A RESOLUTION

- Recognizing the month of March 2019 as "National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania.
- 3 WHEREAS, Colorectal cancer is a type of cancer that starts in
- 4 the colon or rectum, both of which are parts of the large
- 5 intestine and the body's digestive system; and
- 6 WHEREAS, Colorectal cancer often begins as an abnormal growth
- 7 called a polyp, which may form on the inner wall of the colon or
- 8 rectum; and
- 9 WHEREAS, In addition to colorectal polyps, risk factors of
- 10 colorectal cancer include increasing age, family history,
- 11 certain genetic mutations, excessive alcohol use, obesity,
- 12 physical inactivity, cigarette smoking and history of
- 13 inflammatory bowel disease; and
- 14 WHEREAS, Symptoms of developing colorectal cancer include
- 15 changes in bowel habits, rectal bleeding, stomach pains or

- 1 cramps, weakness and unexplained weight loss; and
- 2 WHEREAS, Colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of
- 3 cancer-related mortality in the United States, accounting for an
- 4 estimated 50,630 deaths in 2018; and
- 5 WHEREAS, Unprecedented progress has been made in the last
- 6 decade in reducing colorectal cancer incidence and death rates
- 7 largely due to prevention and early detection through screening;
- 8 and
- 9 WHEREAS, Up to 60% of deaths from colorectal cancer could be
- 10 prevented if everyone 50 years of age or older were screened
- 11 regularly and appropriately treated; and
- 12 WHEREAS, Since 2000, March has been celebrated as "National
- 13 Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month" by advocacy groups, public
- 14 officials, health care providers and patients; and
- 15 WHEREAS, During this month, participants generate widespread
- 16 awareness about colorectal cancer by wearing blue, holding
- 17 fundraising and education events, talking to family and friends
- 18 about screening and so much more; therefore be it
- 19 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize the
- 20 month of March 2019 as "National Colorectal Cancer Awareness
- 21 Month" in Pennsylvania; and be it further
- 22 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives join advocates
- 23 nationwide in urging the residents of this Commonwealth to
- 24 follow preventative measures such as:
- 25 (1) Increasing the intensity and amount of physical
- 26 activity.
- 27 (2) Maintaining a healthy weight.
- 28 (3) Quitting smoking.
- 29 (4) Limiting alcohol intake.
- 30 (5) Eating healthy fruits, vegetables and whole grains.

- 1 (6) Reducing the intake of red meat and cutting out 2 processed meat.
- 3 (7) Beginning regular screenings at 50 years of age and 4 earlier for those individuals at higher risk.
- 5 (8) Consulting with a doctor about tests for detecting
 6 cancer and precancer, such as a colonoscopy, virtual
 7 colonoscopy, flexible sigmoidoscopy, stool occult blood test,
 8 stool immunochemical test and stool DNA test;
- 9 and be it further
- 10 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives urge its members,
- 11 the Department of Health and health care professionals across
- 12 this Commonwealth to recognize "National Colorectal Cancer
- 13 Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania to increase awareness about the
- 14 disease and to educate residents on the important preventative
- 15 steps they can take today.
