## A RESOLUTION

- Directing the Joint State Government Commission to establish an
  - advisory committee and provide a report to the House of
- Representatives on preventing and countering inflation and 3
- supply chain challenges in this Commonwealth.
- WHEREAS, The high costs of energy and food are devastating 5
- household budgets across this Commonwealth, including the
- 7 farmers who produce the food and the truckers who deliver it to
- 8 grocery store shelves; and
- 9 WHEREAS, Pennsylvanians are experiencing empty shelves of
- 10 essential goods; and
- WHEREAS, In May 2022, prices rose by 8.6% year-over-year, 11
- 12 increasing over the previous month's 8.3% year-over-year
- 13 increase; and
- 14 WHEREAS, Food prices in May 2022 were 10.1% greater than
- 15 prices in May 2021; and
- 16 WHEREAS, Energy prices went up 34.6% in May 2022, the eighth

- 1 month in a row above 25%; and
- 2 WHEREAS, Retail prices for gasoline have doubled since
- 3 January 2021; and
- 4 WHEREAS, Energy, tax and regulatory policies play a role in
- 5 driving up food, gas and electric prices; and
- 6 WHEREAS, Government policies that disincentivize work and
- 7 regulations that discourage energy development, increase costs
- 8 to consumers and hinder the supply chain should be explored for
- 9 their impact and possible revision or repeal; and
- 10 WHEREAS, There are 3.2 million fewer people in the labor
- 11 force today than before the COVID-19 pandemic; and
- 12 WHEREAS, Fifty-one percent of employers are reporting job
- 13 openings they cannot fill; and
- 14 WHEREAS, Shortages of skilled and unskilled labor in
- 15 manufacturing and distribution continue to impact output and
- 16 capacity; therefore be it
- 17 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives direct the Joint
- 18 State Government Commission to establish an advisory committee
- 19 and provide a report to the House of Representatives on
- 20 preventing and countering inflation and supply chain challenges
- 21 in this Commonwealth; and be it further
- 22 RESOLVED, That the Joint State Government Commission appoint
- 23 members of the advisory committee consisting of:
- 24 (1) a representative from a Statewide agriculture
- 25 organization;
- 26 (2) a representative from a Statewide trucking
- 27 organization;
- 28 (3) a representative from a Statewide manufacturing
- 29 organization;
- 30 (4) a representative from a Statewide small business

- 1 organization;
- 2 (5) a representative from a Statewide food merchants
- 3 association;
- 4 (6) a representative from a Statewide motor fuel or
- 5 petroleum association;
- 6 (7) a representative from a Statewide energy producer
- 7 association;
- 8 (8) a representative from a Statewide natural gas
- 9 association; and
- 10 (9) a representative from a Statewide career and
- 11 technical education association; and
- 12 (10) a representative from a statewide STATEWIDE <--

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- 13 workforce development association; and
- 14 (11) a representative from Pennsylvania's maritime
- 15 shipping industry; AND
- 16 (12) A REPRESENTATIVE FROM A NONPUBLIC LABOR UNION;
- 17 and be it further
- 18 RESOLVED, That the Joint State Government Commission, working
- 19 with the advisory committee, conduct a comprehensive review and
- 20 analysis of laws, regulations, policies and procedures of this
- 21 Commonwealth and other states regarding best policies and
- 22 practices for preventing and countering inflation and supply
- 23 chain challenges; and be it further
- 24 RESOLVED, That the review and analysis consist of the
- 25 following:
- 26 (1) supply chain challenges and recommendations for
- 27 regulatory relief or repeal to alleviate supply chain
- 28 constraints;
- 29 (2) cost-drivers of consumer goods, fuel, energy and
- 30 essential items, such as food and energy, and recommendations

- 1 for regulatory relief or repeal for bringing costs down;
- 2 (3) workforce challenges impacting the supply chain and
- 3 recommendations to meet workforce demands;
- 4 (4) recommendations to increase the supply and improve
- 5 the delivery of this Commonwealth's natural energy resources
- 6 to consumers; and
- 7 (5) any other regulatory or policy changes recommended
- 8 by the advisory committee relating to preventing and
- 9 countering inflation and supply chain challenges;
- 10 and be it further
- 11 RESOLVED, That the advisory committee meet a minimum of four
- 12 times; and be it further
- 13 RESOLVED, That the Joint State Government Commission issue a
- 14 report of the advisory committee's findings and recommendations
- 15 to the House of Representatives no later than six NINE months

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16 from the adoption of this resolution.
