A RESOLUTION

- Directing the Joint State Government Commission to conduct a 1 comprehensive study on the education provided to children, 2 dependent children and youths 6 through 21 years of age in juvenile and adult correctional facilities in this Commonwealth. 5 WHEREAS, Youths in the juvenile justice system need a quality 6 education so that they can develop the skills that they need to 7 become successful adults; and 8 9 WHEREAS, Research suggests that many young people enter the 10 juvenile justice system well behind grade level; and 11 WHEREAS, Studies demonstrate that system-involved youths are 12 chronically behind in school; and 13 WHEREAS, Nationally, as many as two-thirds of youths dropped out of school after release from the juvenile justice 14 15 system; and 16 WHEREAS, The United States Department of Education data shows 17 that most youths in juvenile justice facilities made no
- 18 meaningful progress in learning or academic achievement; and

- 1 WHEREAS, There are serious questions about the quality of
- 2 curricula used in juvenile and adult correctional facilities and
- 3 whether the curricula is aligned to Pennsylvania Academic
- 4 Standards; and
- 5 WHEREAS, Continuity of instruction is often compromised by
- 6 disruptions due to institutional activities and routines within
- 7 the correctional facility; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Placement in a juvenile justice facility is a
- 9 turning point for many youths and without appropriate
- 10 programming and coordination, too many youths fall behind while
- 11 in custody; and
- 12 WHEREAS, In 2012, the United States Department of Education
- 13 hosted a correctional education summit at which recommendations
- 14 were made for the Federal Government to address the quality of
- 15 education provided to children and youths in juvenile and adult
- 16 correctional facilities at the state level; and
- 17 WHEREAS, The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), (Public Law
- 18 114-95, 129 Stat. 1802) establishes broad goals related to
- 19 delinquent youths, including improving education services to
- 20 provide the opportunity to meet state academic standards,
- 21 improving a youth's transition from institutionalization to
- 22 further schooling or employment, preventing dropout of youths
- 23 and providing young people returning from correctional
- 24 facilities or institutions for neglected and delinquent children
- 25 and youths with reentry support; and
- 26 WHEREAS, Education services can take many different forms,
- 27 including alternative schools for disruptive youths or GED-only
- 28 programs, as there are no uniform provisions of education
- 29 services within placement facilities and programs through
- 30 intermediate units, private facilities and school districts; and

- 1 WHEREAS, The oversight and monitoring of programs varies
- 2 widely depending on type of facility and type of program;
- 3 therefore be it

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- 4 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives direct the Joint
- 5 State Government Commission to conduct a comprehensive study on
- 6 the education provided to children, dependent children and
- 7 youths 6 through 21 years of age in juvenile and adult
- 8 correctional facilities in this Commonwealth; and be it further
- 9 RESOLVED, That, at a minimum, the report shall:
- 10 (1) address the quality of education provided to
 11 children, dependent children and youths, specifically if the
 12 curricula in juvenile and adult correctional or congregate

care facilities is aligned to Pennsylvania's Core Standards;

- (2) evaluate how the needs of children and youths with
 an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) or qualified 504 plan
 are met while placed in facilities that provide the necessary
 support to meet the preplacement-identified educational needs
 and the role of the original resident school district and
 educational guardians in the IEP or 504 plan monitoring or
 IEP or 504 plan monitoring development;
 - (3) include an assessment on the support and training provided to education professionals in juvenile and adult correctional or congregate care facilities;
- 24 (4) identify how the Commonwealth will comply with or 25 seek opportunities to exceed Federal standards for 26 incarcerated youths established by ESSA; and
- (5) identify how the Commonwealth performs in regard to
 the recommendations established by the United States

 Department of Education on correctional and reentry education
 for children and youths 6 through 12 years of age;

- 2 RESOLVED, That the Joint State Government Commission, as part
- 3 of its study, establish an advisory committee within three
- 4 months of the adoption of this resolution consisting of all of
- 5 the following members:
- 6 (1) The Secretary of Education or a designee.
- 7 (2) The Secretary of Human Services or a designee.
- 8 (3) The Secretary of Corrections or a designee.
- 9 (4) The Executive Director of the Pennsylvania
- 10 Commission on Crime and Delinquency or a designee.
- 11 (5) A representative from the Pennsylvania Education Law
- 12 Center.
- 13 (6) A representative from the Pennsylvania Juvenile Law
- 14 Center.
- 15 (7) A representative from the Pennsylvania Council of
- 16 Chief Juvenile Probation Officers.
- 17 (8) A representative from the Pennsylvania Juvenile
- 18 Court Judges' Commission.
- 19 (9) Representatives from other departments or agencies
- of the Commonwealth or other entities that the Joint State
- 21 Government Commission deems appropriate in conducting the
- 22 study;
- 23 and be it further
- 24 RESOLVED, That the Joint State Government Commission, in
- 25 collaboration with the advisory committee, submit a report of
- 26 its findings, along with any statutory or regulatory
- 27 recommendations, to the General Assembly within one year of the
- 28 adoption of this resolution.
