mounting dangers of texting while driving have
- 3 validated actions of the General Assembly to reduce texting
- 4 while driving; and
- 5 WHEREAS, Act No. 98 of 2011 prohibits drivers from operating
- 6 a motor vehicle on a highway or trafficway in this Commonwealth
- 7 while using an interactive wireless communications device to
- 8 send, read or write text-based communication; and
- 9 WHEREAS, Act No. 85 of 2014 prohibits drivers from engaging
- 10 in texting while operating a commercial motor vehicle or motor
- 11 carrier vehicle; and
- 12 WHEREAS, Act No. 165 of 2016 increases penalties for the
- 13 offense of homicide by vehicle and for the offense of aggravated
- 14 assault by vehicle while using text-based communication;
- 15 therefore be it
- 16 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives designate April
- 17 27, 2019, as "Don't Text and Drive Day" in Pennsylvania; and be
- 18 it further
- 19 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives appeal to
- 20 individuals, government agencies, business leaders, hospitals,
- 21 schools and other public and private institutions to promote
- 22 awareness of the dangers of texting while driving; and be it
- 23 further
- 24 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives seek support for
- 25 programs and policies that reduce the incidence of texting while
- 26 driving in this Commonwealth and nationwide; and be it further
- 27 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives urge residents of
- 28 this Commonwealth to preserve life and property by refraining
- 29 from texting while driving; and be it further
- 30 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives urge law

- 1 enforcement across this Commonwealth to diligently enforce laws
- 2 preventing texting while driving.
