## A RESOLUTION

Designating November 19, 2013, as "National Memory Screening 1 Day" in Pennsylvania. 2 3 WHEREAS, November is National Alzheimer's Disease Awareness Month; and 4 5 WHEREAS, It is important to recognize the devastating nature 6 of Alzheimer's disease on individuals, as well as their 7 families; and 8 WHEREAS, Early detection of memory problems is critical; and 9 WHEREAS, The stigma associated with memory loss, especially Alzheimer's disease, often delays screening and diagnosis for up 10 11 to six years in some cases; and 12 WHEREAS, Recent advancements in scientific research have 13 demonstrated the benefits of early medical treatment for individuals with Alzheimer's disease and also the benefits of 14 early access to counseling and other support services for their 15

1 caregivers; and

2 WHEREAS, With early diagnosis, individuals can avoid or 3 correct contributing medical problems, commence available 4 therapy, organize current and future care and enhance self-5 determination; and

6 WHEREAS, Caregivers can identify and embrace available 7 community support services; and

8 WHEREAS, In direct response to research breakthroughs, National Memory Screening Day was established by the Alzheimer's 9 10 Foundation of America (AFA) as a collaborative effort with local organizations and health care professionals across the country 11 12 to promote awareness, early detection and early diagnosis of 13 memory impairment so that individuals can obtain proper medical 14 treatment, social services and other resources related to their condition; and 15

16 WHEREAS, Memory screening is not used to diagnose any 17 illness, but is used as an indicator to determine whether a 18 person might benefit from further examination by a qualified 19 health care provider; and

20 WHEREAS, Memory screenings are a safe and cost-effective intervention to direct at-risk individuals to appropriate 21 clinical resources, thus reducing the costs of long-term care or 22 23 hospitalization resulting from undiagnosed complications; and 24 WHEREAS, Screenings also greatly benefit those with normal scores by checking their memory, allaying fears and promoting 25 26 chronic disease prevention and successful aging; therefore be it 27 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives designate 28 November 19, 2013, as "National Memory Screening Day" in 29 Pennsylvania and urge the citizens of this Commonwealth to 30 participate in a free and confidential memory screening program
