## HOUSE RESOLUTION No. 79 Session of 2019

INTRODUCED BY CRUZ, HILL-EVANS AND NEILSON, FEBRUARY 11, 2019

REFERRED TO COMMITTEE ON URBAN AFFAIRS, FEBRUARY 11, 2019

## A RESOLUTION

Urging the City of Philadelphia to launch a public education 1 campaign on the prohibitions and safety hazards associated 2 with pedestrians soliciting a ride, employment, business or 3 contributions along roadways, and urging the Philadelphia 4 Police Department to more strictly enforce State and local 5 laws. 6 7 WHEREAS, The primary intended purpose of the highway and roadway system is the safe and efficient transport of vehicular 8 traffic; and 9 10 WHEREAS, Many major highways and roadways within this 11 Commonwealth, and specifically in the City of Philadelphia, are 12 congested, heavily traveled and carry more traffic than they 13 were constructed and designed to handle; and 14 WHEREAS, The presence of individuals along a highway or 15 roadway within the City of Philadelphia presents concerns for the individuals' safety and the safety of motorists; and 16 17 WHEREAS, The safety concerns are heightened when individuals 18 linger, remain or loiter in the roadways or otherwise act to distract motorists; and 19 20 WHEREAS, The dangerous combination of distracted motorists

1 and individuals stopping or standing on a roadway can hinder the 2 free flow of traffic, increase congestion and increase the risk 3 of traffic accidents; and

WHEREAS, In 2017, there were 128,188 reportable traffic
accidents in Pennsylvania, of which 1,137 individuals lost their
lives and 80,612 people were injured; and

7 WHEREAS, In the same year, the City of Philadelphia had 8 11,160 traffic accidents and 94 traffic-related deaths, of which 9 37 involved pedestrian fatalities and 1,591 involved injuries to 10 pedestrians; and

11 WHEREAS, In the City of Philadelphia, public highway 12 solicitation of funds for any purpose is prohibited unless the 13 Department of Licenses and Inspections determines that a 14 particular location or activity does not present a safety hazard 15 to the excepted vendor, solicitor or the public as authorized by 16 section 10-611 of the Philadelphia Code; and

WHEREAS, Roadway solicitation is prohibited in this Commonwealth by 75 Pa.C.S. § 3545, which states in part that no person shall stand on a roadway for the purpose of soliciting a ride, employment, business or contributions from the occupant of any vehicle; and

22 WHEREAS, The only statutory exception to the prohibition of 23 roadway solicitation is found at 35 Pa.C.S. § 7714, which allows 24 bona fide, duly constituted first responder organizations to 25 solicit donations at specific intersections by adhering to 26 certain requirements that ensure public and individual safety 27 and that maintain normal traffic operations; and 28 WHEREAS, The solicitation exception was granted to first

29 responder organizations because they are trained to safely 30 operate in traffic during roadway incidents; and

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1 WHEREAS, The Commonwealth has significant government interest
2 in vehicular and pedestrian safety and the free flow of traffic;
3 therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives urge the City of
Philadelphia to launch a public education campaign on the
prohibitions and safety hazards associated with pedestrians
soliciting a ride, employment, business or contributions along
roadways; and be it further

9 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives urge the 10 Philadelphia Police Department to more strictly enforce State 11 and local laws.
