A RESOLUTION

1 2 3 4	Directing the Joint State Government Commission to establish an advisory committee to conduct a study on the field of artificial intelligence and its impact and potential future impact in Pennsylvania.
5	WHEREAS, Artificial intelligence means models and systems
6	performing functions generally associated with human
7	intelligence, including reasoning and learning; and
8	WHEREAS, Recent news stories and reports have shown the rapid
9	acceleration of artificial intelligence (AI) utilization across
10	many different industries in this Commonwealth; and
11	WHEREAS, While AI has the potential to be a tool to improve a
12	variety of industries, many experts in the artificial
13	intelligence field have been warning that we may be moving too
14	quickly for comfort; and
15	WHEREAS, The "godfather of AI" Geoffrey Hinton left his job
16	at Google, where he developed AI programs, to "blow the whistle"
17	on the dangers that artificial intelligence possess; and
18	WHEREAS, It is important for the Commonwealth to take

1 measures to study artificial intelligence's effect and impact; 2 and

3 WHEREAS, The automation of manufacturing and other jobs by artificial intelligence poses a significant threat to organized 4 labor and blue-collar workers throughout Pennsylvania; and 5 WHEREAS, Algorithms via artificial intelligence programs have 6 7 been used to spread heinous disinformation relating to health, 8 public safety and politics for some time; and 9 WHEREAS, Universities across this Commonwealth have 10 experienced an influx of academic integrity-related disciplinary actions against their students, which have been attributed to 11

12 artificial intelligence programs like ChatGPT, which hurts 13 student achievement and skill development; and

14 WHEREAS, Artificial intelligence-based algorithms have been 15 utilized by technology and advertising companies for as long as 16 the Internet has existed; and

WHEREAS, The methodical gathering of information to make the determination of what to advertise and what not to advertise has remained nontransparent; and

20 WHEREAS, Companies that utilize artificial intelligence in 21 their advertising must be transparent in how these bots are fed 22 information about the user; and

23 WHEREAS, The health care industry has been utilizing 24 artificial intelligence as a tool since the 1970s; and

25 WHEREAS, In recent times, artificial intelligence is looking 26 to be used across multiple different facets of the industry that 27 would put nurses and hospital staff out of jobs; and

28 WHEREAS, Processing of data could be fully automated within 29 the next decade, eliminating the need for technicians and 30 putting even more people out of work; and

1 WHEREAS, Cybersecurity automation via artificial intelligence 2 programs poses a significant threat to our State government, the 3 Pennsylvania National Guard and all its components, the 4 Pennsylvania Department of Military and Veterans Affairs and the 5 Pennsylvania State Police; and

6 WHEREAS, In current technology, there are significant 7 pitfalls in the quality of the cybersecurity provided by 8 artificial intelligence programs; and

9 WHEREAS, Cyberterrorists, whether domestic or foreign, are 10 trained to bypass and take advantage of any flaw that exists in 11 a security system; therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the Senate direct the Joint State Government Commission to conduct a study on the field of artificial intelligence and make recommendations on the responsible growth of Pennsylvania's emerging technology markets and the use of artificial intelligence in State government and to analyze how other states regulate the artificial intelligence field; and be it further

Chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union.

15 (11) One attorney or legal educator to be selected by16 the Joint State Government Commission.

17 (12) Two individuals who are academics at a 18 postsecondary institution to be selected by the Joint State 19 Government Commission.

(13) One individual with experience in the field of
ethics and human rights to be selected by the Joint State
Government Commission.

(14) Two individuals who are artificial intelligence
engineers to be selected by the Joint State Government
Commission.

26 (15) One member who is a secondary or postsecondary
27 student in Pennsylvania to be selected by the Joint State
28 Government Commission.

29 (16) One individual representing the Pennsylvania
30 Medical Society to be selected by the Joint State Government

3 (17) Five individuals with knowledge and expertise in 4 matters involving emerging technologies and the field of 5 artificial intelligence to be selected by the Joint State 6 Government Commission.

7 (18) One member of the Senate of Pennsylvania selected
8 by the President pro tempore of the Senate and one member of
9 the Senate of Pennsylvania selected by the Minority Leader of
10 the Senate;

11 and be it further

12 RESOLVED, That the Joint State Government Commission, in 13 collaboration with the advisory committee, conduct a study and 14 present a report that, at a minimum, includes the following:

15 (1) An assessment of the development and use of 16 artificial intelligence technology, including benefits and 17 risks.

18 (2) Whether and how to use artificial intelligence in
19 State government, including an analysis of the fiscal impact,
20 if any, on the Commonwealth.

(3) Proposed legislation for State regulation of the
artificial intelligence field if recommended by the
commission and the advisory committee.

24 (4) A summary of the development and current use of25 artificial intelligence in this Commonwealth.

26 (5) A proposal for a definition of artificial27 intelligence.

(6) A proposal for the responsible and ethical
development of artificial intelligence in the Commonwealth,
including an identification of the potential risks and

1 benefits of the development.

2 (7) A recommendation on whether the General Assembly
3 should establish a permanent commission to study the
4 artificial intelligence field.

5 (8) A recommendation for the allocation of rights and
6 duties between workers and employers to oversee the

8 (9) An assessment of how artificial intelligence has 9 been used to create products of disinformation and conduct 10 efforts to curb these disinformation campaigns.

(10) An evaluation of how artificial intelligence has affected the academic track record of Pennsylvania's students and ways to assist State-related university leaders with identifying solutions to curbing the usage of artificial intelligence by students.
