23	TIAL.—The term 'recognized postsecondary creden-
24	tial' means a postsecondary degree from an institu-
25	tion of higher education described in section 101 of

3	prenticeship program, or another industry-recog-
4	nized credential (such as an industry certificate, or
5	a license in an in-demand industry), if the recipient

9	GRAM.—The term 'registered apprenticeship pro-
10	gram' means an industry occupational skills training

14	rooms or through distance learning) while an indi-
15	vidual is employed, working under the direction of
16	qualified personnel or a mentor, and earning incre-
17	mental wage increases aligned to enhanced job pro-
18	ficiency, resulting in the acquisition of a nationally
19	recognized and portable certificate, under a plan ap-
20	proved by the Office of Apprenticeship or a State
21	agency recognized by the Department of Labor.

12 (2)PROVISION FOR EXPANSION OF RE-13 SEARCH.—If, as of the date of the enactment of this 14 Act, the Commissioner for Education Research of 15 the National Center for Education Research has es-16 tablished a center for adult literacy in accordance 17 with section 133(c)(2)(A) of the Education Sciences 18 Reform Act of 2002 (20 U.S.C. 9533(c)(2)(A)), the 19 Commissioner shall expand the topic of research of 20 such center to include adult education and workplace 21 skills, in accordance with the amendment made by 22 subsection (a).

9 (c) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of sections 10 for subpart D of part IV of subchapter A of chapter 1 11 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 is amended by add-12 ing at the end the following new item:

"Sec. 45S. Credit for employer educational assistance programs.".

13 (d) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendments made by
14 this section shall apply to expenses relating to courses of
15 instruction beginning after December 31, 2013.
