Mr. GAETZ (for himself, Mr. GOSAR, Ms. GREENE of Georgia, Mr. BIGGS, Mrs. LUNA, and Mr. CRANE) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Foreign Affairs, and in addition to the Committee on Appropriations, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned

A BILL

To abolish the United States Agency for International
Development, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. FINDINGS.**

4 Congress finds as follows:

5 (1) The United States, in dealings with allies
6 and adversaries, should engage in diplomacy and
7 international relations that do not undermine the
8 culture or tradition of other nations and peoples, but

1 instead seek to develop working and friendly rela-
2 tionships relative to the interests of both parties
3 with United States citizens chiefly in mind.

4 (2) The United States Agency for International
5 Development (USAID) operates several “capacity
6 building” programs abroad and uses these programs
7 to spread perverse ideology, that is antithetical to
8 functioning, well-ordered society, across the globe.

9 (3) USAID uses United States tax dollars to
10 push radical, leftist ideology abroad, going so far as
11 to undermine foreign governments who do not ad-
12 here to the perverse ideology it espouses.

13 (4) USAID does not act in the best interest of
14 the United States or its people, nor the foreign na-
15 tions it purposes to support.

16 (5) USAID aims to identify and address “re-
17 strictive gender norms and inequalities . . . to foster
18 the sustainability of results”.

19 (6) USAID meddles in local elections, pro-
20 moting the interests of “women, youth, and other
21 traditionally marginalized groups” ahead of the in-
22 terests of the other nations’ citizenry.

23 (7) The international affairs budget for the fis-
24 cal year 2022, passed by the House of Representa-
25 tives in July 2021, for the United States Depart-

1 ment of State and USAID, undid historical prece-
2 dent by repealing the Helms Amendment that pre-
3 viously restricted United States foreign aid from
4 paying for abortions.

5 (8) USAID has provided grants totaling
6 \$850,000 to the Bandhu Social Welfare Society for
7 “the rights of gender diverse people” in Bangladesh.

8 (9) USAID has provided a \$3.7 million grant to
9 Aurat Publication and Information Service Founda-
10 tion to “provide support for gender equity pro-
11 grams” in Pakistan.

12 (10) Eighty-five grants totaling \$138.1 million
13 have been provided through USAID to the Inter-
14 national Organization for Migration for “humani-
15 tarian assistance” to support open borders policy
16 around the globe.

17 (11) Eight grants totaling \$21.7 million have
18 been provided through USAID to the Soros-backed
19 Tides Center for various “civil society innovation ini-
20 tiatives”.

21 (12) USAID has provided a \$1 million grant to
22 the United Nations Development Programme for
23 supporting “LGBTI human rights advocacy in
24 Asia”.

1 (13) USAID has provided a \$370,000 grant to
2 Public Information and Need of Knowledge for pro-
3 moting “the human rights of LGBTI people in Ar-
4 menian society”.

5 (14) USAID has provided \$1.1 million grant to
6 the Pink Human Rights Defender for “empowering
7 the LGBTI community and their allies to advance
8 human rights”.

9 (15) USAID has provided a \$323,871 grant to
10 Ryan Thomas Kaminski to serve as the United
11 States personal service contractor LGBTI Advisor.

12 **SEC. 2. ABOLISH THE UNITED STATES AGENCY FOR INTER-**
13 **NATIONAL DEVELOPMENT.**

14 (a) **IN GENERAL.**—Beginning on the date of the en-
15 actment of this Act, no Federal funds may be made avail-
16 able to carry out any of the functions, duties, or respon-
17 sibilities assigned or delegated to the Administrator of the
18 United States Agency for International Development pur-
19 suant to the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C.
20 2151 et seq.) or any other provision of law.

21 (b) **RESCISSION OF FUNDS.**—The unobligated bal-
22 ance of each amount made available to the Administrator
23 of the United States Agency for International Develop-
24 ment as of the day before the date of the enactment of
25 this Act is rescinded. Any other assets or liabilities of the

1 Agency as of such day shall be transferred to the Sec-
2 retary of State.

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
