To increase the number of CBP Agriculture Specialists and support staff in the Office of Field Operations of U.S. Customs and Border Protection, and for other purposes.

3	SEC. 4. ADDITIONAL U.S. CUSTOMS AND BORDER PROTEC-
4	TION PERSONNEL.
5	(a) CBP AGRICULTURE SPECIALISTS.—The Commis-
6	sioner of U.S. Customs and Border Protection may hire,
7	train, and assign 240 new CBP Agriculture Specialists
8	above the current attrition level during every fiscal year
9	until the total number of CBP Agriculture Specialists
0	equals and sustains the requirements identified each year
11	in the Agriculture Resource Allocation Model.
12	(b) Mission and Operational Support Staff.—
13	(1) In general.—The Commissioner of U.S.
14	Customs and Border Protection may hire, train, and
15	assign support staff to support CBP Agriculture
16	Specialists.
17	(2) CBP AGRICULTURE TECHNICIANS.—The
18	Commissioner of U.S. Customs and Border Protec-
19	tion may hire, train, and assign 200 new CBP Agri-
20	culture Technicians during each fiscal year until the
21	total number of CBP Agriculture Technicians equals
22	and sustains the requirements identified each year in
23	the Mission and Operational Support Resource Allo-

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cation Model.

1	(c) CBP AGRICULTURE CANINE TEAMS.—The Com-							
2	missioner of U.S. Customs and Border Protection may							
3	hire, train, and assign 20 new CBP agriculture canine							
4	teams during each of the first 3 fiscal years beginning							
5	after the date of the enactment of this Act.							
6	(d) Traffic Forecasts.—In calculating the num-							
7	ber of CBP Agriculture Specialists needed at each port							
8	of entry through the Agriculture Resource Allocation							
9	Model, the Office of Field Operations shall—							
10	(1) rely on data collected regarding the inspec-							
11	tions and other activities conducted at each suc							
12	port of entry; and							
13	(2) consider volume from seasonal surges, other							
14	projected changes in commercial and passenger vol-							
15	umes, the most current commercial forecasts, and							
16	other relevant information.							
17	(e) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—							
18	(1) CBP AGRICULTURE SPECIALISTS.—There is							
19	authorized to be appropriated to carry out sub-							
20	section (a)—							
21	(A) \$29,900,000 for fiscal year 2020;							
22	(B) $\$36,100,000$ for fiscal year 2021; and							
23	(C) \$40,500,000 for fiscal year 2022.							

1	(2) CBP AGRICULTURE TECHNICIANS.—There					
2	is authorized to be appropriated to carry out sub-					
3	section (b)—					
4	(A) \$11,000,000 for fiscal year 2020;					
5	(B) $$25,000,000$ for fiscal year 2021; and					
6	(C) \$38,000,000 for fiscal year 2022.					
7	(3) CBP AGRICULTURE CANINE TEAMS.—There					
8	is authorized to be appropriated to carry out sub					
9	section (c)—					
10	(A) \$3,500,000 for fiscal year 2020;					
11	(B) $\$7,400,000$ for fiscal year 2021; and					
12	(C) \$12,200,000 for fiscal year 2022.					
13	(4) Training.—There is authorized to be ap-					
14	propriated for training costs associated with the new					
15	CBP personnel and canine teams hired pursuant to					
16	subsections (a), (b), and (c) \$6,000,000 for each of					
17	the fiscal years 2020, 2021, and 2022.					
18	SEC. 5. GAO STUDY, BRIEFING, AND REPORT.					
19	(a) STUDY.—The Comptroller General of the United					
20	States, after consultation with the appropriate congres-					
21	sional committees, shall conduct a review of the efforts					
22	of the Department of Homeland Security, the Department					
23	of Agriculture, and other Federal agencies to address risks					
24	to the agricultural supply that analyzes—					

1	(1) interagency coordination and the distribu-						
2	tion of responsibilities among Federal agencies with						
3	respect to the inspection of agricultural commodition						
4	entering the United States;						
5	(2) the effectiveness of such inspection response						
6	sibilities among Federal agencies; and						
7	(3) the training provided to, and working cond						
8	tions of, CBP Agriculture Specialists.						
9	(b) Briefing.—Not later than 1 year after the da						
10	of the enactment of this Act, the Comptroller General sha						
11	brief the appropriate congressional committees regarding						
12	the results of the study conducted pursuant to subsection						
13	(a).						
14	(c) Report.—Not later than 90 days after the brief						
15	ing required under subsection (b), the Comptroller Ger						
16	eral shall complete the study required under subsection (a						
17	and make the results of the study available to the public
