INTRODUCED AS NONCONTROVERSIAL RESOLUTION UNDER RULE 35, APRIL 17, 2019

A RESOLUTION

Recognizing the week of April 15 through 21, 2019, as "Shaken 1 Baby Syndrome Awareness Week" in Pennsylvania. 2 3 WHEREAS, The well-being of this generation and future 4 generations depends in great measure upon the ability and dedication of those who devote themselves to make the safety, 5 welfare and well-being of our precious children their highest 6 7 priority; and 8 WHEREAS, Statistics show that 672,000 children were victims 9 of abuse and neglect in the United States in 2016, and, 10 according to the Department of Human Services, this number 11 includes 4,355 children in this Commonwealth; and 12 WHEREAS, On average, approximately five children will die 13 every day as the result of abuse or neglect in the United 14 States; and WHEREAS, The leading cause of death and disability among 15

abused children under five years of age is infant abusive head
 trauma, including the inflicted trauma known as shaken baby
 syndrome; and

WHEREAS, Shaken baby syndrome is one of the most severe forms
of child abuse caused by the violent shaking of an infant with
or without impact against an object; and

7 WHEREAS, Shaken baby syndrome and other inflicted head 8 traumas occur when a caregiver loses control and shakes a baby 9 or young child, most frequently less than one year of age or, in 10 some cases, as old as five years of age, resulting in blindness, 11 broken bones, cerebral palsy, brain damage, hearing loss, 12 paralysis, seizures, mental retardation, speech or learning 13 difficulties and death; and

14 WHEREAS, This abuse causes unspeakable pain and suffering to 15 our most vulnerable residents while putting enormous strain on 16 families in all communities; and

WHEREAS, On average across the United States, approximately 18 1,300 infants and young children are diagnosed with shaken baby 19 syndrome every year, with medical experts believing that 20 thousands of additional cases are misdiagnosed or undetected; 21 and

22 WHEREAS, Approximately one out of every four victims die as a 23 result of direct brain injuries; and

WHEREAS, In milder cases, in which babies look normal immediately after the shaking, the child may eventually develop irreversible damage due to the child's injuries; and

27 WHEREAS, The most effective way to end shaken baby syndrome 28 is by preventing such abuse; and

29 WHEREAS, It is clear that minimal contributions to education 30 and prevention programs may avert enormous medical and

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1 disability costs and immeasurable grief for many families; and

2 WHEREAS, Hospital-based education programs, such as the 3 nationally recognized Shaken Baby Syndrome Prevention and 4 Awareness Program developed by Dr. Mark Dias of Penn State 5 Hershey Medical Center, provide critically important information 6 about shaken baby syndrome to every parent of every child born 7 in this Commonwealth; and

8 WHEREAS, In 2002, the Shaken Baby Syndrome Education Act was 9 enacted, establishing the Shaken Baby Syndrome Education and 10 Prevention Program; and

11 WHEREAS, The Shaken Baby Syndrome Education and Prevention 12 Program partnered with the Department of Health, and, in 2006, 13 Pennsylvania became the first state in the nation to provide 14 consistent hospital-based education in 100% of all birthing and 15 children's hospitals in this Commonwealth; and

16 WHEREAS, Prevention and awareness efforts are supported by national and local organizations, including the Department of 17 18 Health, the Brain Injury Association of Pennsylvania, the 19 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the American Academy 20 of Pediatrics, Prevent Child Abuse Pennsylvania, the Cynthia Gibbs Foundation, the SKIPPER Initiative, the National Center on 21 Shaken Baby Syndrome, the Children's Defense Fund, the Child 22 23 Welfare League of America, the Shaken Baby Alliance and the 24 Pennsylvania Family Support Alliance; and

25 WHEREAS, These national and local organizations all work to 26 educate new parents and caregivers and increase awareness and 27 support for victims and their families in the health care and 28 criminal justice systems; and

29 WHEREAS, Prevention and awareness efforts provide critically30 important information about shaken baby syndrome to parents,

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1 caregivers, day-care workers, child protection employees, law 2 enforcement personnel, health care professionals, the general 3 public and representatives of the justice system; therefore be 4 it

5 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize the week of April 15 through 21, 2019, as "Shaken Baby Syndrome 6 Awareness Week" in Pennsylvania; and be it further 7 8 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives encourage all residents to observe this week with programs and activities that 9 10 share the commitment of prevention, awareness, community support and partnerships to protect our children from shaken baby 11 12 syndrome; and be it further

13 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives commend 14 advocates, organizations and agencies of national, State, county 15 and local governments working continuously to educate parents, 16 caregivers and professionals about the causes, consequences and 17 prevention of shaken baby syndrome and other inflicted head 18 injuries.

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
