# S. 2067

To require the Secretary of Veterans Affairs to award grants to nonprofit organizations to assist such organizations in carrying out programs to provide service dogs to eligible veterans, and for other purposes.

Mr. TILLIS (for himself, Mr. BLUMENTHAL, Mr. CRAMER, and Mr. HEINRICH) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Veterans' Affairs

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## A BILL

To require the Secretary of Veterans Affairs to award grants to nonprofit organizations to assist such organizations in carrying out programs to provide service dogs to eligible veterans, and for other purposes.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3       **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4       This Act may be cited as the “Service Dogs Assisting  
5       Veterans Act” or the “SAVES Act”.

1   **SEC. 2. DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS PROGRAM TO**  
2                   **AWARD GRANTS FOR THE PROVISION OF**  
3                   **SERVICE DOGS TO VETERANS.**

4       (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Veterans Affairs  
5 shall require the Under Secretary for Health of the De-  
6 partment of Veterans Affairs to establish a program under  
7 which the Secretary shall award grants, on a competitive  
8 basis, to nonprofit organizations to assist such organiza-  
9 tions in carrying out programs to provide service dogs to  
10 eligible veterans.

11     (b) APPLICATIONS.—

12       (1) IN GENERAL.—To be eligible to receive a  
13 grant under this section, a nonprofit organization  
14 shall submit an application to the Secretary at such  
15 time, in such manner, and containing such informa-  
16 tion as the Secretary may require.

17       (2) ELEMENTS.—An application submitted  
18 under paragraph (1) shall include the following:

19               (A) A proposal for the evaluation required  
20 by subsection (d).

21               (B) A description of the following:

22                       (i) The training that will be provided  
23 by the organization to eligible veterans.

24                       (ii) The training of dogs that will  
25 serve as service dogs.

(iii) The aftercare services that the organization will provide for such dogs and eligible veterans.

(iv) The plan for publicizing the availability of such dogs through a marketing campaign that targets eligible veterans.

(v) The commitment of the organization to have humane standards for animals.

(C) A statement certifying that the organization is accredited by Assistance Dogs International or another similar widely recognized accreditation organization that the Secretary determines has accreditation standards that meet or exceed the standards of Assistance Dogs International.

(c) USE OF FUNDS.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—The recipient of a grant under this section shall use the grant amounts to plan, design, establish, or operate (or any combination thereof) one or more programs that provide service dogs to eligible veterans.

(2) EQUAL ACCESS.—The Secretary shall require each recipient of a grant under this section to

1 provide equal access to service dogs to eligible veterans  
2 who are women.

3 (d) EVALUATIONS.—The Secretary shall require each  
4 recipient of a grant under this section to conduct an evaluation  
5 of the effectiveness of the activities carried out  
6 through the grant by such recipient.

7 (e) MAXIMUM AMOUNT.—The total amount of grants  
8 awarded to each nonprofit organization under this section  
9 may not exceed \$2,000,000.

10 (f) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

11 (1) ELIGIBLE VETERAN.—

12 (A) IN GENERAL.—The term “eligible veteran” means a veteran who—

13 (i) is enrolled in the system of annual  
14 patient enrollment of the Department of  
15 Veterans Affairs established and operated  
16 under section 1705(a) of title 38, United  
17 States Code; and

18 (ii) has one or more disabilities described in subparagraph (B).

19 (B) DISABILITY DESCRIBED.—A disability  
20 described in this subparagraph is any of the following:

21 (i) Blindness or visual impairment.

- (ii) Loss of use of a limb, paralysis, or other significant mobility issue.
- (iii) Loss of hearing.
- (iv) Traumatic brain injury.
- (v) Post-traumatic stress disorder.
- (vi) Military sexual trauma.
- (vii) Any other disability that the Secretary considers appropriate.

(2) SERVICE DOG.—

(A) IN GENERAL.—The term “service dog” means any dog that is individually trained to do work or perform tasks that are—

(i) for the benefit of an individual with a disability, including a physical or sensory disability or a psychiatric, intellectual, or other mental disability; and

(ii) directly related to the disability of the individual.

(B) WORK AND TASKS.—The crime-deterrent effects of the presence of a dog and the provision by a dog of emotional support, well-being, comfort, or companionship do not constitute work or tasks for the purposes of subparagraph (A).

1       (g) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There is  
2 authorized to be appropriated to carry out this Act  
3 \$10,000,000 for each of fiscal years 2024 through 2028.
