3 SECTION 1. PROHIBITION ON IMPLEMENTING CERTAIN 4 RULE.

5 (a) FINAL RULE.—The Secretary of Labor shall not
6 implement, amend, or enforce the rule entitled "Wage
7 Methodology for the Temporary Non-agricultural Employ8 ment H–2B Program" (Regulatory Identification Number

1 1205–AB61), published on January 19, 2011 (76 Fed.
 2 Reg. 3452), initially scheduled to go into effect January
 3 1, 2012, amended to go into effect on September 30,
 4 2011, and amended to go into effect November 30, 2011,
 5 or any substantially similar rule.

6 (b) PROPOSED RULE.—The Secretary of Labor shall 7 not finalize, implement, amend, or enforce the proposed 8 rule entitled "Temporary Non-agricultural Employment of 9 H–2B Aliens in the United States" (Regulatory Identifica-10 tion Number 1205–AB58), published on March 18, 2011 (76 Fed. Reg. 15130), or any substantially similar rule. 11 12 (c) DETERMINATION OF PREVAILING WAGE.—In de-13 termining the prevailing wage level under section 212(p)of the Immigration and Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. 14 15 1182(p)), the Secretary of Labor shall use data from the Occupational Employment Statistics program of the Bu-16 17 reau of Labor Statistics and shall comply with paragraph 18 (4) of such section with respect to the number of wage 19 levels required of a governmental survey used to make 20 such computation.
